DORRIS PEOPLE NAME COMMITTEE

WORK TOWARD SECURING THE RECLAMATION OF THE MARSH LANDS AROUND LOWER LAKE WILL START AT ONCE

O. E. Moore, J. E. Thacker and J. H. Morris of Dorris and vicinity, have been appointed by the Dorris Commercial Club to act for that section in the campaign for the reclamation of the marsh lands around Lower Klamath Lake.

The Dorris committee will work in conjunction with the committee appointed by the Klamath Chamber of Commerce, George J. Walton, E. B. Hall and Lewis Wyde, to take up this work. A meeting of the two committees will be held in a short time.

C. C. Hogue, who was asked to serve on the committee, has said that he does not consider it wise for him to act in an official capacity on the committee, but that he will meet with them as often as they desire, and will give such help in the matter as he can.

If his plan is what he believes it, the owners of the land should proceed as soon as possible to try to secure its favorable consideration.

There are many projects clamoring for the government money, and later it may be impossible to secure it for this work. It will be difficult to do so now, and will require the effort of the whole people, back of the movement.

Since the crowd in Washington was not so large, they were able to go over their route without a repetition of the scenes that marked their inauguration parade.

DIXIE GOING BACK TO FARM

SOUTHERN AGRICULTURISTS TO MEET AND DISCUSS PROFITABLE WAYS OF FARMING AND MARKETING

RICHMOND, Va., April 16.—On the theory that the farmers of Dixie annually lose six billion dollars which they might receive for their crops under proper systems of production and marketing, a great co-operative movement was launched here today at a farmers' conference, the sixteenth educational meeting of its kind to be held in the South. In the two-day program will appear two score authorities on agriculture, finance and general organization, many of them successful farmers themselves.

It was pointed out that the virtual waste of six billion dollars is caused by poor farming methods, unwise borrowing of money and the purchase of supplies the farmers themselves could produce. It is proposed that the farmer market his crop co-operatively; buy goods in the same manner, and borrow money from co-operative societies. This plan, those behind the movement claim, will add to the farmer's income; he will be able to spend more on the pleasant as well as the useful things of life, to build better roads, to maintain better schools and to make country life better in every way.

This would also have the effect of checking the exodus from the farm to the cities, promoters of the idea declare. With this increase in the rural population, when the young people find life the gay, will come in time an increase in the amount of food-stuffs raised and a corresponding decrease in the cost of living.

Prof. John Lee Coulter, expert special agent for the census bureau, has estimated that the value of all Southern farm products is \$2,500,000,000 a year, but that they cost the consumers twice that amount. Southern farmers, he estimates, spend most of their two and a half billions for farm supplies, food, clothing and the like, and of this, one billion goes to the middlemen of all classes. Southern agriculturalists, Coulter also figures, lose an additional two and a half billions each year because of poor farming methods. They could double their yield by crop diversification and other improvements, if it were not for the "advance system" under which the creditor forces the farmer to plant "cash crops" year in and year out.

This financing of the Southern farm is one of the biggest questions to be considered by the conference. It is estimated that the farmers south of the Mason and Dixon line lose \$165,000,000 yearly because of excessive interest rates—much of which they might retain if they controlled their own credit systems and agencies for marketing and buying.

One of the features of the conference will be an interstate meeting of state and county superintendents, teachers of agriculture and other educators, at which the subject for discussion will be "The Most Effective Means for Developing the Rural School." A. C. Monahan, rural school specialist in the United States bureau of education, will urge the necessity for a well defined, constructive county plan in rural education. Typical rural school problems will be discussed also.

LANE'S DAUGHTER MOUNTS SOAP BOX

RELATIVE OF UNITED STATES SENATOR ORATES ON SOCIALISM AND CLASS STRUGGLE IN PORTLAND STREETS

PORTLAND, April 16.—Mrs. Nina Lane McBride, daughter of United States Senator Lane of Oregon, who, with her husband, recently returned from New Orleans, where both were delegates to the "Hobo" convention, has resumed her work here as a socialist orator.

Mounted on a soap box on one of the principal streets, Mrs. McBride spoke to an audience of several hundred, pleading with the mte awaken to the fact that they were in the midst of a great class struggle.

"Here, you fellows with white collars, you fellows who have got places to sleep tonight—it's you I want to interest," she said. "I want you to buy our literature, to read, to think, to wake up. If you don't awaken to the fact that there is a class struggle in society and take your place on the right side in that struggle, the time will come when your stomachs will be empty and flap against your backbones. But you won't know what to do, except to look for another master to work for, so that you may be fed from part of the product of your own toil."

Dressed in a blue tailored suit and a neat tongue hat, Mrs. McBride made a decided hit with her audience.

In conclusion she said: "I have no more use for a reformer or a prohibitionist than I have for a person that is religious. What I want is to see thinkers—men who know where they are economically. The pulpit, the magazines and the daily papers are all trying to teach you to be contented. I want you to wake up."

BEND-TO-SALEM LINE IS LATEST

OREGON RAILROAD COMPANY IS SAID TO HAVE PERFECTED ORGANIZATION AND PICKED OUT FEASIBLE ROUTE

SALEM, April 16.—According to an announcement which has been made by John H. McNary, attorney for the company, the Oregon Railroad company has perfected an organization, and will build a railroad from this city to Bend. The line will lead through Stanton and then on through Minto Pass, one of the very few feasible passes through the Cascade range of mountains.

The articles of incorporation filed by the company show its capital at \$500,000, and its incorporators as G. A. Kyle, A. L. McCloud and J. F. Mounts. Kyle is the engineer who built the North Bank road for Hill, and McCloud but a short while ago built one of the largest bridges in the world for the Hill system. McNary is the attorney for the Hill lines here.
