The magnificent country home of Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer of Great Britain, was badly damaged by a suffragette bomb. In the illustration the result is partly shown in two broken windows. The chancellor had just built this home at Walton on Hill, and intended to occupy it soon. There was no one within at the time of the attack, else the consequence of the explosion would have been greater. Lloyd George, being one of the most prominent members of the cabinet, has long been the object of attack by the militant suffragettes.

SAYS ARTICLE IS OVERDRAWN

WELL KNOWN KLAMATH RESIDENT SEES JOKE IN MORNING PAPER'S TALE OF THE FISH SNAUGHTER IN LOST RIVER

Editor Herald:

In regard to the fish story in Monday's Northwestern, the public should be protected in the future against such exaggerated fish stories coming from Lost River dam.

I lived at the dam until after fish season was over last year, and such a condition never existed. As to the hundreds of tons put over the dam last season, the fish warden with a couple of helpers were out for a few days, and lifted over some in barley sacks.

The fishing as it was last year was regarded as sport instead of slaughter. Men came there and fished with snare and line; some catching as high as fifteen and others only two or three.

As for the fish being used by the farmers for fertilizer, that's a new joke on the farmers. The farmers should be interviewed as to whether it would be more profitable to lease the grounds for a fertilizer factory than for a summer hotel.

I would like to have the informant publish the law under which he exercises his authority in prohibiting fishing in Lost River. People respect legal authority, but object to assumed authority.

MUTUAL MILL TO BE RUN SOON

LATEST SAWMILL ENTERPRISE NEAR CHILOQUIN WILL CUT FIFTY THOUSAND FEET OF LUMBER DAILY

(Special Correspondence)

CHILOQUIN, April 13.—The sawmill of the Mutual Milling company, which is being erected on Williamson River a mile and a half above Chiloquin, will be in operation in about thirty days. The company will obtain their timber from the unit purchased last fall from the interior department.

It will be necessary to drive the logs down Williamson River for a distance of about five miles, and men are now engaged in the work of river improvement.

The mill will have a daily capacity of about 50,000 feet. The logging will probably be done by contract.

W. B. Barnes spent a few hours in Chiloquin Saturday on business in connection with the sawmill of the Chiloquin Lumber company, of which he is a member.

The Indians are very busy these days getting in their summer's supply of Chewam of suckers. These much despised fish make an annual run up Sprague River to spawn.

The Indians "snake" them out with grappling hooks made of stiff wire. The fish are then drawn, split open and dried in the sun, and, according to the Indians, they are "skookum." A family will ordinarily catch three or four hundred in a day.

IRRIGATIONISTS SOUGHT BY U.S.

SALARY RANGES FROM \$1,000 TO \$2,500 ANNUALLY, DEPENDING UPON THE SIZE OF THE RECLAMATION PROJECT

The United States civil service commission announces an open competitive examination for irrigation managers and assistants, for men only. From the register of eligibles resulting from this examination certification will be made to fill vacancies in the position of irrigation manager at salaries ranging from \$1,000 to \$2,500 a year, and vacancies in the position of assistant manager at salaries ranging from \$1,500 to \$2,000 a year in the reclamation service, the salaries being dependent upon the size of the project and the individual qualifications, unless it is found to be in the interest of the service to fill any vacancy by reinstatement, transfer or promotion.

In determining the qualifications and fitness for these positions the following factors will be taken into consideration: (a) business ability, tact and fitness; (b) education with particular reference to that received in agricultural and technical schools; (c) experience in the responsible management of irrigation work; (d) experience in engineering or supervising clerical duties in connection with irrigation work, and (e) ability to prepare suitable reports.

At least three years' experience in the management of irrigation work or in engineering or clerical duties in connection with irrigation work is a prerequisite for consideration for this position.

Competitors will not be required to appear at any place for examination. Statements as to training, experience and fitness are accepted subject to verification.

Registers will be established for manager and assistant manager positions. Persons whose names are placed on the manager register will be eligible for appointment to the positions of manager and assistant manager on any projects. Those whose names are placed on the assistant manager register will be eligible for the position of assistant manager on any projects, and as manager on the smaller projects. Applicants should, therefore, state whether or not they desire to have their names considered for both registers.

Applicants must have reached their 25th year, but not their fiftieth birthday on the date of the examination. This examination is open to all men who are citizens of or owe allegiance to the United States and who meet the requirements.

The qualifications and fitness for this position will be determined by a board expert in irrigation affairs designated by the commission for this purpose.

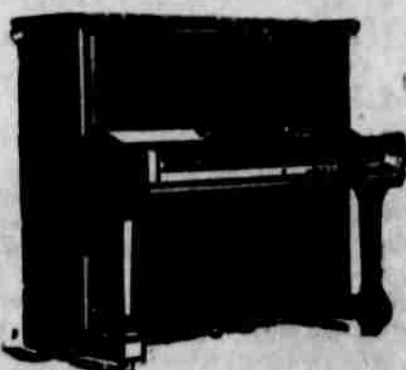
