popular lingerie material that is shar-

new voile linen, which is extremely
sheer and launders beautifully.

Combinations in all these materials
are most attractive cut on princess
lines, the seams being joined with
lace insertion or entre deux. Shown
in the new drop-off-the-shoulder ef-
fects they draw up with a ribbon

and over the bust; sometimes they

OFFICER BALKS AT LEGAL FEE

UNITED STATES MARSHAL CON-
VINCED THAT MERRILL MAN,
WHO PLEADED GUILTY, WAS
BUNKED BY HIS LAWYER

PORTLAND, April 19.—The un-
usual case of a federal officer pro-
testing against an attorney charging
an exorbitant fee was presented at
the federal building when United
States Marshal Leslie M. Scott told J.
Charley Reed, who had just been sen-
tenced to spend six months in the
county jail, that he had been bunked.

Reed, an ex-bartender of Merrill,
entered a plea of guilty to the charge
of sending obscene matter through
the mails. Boone Casey, his attorney,
didn't have a word to say during the
whole proceeding, it is said.

When Reed was arrested in Mon-
tana three weeks ago he had \$1,120,
and after sentence had been passed
Scott asked him what he wanted done
with the money. Reed said \$350
would have to come out for the attor-
ney, and Scott told him that it was
too much.

The marshal sent Reed with one of
the deputies to a bank, where it was
deposited.

CEMENT PLANT FOR GOLD HILL

COMPANY INCORPORATED, AND
MEN START CONSTRUCTION
WORK — SAMPLES INDICATE
BEST GRADE IN WEST

GOLD HILL, Ore., April 18.—Preliminary work upon the construction
of a \$50,000 cement plant on the
cement beds near Gold Hill have begun
by the Beaver Portland Cement com-
pany, an organization composed of
Portland and Medford men.

A crew of men are now at work
securing samples of the rock, and in-
stalling a water works to be used in
the conduct of the plant. It is ex-
pected that the plant will be com-
pleted and in operation by the 1st
of September.

Articles of incorporation for the
company have been filed at Medford,
and the formation of the company
has been under way since the first of
the year.

The cement deposits, according to
experts who have made tests of the
rock, is among the best in the coun-
try, and are suitable for heavy de-
velopment. When the factory is com-
pleted about 500 men will be em-
ployed.
