**WEEKLY SERMON**  
**The Soul's Commerce**  
 Rev. J. S. Stubblefield, Pastor First Presbyterian Church

"What shall a man give in exchange for his soul?"—Mark, 8:37.  
 Walter Bagot, in one of his essays, asks: "How can a soul be a merchant? What relations to an immortal being have the price of linseed, the fall of butter?"  
 This question was asked in a spirit of sarcasm; it was flung out as a kind of challenge. This question was answered by Jesus, however, nearly two thousand years ago. He teaches that the soul is vitally interested in commerce, that it is constantly engaged in giving and taking and bartering with men and things in the universe; that it may trade its eternal assets for "bread and pottage of lintels." In this trade, the question of profit is mentioned, and is more or less seriously considered.  
 Some people place a very small valuation upon the eternal assets of the soul and a very large valuation upon material things.  
 When the last word is spoken, every rational trade that is made is based upon our conception of value. Friendship, I know, is often a potent factor in closing a deal, but no more potent than the value we place upon friendship.  
 If we regard the friendship of man as more valuable than the friendship of God, then in all our barterings there will be noticeable a tendency to sell divine assets at a very low price, and but human assets at a very high price.  
 Custom is often a very powerful factor in bartering, but no more powerful than the value we place upon conformity to custom. The person who sells the sanctity of the Sabbath for a few hours of questionable pleasure, may speculate as he pleases about his reasons for doing so, but at the bottom he will find that the true reason is his conception of relative values. He traded the one for the other because down deep in his heart he regarded that which he sold less highly than that which he bought. He may later have discovered that he was deceived in what he bought, but that often happens in trades.  
 What we need is to have our eyes opened to the true value of spiritual things as compared with material things; to the true value of eternal things as compared to temporal things.  
 If we think that money has a supreme value, then we will trade everything else for cash. If we think the "Pearl of Great Price" has a supreme value, then we will trade all for it.
