TREAT SEEDS FOR POTATO BLIGHT

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE MAN TELLS HOW TO CONTROL LATE BLIGHT AND SAVE THE CROP

CORVALLIS, April 22.—"The general loss of a large part of the potato crop in the Western portion of the state due to the blight, or better, late blight, has given rise to the question of how best to control this pest another year," says L. D. Bailey, research assistant plant pathologist, at Oregon Agricultural College.

"Many inquiries have been coming into the department of plant pathology asking what seed treatment can be used. There is no practical seed treatment for the control of this fungus pest. Growers must select the seed with care, so that rotting or discolored potatoes are not used. Even then many tubers will be planted that carry the blight fungus in a dormant condition, ready to start infection of tops if warm moist weather prevails. The most that can be hoped for is to use seed that will germinate well. Later, if conditions are favorable for blight, it will be necessary to spray with Bordeaux mixture. Do not wait until the fungus has established itself in a field before spraying.

"The foliage should be kept well covered from the time the blossoms open, so that the spores, which are scattered by air currents, will be killed as soon as they fall on the leaves. Three applications at intervals of about two weeks have generally proven sufficient except in case of prolonged warm, moist weather. For the first use the 4-4-50 strength mixture, and for the second and later applications the 6-6-50 mixture.

"I would not wish to argue against seed treatment as a general practice, however, for we have several other diseases which can be largely controlled in this way. Use formalin, 1 pint in 30 gallons of water, and soak the potatoes in crates or sacks for two hours before cutting, then spread out to dry."

PASTOR SUED FOR \$30,000

REV. SMITH, WHOSE CASE IS TO BE TRIED SOON AT GRANTS PASS, WAS FORMERLY A KLAMATH FALLS PASTOR

GRANTS PASS, April 22.—One of the cases to come on to be heard in the present term of the circuit court is that of Alice Rogers vs. Rev. W. G. Smith.

Mrs. Rogers charges in her complaint that Mr. Smith on three separate occasions made remarks derogatory to her character, and she asks for damages of \$10,000 upon each count, or \$30,000 damages in all.

Rev. Smith is well known in Klamath Falls. Prior to going to Grants Pass he was pastor of the Presbyterian church in this city.

DORRIS SEES A NEW CREAMERY

ANOTHER IMPETUS IS TO BE GIVEN THE DAIRYING INDUSTRY IN BUTTE VALLEY—TO BE BUILT SOON

DORRIS, April 22.—A new creamery is to be started in the Butte Valley, according to announcement made by McGill & Carsley.

Mr. McGill has a large furniture store in Yreka, and it is his aim to dispose of this and immediately commence the erection of the creamery. Mr. Carsley at present has the McGill ranch near the postoffice of Oklahama rented, and has been in those parts sufficient to see that a first class creamery would be a paying proposition.

There are several who are under the impression that the creamery will be erected near Brownell, but it is very likely that Dorris will be the place finally chosen.

MEDFORD SEES NEW GAS PLANT

COAL BEDS NEAR ROGUE RIVER VALLEY METROPOLIS ARE TO BE USED IN GENERATING GAS FOR COMMERCIAL PURPOSES

MEDFORD, April 22.—A new gas plant will be operating in Medford to compete with the Oregon Gas and Electric company unless the efforts of the latter company to prevent competition are successful.

W. J. Hills and Dr. E. H. French are behind the deal. It has become known that the local company has asked the state railroad commission whether or not it could prevent the entrance of another competing corporation when they were losing money. It is not believed that the new company can be prevented from operating here if they so desire.

According to Mr. Hills there are a million tons of low grade coal already blocked out a few miles from the city, and each ton will yield 10,000 cubic feet of gas.

"By using this coal we can put dollar gas on the market," said Mr. Hills, "whereas the present price in Medford is from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per thousand."

DUMP GROUNDS CAUSE OF WAR

ASHLAND CITIZENS LIVING NEAR IT OBJECT TO ITS FURTHER USE BY THE CITY—MAY BUY LOTS

ASHLAND, April 22.—The dumping ground question bids fair to be one of the big ones which the present city council will have to solve.

Residents in the vicinity of the present grounds have been putting up a vigorous protest against the conditions of the ground for some time.

These conditions, according to all accounts, have been greatly bettered, but the residents are not yet satisfied.

They offer to purchase the tract for \$300 as it stands, or for \$400 if the garbage is removed.

The matter of a garbage creamatory has been discussed, and plans presented by the city engineer. The matter has been postponed to permit the obtaining of information from other cities regarding garbage disposal.
