PRES. WILSON WIRES AN APPEAL

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in California. They say the sentiment against the Japs is overwhelming on the Pacific coast.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 2.—President Wilson's final word in the anti-alien land bill pending in the California legislature is contained in a long telegram sent today to Governor Hiram Johnson and the presiding officers of the California legislature.

In part the message follows:
"I speak on the assumption that the people of California do not desire their representatives to embarrass the government of the United States in its dealings with a nation with whom we have most earnestly and cordially sought to maintain a friendship, and that least of all they desire to do anything that might impair the treaty obligations, or cast doubt upon the honor and good faith of the nation and government."
"Therefore, I appeal with the utmost confidence to the people, the

governor and the legislature of California to act in the matter now under consideration in a manner that cannot be fairly challenged.

"If they deem it necessary to exclude all aliens who have not declared their intentions of becoming citizens from land ownership, they can do so along lines already followed by laws in many other states and foreign countries, including Japan herself.

"Invidious discrimination will invariably draw into question the treaty obligations of the government of the United States. I register my very earnest protest against discrimination in this case."

SACRAMENTO, April 22.—In the senate today President Wilson's telegram was freely discussed.

Referring to the matter Senator Boynton said: "We are not discriminating against the Japanese or any other nation, and don't intend to. Nor will we do anything that is not done by other states. There is absolutely no reason to fear any international complications."

SACRAMENTO, April 22.—With at least three sets of amendments awaiting action on the assembly anti-alien land bill in the senate, on every one of which a bitter fight is expected, the floor leaders admit that it is impossible to state when the vote will be taken. Even should no more amendments crop up, the debates on those already mentioned may delay final action by the senate until the closing hours of the session.

Senators have remarked that Governor Johnson has been forced into the open by the state sentiment, and that he must sign any alien bill that may be passed.
