LARGEST CLASS TO FINISH SOON

IN ADDITION, 1915 SENIORS HAVE BEEN ACTIVE IN EVERY FORM OF SCHOOL WORK, ESPECIALLY ATHLETICS

The largest class in the history of the Klamath county high school will be graduated on the night of May 27, when diplomas are presented to twenty Seniors.

Officers and members of the class are: Robert Riggs, president; J. Hardin Carter, vice president; Anna Hales, secretary; J. Leveson Skelton, treasurer; Ernest Nail, Earl McCoy, Harry Galarnaux, Albert Jones, Harry Menner, Lester Boggs, Theodore Case, Hazel Summers, Jennie Applegate, Ines Elliott, Alla Bala, Evelyn Graves, Mattie Foster, Hazel Manning, Mayel Sanderson and Florence Ward.

In addition to being the largest class to graduate the local institution, the 1915 class, despite unlucky numerals, has been successful in every school activity. This is especially true in athletic circles.

In the Freshman year two of the members of the class made the high school baseball team, and four men, Riggs, Carter, Case and Skelton, were awarded "K's" this year for their football work.

Basketball, though, has been the favorite sport with the Seniors. In their Freshman year, they gave good attention to the rudiments of the game, with the result that in their Sophomore year the '13 basketball quintet won the school championship, defeating every other class.

As Juniors this winning streak was kept up, and five of the six men on the school's varsity last year were Juniors. This year Carter captained the team, and other seniors playing were Nail and Menner. Two of last year's players did not return to school this year.

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Casket Containing Remains of J. P. Morgan Being Carried From His Library to Hearse



One of the most impressive, though not the largest, funerals in New York was the burial of J. P. Morgan, great-uncle of modern financiers. His body, after arrival from Europe on the liner France, had been deposited in his library, the costly building on his grounds at Thirty-sixth street, and Madison avenue, where most of his treasures have been kept. Early on the morning of April 14 it was carried out by a solemn team of four black horses. The sexton of St. George church had first provided an automobile hearse, but that was so far in advance of tradition that the relatives objected, and the horse-drawn vehicle was substituted.

The police, who had been early on the scene, kept the crowds back from the library, around which several scores had gathered each day during the last week of the life of the great financier. After a simple service in St. George an Episcopal church, where some fifteen hundred of the best known in New York had seats, the body was taken to the New York, New Haven and Hartford depot, for burial in New Haven, the birth place of the financier.

SEPTEMBER MORN PINCHED AGAIN

FOLLOWING OPINION OF COMMODITY JURY AS TO NUDE STATUES IN ART WINDOWS, CITY LAW IS SOUGHT

CHICAGO, April 22.—Miss "September Morn," beautiful creature of Paul Chabais, the noted author and artist, who poses unadorned and unashamed, with her pink toes dabbling in the water, is in bad again—in Chicago. The city council wants the attractive maiden either to put on her clothes or stay out of store windows.

After "September Morn" had been "pinched" by Sergeant Jerry O'Connor, censor of morals and official art critic of the city, a jury composed of printers, professional men and bricklayers acquitted her on the ground that there was nothing improper about her posing in store windows.

Following the court verdict, Miss "September Morn" and all her nude sisters were displayed in the windows of a dozen art stores. The judiciary committee of the city council will recommend passage of an ordinance barring nude pictures from window displays in the future.

Horton of Buffalo is the "administration" candidate for president-general, backed by Mrs. Matthew T. Scott, the present head of the order, and most of the other officials. Mrs. Wm. Cumming Story of New York City is her opponent. Till eight years ago the Story faction, dubbed "conservatives," held power in the organization. Then along came

Mrs. Donald McLean of New York, who, as a "liberal" overthrew the old crowd. Since then Mrs. Story has struggled in the biennial conventions to regain power. Mrs. Story won a point when she presided as hostess at the breakfast recently given Mrs. Woodrow Wilson and wives of the cabinet officers. Mrs. McLean, who still seeks power in the organization, and who was the chief force behind Mrs. Scott, the present president-general, has broken away. She is now backing Mrs. Chas. Bryan of Tennessee, aided by a strong Southern following.
