## VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

Of the three countries in the world, China, with a population of 250,000,000; India, with 295,000,000; and Russia, with 140,000,000, have a greater population than the United States, at 95,000,000.

This great nation has grown up within two lifetimes. There is a man living at the present time in Washington, D. C., 95 years of age, whose father fought at the battle of Bunker Hill. That battle preceded the existence of America as a nation. Henry Cassaway Davis, when a tiny child, was present at the laying of the first tie of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad. The chief participant in the actual laying was Charles Carroll of Carrollton, who had signed the Declaration of Independence. Here are two instances in which two lives have covered the history of our nation.

Our growth has been due to matchless resources, stored by nature in the American continent, and awaiting the power of man for their transformation into results. The greatness of America therefore is accounted for by the accidents of location and opportunity. We can not claim that the results so far secured in the expansion of business have been due in any large measure to scientific or thorough use of resources and opportunities.

The twentieth century has brought us face to face with the fact that many of our resources are in danger of exhaustion, therefore the thought of today is strongly directed not merely towards efficiency in securing raw resources from the soil, but also efficiency in manufacturing and in marketing both at home and abroad. It is this effort towards efficiency that accounts for the rapid manufacturing development of the past few years and the increasing export trade.

The maintenance of such efficiency is to be secured only by recruiting from the younger elements those who are prepared for the life work. This gives the reason for the present widespread and persistent agitation in favor of vocational education. We can no longer depend upon the mere accident of immigration, or of resources easily utilized. The leadership which the United States should expect among the nations of the earth because of its natural advantages is to depend not upon accident but upon accident, but upon intention.

The aim of education must be to prepare each child for self support, and thus make every school of the nation a place for life preparation. This is the idea underlying the Page bill relative to federal attention to practical education of children, and it is also the underlying idea of every vocational attempt that is being made throughout the country.

## AGRICULTURAL EXAM OUTLINED

PLAN FOR FINAL EIGHTH GRADE EXAMINATION IN THIS SUBJECT IS ANNOUNCED BY THE SCHOOL OFFICIALS

The following plan for the final eighth grade examination in agriculture has been arranged by the department of public instruction:

1.—Twelve questions will be submitted, from which the pupils may choose ten.

2.—If the pupil has a garden or has done any creditable work in agriculture, the teacher may give 30 per cent for such work. In this case the pupil need answer only seven questions out of the twelve submitted.

3.—If a pupil fails low in this subject the county superintendent may add not more than 25 per cent for a creditable exhibit at a local, county or

state fair.

This notice is being sent through the county by County School Superintendent Fred Peterson. Eighth grade examinations for state certificates will be held May 8 and 9.

## OREGON SOLONS FIGHT FREE WOOL

BOTH ANNOUNCE THAT THEY WILL APPEAR BEFORE THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, BUT THEY WILL NOT BOLT CAUCUS

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 24.—Senators Chamberlain and Lane will avail themselves of the opportunity to go before the senate finance committee to give their views on the wool and sugar tariff. Both will urge an amendment to the house bill so as to provide a revenue-producing duty on sugar and wool, but will not oppose the democratic party program on the bill in the senate on final action.

## ASHLAND HAS INCUBATOR BABY

THE YOUNGEST AT ITS BIRTH WEIGHED SCARCELY TWO AND A HALF POUNDS—TINY GIRL IS NOW TWO WEEKS OLD

ASHLAND, April 24.—The tiniest mite of humanity probably ever born in Ashland is the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Perrine, which weighed at the time of its birth between 2 and 2½ pounds. The little one was born about two weeks ago, and although the mother's life was at one time despaired of, she is now getting along nicely.

The little one is also thriving, and the hospital authorities have high hopes of its growing to normal size and weight. At present it is being carefully cared for and artificial heat maintained with an electric stove.

## SPORTS of the WEEK

NEW YORK, April 24.—Already there is a lot of talk in baseball circles about training plans and antiseptic methods which may be inaugurated in 1915. The accident to Chance in the exhibition game with Brooklyn two days before the real opening, and injuries to Wagner and Fiskert of Pittsburgh on the eve of the big day, together with numerous other accidents to players of lesser fame, have made the managers think. They are wondering if the exhibition game is worth the candle after all. They frankly admit that heavy training expenses have made good exhibition dates look doubly good to them, but with minor league teams or cellar contenders in the opposite big league straining their heads off to make a "rep" by "beating the champs," the real wonder is that more such accidents don't occur. Then, too, managers have been too ready to take chances to fill exhibition engagements regardless of weather conditions. Witness the Brooklyn-Highlands affair, which was ushered in by a light fall of snow! Imagine what the temperature on such a day will do to a pitcher's salary arm, unless, perhaps, the pitcher hails from Greenland. The point is that exhibition games have begun to assume too much the proportions of the win-at-any-cost type. And it's a big question whether such chances ought to be taken when so much depends upon a rapid get-away.

Willie Ritchie has something more to worry about. Joe Rivers is the cause of it. The Mexican's work against Leach Cross entitles him to highest respect, and no small consideration as the logical next opponent for the champion. Ritchie is good, but he will do well to be very careful in preparing himself for Rivers.

If Ban Johnson carries through that scheme of his for making the games shorter and snappier, it will make a big hit with the fans, and a bigger hit with the patient or otherwise ones who wait supper at home. Johnson's plan is to have a new ball thrown in every time a batter knocks a foul, thus saving the minutes consumed in the catcher chasing the wide ones that don't go over the grand stand. Johnson suggests that two boys in uniform be employed to retrieve all such fouls. There will be no trouble getting and keeping such help. And no club will have to pay more than a million a minute for the work.

McGraw, according to the headlines, will retain Jim Thorpe. Of course he will. And that's no big surprise. Even if it takes Thorpe years to show where he belongs, he will probably be given the best chance a young man ever had to break in. McGraw is too much a believer in publicity not to work it for all it's worth. Then if Thorpe does turn out to be only an average player, McGraw will get 100 per cent out of his investment.

It remains to be seen whether the proposed rule regarding the suspension of players for profane and vicious language "without the formality of a hearing" is a good one. If it is a fragment of the censure, the

rule is good. But otherwise it gives the umpire too much power, for on the umpire's word alone a player could be ruled out with no possibility of a come-back. The rule is along the lines of making the greatest of games cleaner, but as suggested, it makes no provision for human frailty on the part of the umpire.

Up at South Bethlehem, Pa., they have chosen a captain of the Lehigh wrestling team. His name is Frank Gotch, a 140-pounder from Baltimore. There must be something in a name after all.

It seems to be generally conceded that the Yale team this season will

work was unusual for a college nine. The infield rose splendidly to several sensational occasions, and Gile pitched so well that the scouts have been closely watching his work ever since.

The staid old English sporting journals are saying that the turning down of the first challenge by Sir Thomas Lipton was the "most unmanly act in the history of yacht racing." Those are harsh words, stranger, and unwise, withal, for it conveys the impression that the stings of many former victories of Yankee sailors is still rankling. It is refreshing, however, to know that Sir Thomas, grand sportsman that he is, does not cherish any such opinions.

## "Fighting Jack" Eller a Hurdler



Policeman Jack Eller, winner of championship brackets as a hurdler in more than thirty races, is expected to be one of the stars in track athletics this season. He will run as usual under the colors of the Irish American Athletic Club of New York.

Once when chasing a crook through the streets of the East Side of New York, where his beat is, Eller was almost on his prey and about to make the capture when a tendon in his left leg gave way. Instead of giving up the chase, Eller hopped along on his right foot and went fast enough that way to make up the remaining distance and grab his quarry by a flying tackle from behind.

Another bit of bad sportsmanship being shown by the Britishers these days is the cry of "the world against Cambridge," which is being raised because so many honors which recently have come to Cambridge have been by American or Colonial Rhodes scholars. There are more Rhodes scholars on the Cambridge team this year than ever before.

Eller is a fighter, too, as the members of a certain gang of car barn thugs on his beat can testify. The hurdling cop had a habit of making these fellows "move along," and they had it in for him. One dark night Eller found the gang looking for trouble and bent on putting him where he would bother them no more. Eller believes in the tactics adopted by the Japs in their recent disturbance with Russia, so he sailed into the gang with his nightstick, hitting every head that showed. He had the satisfaction of helping pack four of his tormentors into the patrol wagon, and subsequently one of the gang spent four weeks in the hospital.
