Leavitt's Stand is Disputed

Editor Herald:

And now we have learned that Judge Leavitt has decided that Mrs. Zink, the socialist candidate for the city council from the Fourth ward, cannot go on the ticket, giving as his only reason that he has no authority to put her on the ballot. But the election laws of our state, Sec. 3333, does give the police judge just such authority. It fact, it makes it his official duty. The socialists have complied with that law in nominating Mrs. Zink, so it is up to the judge to make some further explanation. To be sure, she was nominated by a few working men and women, and their nominee is from the ranks of those who gain their livelihood in the old-fashioned manner, so I will admit it was somewhat "nervy" of those socialists to aspire to getting one of their own members on the city council. Can it be that the prospect of seeing a representative of the working class on the council for the next two years had anything to do with the judge's ruling? Let us hope not. It looks now as almost a certainty that had Mrs. Zink been allowed to go on the ballot she would have been elected. There are several of us who live in the Fourth ward, particularly the Mills addition, who think that our end of town has been step-motherly treated by our city fathers. We think that Mills addition has very little to show in the way of improvements for the taxes we have paid to the city. Happily we are among those of whom the poet said, "Man wants but little here below, nor wants that little long," but when even that little is not forthcoming we feel justified in doing a little kicking. We have a walk over to the depot built and paid for by our own people. It was intended to be three planks wide, but as lumber was scarce, only two were laid down at the time. Now a grown person can get along on such a walk very nicely, but Mills addition is noted, not only for its progressive people, but also for the number of babies, and their fond parents like to take them up town occasionally, in order to show their friends what splendid specimens of future citizens are growing up like the alfalfa in Mills addition. But anyone who has tried the experiment can testify that it is a nerve-shattering task to run a baby carriage on those two planks. I know of one baby at least, who has tumbled out more than once and landed in the barbed wire fence, because its father tired to do two things at the same time, viz.: push the baby

carriage and talk politics.

Now for the sake of the babies, we should have another plank on that walk, and I doubt not that our city council would devise ways and means to put it there if their attention was called to it by a wide-awake member.

The single taxers have gathered statistics by which they claim to prove that for each baby born in a community there is a corresponding increase in land value of from two to three hundred dollars. If that be true, the babies are an asset, and as such are entitled to some consideration, even by those whose chief ambition in life is to exist without doing any useful work or by trade in real estate.

One more thing we need: A macadamized road into the addition. Every spring there are periods of about two months when a load of wood cannot be hauled in here without miring down. This could be remedied with a few hundred dollars worth of crushed rock; but if there is no change in representatives at the next election it is a safe bet that we will have no more improvements in the next two years than we have had in the last two. For these reasons I think the election of Mrs. Zink is very much needed.

For the benefit of those poor unfortunates who do not know her, I will say that she is a lady of education and ability. She understands our economic questions thoroughly, has great force of character; and, if elected to the council the voters of the Fourth ward can feel sure that they have at least one live representative, who will voice the needs of her constituents, and the workers everywhere will know that they have one spokesman on the common council in Klamath Falls.

If it should develop that Judge Leavitt's decision is final; if he has the privilege to do as he sees fit, regardless of his duties and the law of the land, then I say it is up to the voters to take the matter in their own hands, for, after all, they are the masters of the situation, in spite of little judges. We have a law which provides that voters may write in the names of their choice if they think that their interests will not be properly looked after by those whose names are printed on the ballot, which law even Judge Leavitt cannot set aside. On every legal ballot there must be a vacant space for that purpose. This is your chance, men and women of the Fourth ward, and "a word to the wise is sufficient."

MINISTER TO PAY DAMAGES

FORMER KLAMATH FALLS PASTOR HAS JUDGMENT AGAINST HIM FOR \$500 AND COSTS OF THE ACTION

GRANTS PASS, April 24.—On the charge that he made slanderous remarks about a woman and attacked her character, Rev. W. G. Smith must pay \$500 damages. This is the amount allowed the woman by the jury.

The complainant in the case is Mrs. Alice Rogers. She made three spe-

cial charges of defamation of character against the divine, and asked \$10,000 for each count, or \$30,000 damages in all.

In addition to returning a judgment for \$500 in favor of the woman, the jury assessed the costs of the action to Smith. The case was tried in the Josephine county circuit court.

Rev. Smith is well known in Klamath Falls. Several years ago he was pastor of the First Presbyterian church.
