Microbes Found on Fly's Foot

One of the most interesting features in the Hall of Public Health which has just been opened in the American Museum of Natural History in New York, is the exhibition of the deadly effects of the common



house fly. In a photograph of a model in the exhibit innumerable microbes are seen on the foot. These are picked up and dropped on food or persons they may touch. In this illustration the bacteria carried are typhoid. The photograph was a 15000 enlargement of the foot.

A vivid representation of the fly's ability is shown by 100 little soldiers placed before a bottle in which there is a representation of a typhoid germ. Near by are signs and indications which drive home the lesson that of

The raids on restaurants and dance halls running all night without licenses in the White Light district, ordered by Mayor Gaynor, only revealed to the public the extent and daring of the dances. Nor were the performances engaged in by persons of little reputation alone. There could be seen on the floors of many of these places, among them the most costly restaurants in the world, men and women from homes of respectability.

They went through the same antics performed by denizens of the half world, against whom they brushed and jostled during the dance.

In fact, the dance halls of these expensive restaurants have been nightly the scene of mixed companies, out-of-town visitors, actresses, merchants and their wives and professionals who make their living on Broadway and side streets. If you still cling to the pompadour you are quite welcome, provided it is a soft flat one puffed out at the sides to give it a broad effect. The fluffy fringe is becoming to the average countenance and decidedly youthifying, but perhaps the most favored mode is the loosely undulated part pliantly bisecting the cranium well toward the left ear or more sedately choosing the middle course.

Aural appendages also are to be on the retired list this season. It's a blessing, after all, to have something under cover these days, if it's only a forehead and a couple of ears.

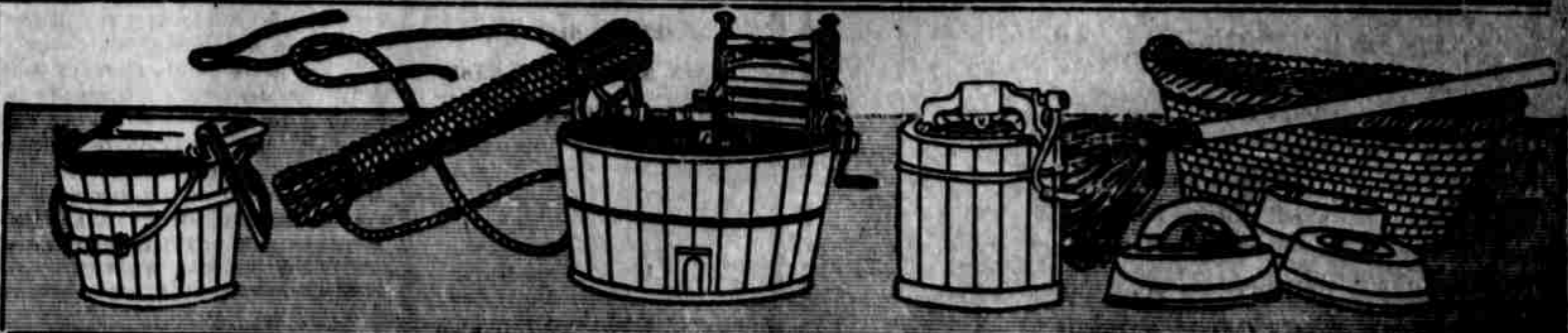
divers hair ornaments now so much in vogue. As if the casting off of all false hair from the 1913 head had necessitated a taking on of a substitute against the chill spring winds, tresses have given way to treasures. Jeweled baubles and pins are stuck into every cranny until your ultra-smart evening coiffure looks like a fully decorated Christmas tree.

If there is a lack of brilliancy inside your little noodle these days there's more than enough outside to make up for the deficiency. There simply is no limit to the ornate hair-dressing decorations except in your own originality, creative ability and daring. Jeweled pins beggar description, heavy with barbaric and semiprecious stones or fairylike in the delicate tracery of brilliant set in platinum. There are Oriental fillets set low on the forehead with a single jewel suspended tremblingly between the eyebrows, slender gold fillets finished with pearl Mercury wings in front, from which spring frail aligrettes and fillets of Greek key design sparkling with rhinestones. Scintillating butterflies and birds holding airy sprays of osprey; Paradise aligrettes and Numidic plumes breast the hirsute waves and gold and silver tissue turbans wound with

strands of pearls swathe demurely twisted braids. Glittering buckles of cut jet fasten fan-like ornaments of tulle, between rippling ondules and bizarre high back combs top masses of rebellious curls. Thus dazingly are the fashions brought to a head.

Lovely woman is still dotting her eyes. At least some of the most swaggy new veil meshes are sparsely sprinkled with dots of chenille. The chief characteristic of the new veils is the adroitness of the meshes and the delicacy of the designs picked out in a single thread when an all-over effect is desired or in chenille for an elaborate border.

The craze for plating has at last reached to the accessory of the outdoor costume and not only are knife-pleated borders of picot edge lace attached to unpleated net, but actually all-over accordion pleated veils of chiffon are all the rage. For the motor veil this pleating is particularly successful, as it will not muss. The automobile veils are usually pleated lengthwise, so that when you untie them they will spring back in loose folds round the brim of your bonnet. The veils for street wear are more chic, with horizontal folds, and soft eyes gleam seductively from behind the pleated bars.
