SOMEbody has said that one may
determine the character of a
nation by the manner in which its
people treat the foreigner or stranger.
This may not always be the true test
of national character, but if one
wants to learn the social qualities of
a community he need but know how
the people thereof receive the
"stranger within the gates." If his
presence is unnoticed, and there are
none to greet him or show him
around the town, it may be safely
concluded that the people of that
community are selfish, unsocial and
lacking in those common courtesies
that make life more congenial and
enjoyable.

In the upbuilding of your home
town there should be a spirit of co-
operation in all the work that goes to
make the community better and lift
the people to higher ideals of life. Ev-
erything that combines to promote
the enjoyment of the social life of
the people ought to be cultivated and
ostered. Hence, whatever can be done
by every resident of the community to
create a spirit of good fellowship,
good cheer and good will should not
be overlooked.

Life in the country and small coun-
try town has been made a dreary ex-
istence to the newcomer because he
has failed to find any spirit of neigh-
borliness in the community; because
there has been none to make him
welcome in his new home. This is
especially true of the wife and daugh-
ters of the family of the newcomer.
The loneliness and wearing mono-
tony of isolated life in the country
has not only driven many a farmer's
wife to a state of gloom, but finally
sent her to the insane asylum. The
lack of social, entertainment and
amusement has driven the young peo-
ple from the country to the large
city, only to wear out their life in the
struggle for existence.

The world today needs nothing so
much as sunshine, kindness and good
cheer. Sunshine. How it dispels the
gloom from the discouraged heart
and sends new hope and fresh cour-
age to the disappointed one. Who-
ever bestows it makes life brighter
for all with whom he comes in con-
tact. Welcome the stranger within
your midst and greet him with a
smile of good cheer. Only he can
fully appreciate the warm grasp of
another who has been made to feel
the world's indifference and experi-
enced the loneliness of being a
stranger in a strange land with none
to bid him welcome. A greeting then
from a sympathetic heart is like a
ray of sunshine through a dark cloud,
and how far reaching its radiance
may be. Greet the stranger whom
you meet, and remember that when
you put sunshine in another's life you
put it into your own.

In every town the individual needs
to be awakened to the fact that he is
essentially a part of the community,
and as such it is his duty to serve the
community in order that his home
town may be made better for all. To
make the town and the community
better is a lofty aim. This means not
only the upbuilding of the material re-
sources, but the uplift and betterment
of every individual who resides there-
in. It should mean that each citizen

MILITANT SUFFS GET IN ON KING

ATTEMPT MADE TO ADDRESS THE
CROWDS WHILE ROYALTY RE-
VIEWS TROOPS—FUROR AL-
MOST A RIOT

LONDON, April 19.—In Hyde Park
today King George reviewed nine
battalions forming the Brigade of
Guards, which act as the sovereign's
personal bodyguard. The review,
which was witnessed by vast crowds,
was the largest military spectacle
seen in London since the coronation.
Militant suffragettes almost broke
up the review by attempting to ad-
dress the crowds while the king was
reviewing the Guards.

The jeers of the mob drowned out
the voices of the speakers, but they
persisted in trying to talk until they
were arrested.

The king, who is colonel in chief of
each regiment, rode to the parade
ground in a field marshal's uniform,
so as not to appear to be favoring any
particular regiment. The king was
escorted by a sovereign's guard of
Life Guards. Queen Mary, with
Princess Mary, drove in an open car-
riage, which was stationed at the
saluting base. Each regiment was
headed by its honorary colonel, the
Duke of Connaught leading the three
battalions of Grenadier Guards. Gen-
eral Lord William Seymour the three
Coldstream battalions. Field Marshal
Lord Methuen the two Scots Guard
battalions, and Field Marshal Earl
Roberts the Irish Guards.

CANNOT BUY INDIANS' CATTLE

KLAMATH MAN INDICTED ON
THIS CHARGE WILL BE TRIED,
FOLLOWING RULING BY THE
U. S. SUPREME COURT

PORTLAND, April 19.—That a
non-resident of the reservation may
not purchase cattle that have been
allotted to Indians by the government
was the substance of a decision of the
United States supreme court received
and just made public by United States
Attorney E. A. Johnson.

The decision came as a reversal on
a decision by Judge Bean of the local
United States district court, and al-
lows the government to go ahead and
prosecute men who have been in the
habit of trading with the Indian for
his government property something
of far less value, in some cases, for
liquor. The decision is a highly im-
portant one to Oregon federal prose-
cuting officers.

O. T. Anderson, a resident of
Klamath county, was indicted by the
federal grand jury last spring for
buying issued government cattle from
the Indians contrary to the statute
regulating the trade among the In-
dians of this stock.

His attorney filed a demurrer to
the indictment, and in the argument
this demurrer was sustained by Judge
Bean. John McCourt, then United
States attorney, certified the matter
direct to the United States supreme
court, and the recent decision reverses
Judge Bean's ruling.

The government will now go ahead
with its case against Anderson.

The statute provides that the gov-
ernment purchase these cattle with
money received from the sales of In-
dian lands, and that the cattle be di-
vided among the Indians for their
benefit. The cattle are not, however,
to be sold to others than Indians who
reside on that reservation.
