DORRIS, April 28.—Assurances of
an experimental farm to be built and
conducted near this place is the item
at present that the people of Dorris
and the Butte Valley are heartily re-
joicing over.
The bill, which was passed favor-
ably by both the agricultural and the
ways and means committees last week
passed the senate, and now only the
stamp of approval by the assembly is
all that is needed to make it a law.
Unflinching efforts on the part of O.
E. Moore, Dorris' leading booster, is
the reason of the present situation,
and he is now more enthusiastic than
ever before over the probable and
possible outcome of his labors.
"It's a good thing," stated Mr.
Moore, "and will mean much for the
whole of Northern Klamath. I be-
lieve now that the federal govern-
ment will not hesitate in appropriat-
ing at least \$25,000, and in all we
can figure on a \$45,000 appropriation."
The farm is to join this city on the
south, and is to lay on either side of
the railroad. This is to give passen-
gers coming and going the benefit of
seeing for themselves the possibili-
ties of farming in these sections.

MEDFORD PLANS FOR A CANNERY

**TALKED OF ENTERPRISE WILL
BE AN AUXILIARY TO THE IRRIGATION
SCHEME NOW BEING
WORKED UP**

MEDFORD, April 28.—As an auxil-
iary to the irrigation movement,
plans were formulated here at a
meeting of members of the Commer-
cial Club and the Merchants' Associa-
tion to secure a cannery factory in
the valley.
The merchants in the city will be
asked to subscribe \$2,000 and the
fruit growers will furnish \$5,000. A
committee was named to solicit sub-
scriptions from the merchants. It is
expected that the \$2,000 will be read-
ily secured.
As soon as this money is obtained a
mass meeting of ranchers will be
called, the outline of the proposed
cannery presented and the \$5,000 will
be loaned without interest to the pro-
posed association.
The cannery will be similar to the
one now operating at Payallup, Wash-
ington. Ranchers may subscribe for
stock at \$10 per share to any amount
but each subscriber will have but one
vote.

**LANE COUNTY FARM IS SCENE OF
PHENOMENON — CREVASSES
OPEN, FENCE POSTS ARE TORN
UP, TREES MOVED**

Eugene, April 28.—Mrs. M. F. E.

farm a mile and a half southwest of
Howe station, reports that one of her
fields is slipping down hill. She said:
She said: "I thought to myself
that this must feel as an earthquake
does."
When the children went for the

three distinct cracks in the ground on
the slope of a hill. The cracks, from
one to three feet deep, were filled
with water.
The next day it was apparent that
the surface of the field had sunk a
foot, and that the whole mass was
sliding, glacier like, to the north.
It slid under a fence and dragged
out the posts. It buried two newly
planted apple trees. Three fir trees
are moving north. At the foot of the
hill a two-foot cliff is formed by the
pressure.

GOVERNOR GOES AFTER OFFENDERS

**TELLS DISTRICT ATTORNEYS TO
ASSIST IN STOPPING WINEY
TRAFFIC ON THE OREGON RES-
ERVATION**

SALEM, April 28.—Governor West
is going after the bootleggers on the
Indian reservations in this state. He
has declared that he was going to see
they were cleaned out.
In the past the question has been
raised whether it was the duty of
the federal government or the state
to apprehend and prosecute persons
guilty of selling liquor to Indians on
their reservations. The responsibility
has been shifted first on the shoul-
ders of one and then the other, with
the result that it is said bootlegging
has thrived.
The question as to who should be
responsible was recently raised on the
Siletz reservation.
The governor looked up the mat-
ter and found that the state should
take just as active a hand as the gov-
ernment. Therefore he is writing to
district attorneys to get busy. The
matter will also be taken up with the
federal authorities, so there may be
co-operation.
But the governor says it is unneces-
sary and useless expense for the fed-
eral authorities to have to take cases
from distant reservations to Portland
for trial, when they could be tried so
well in the state courts close at hand.
There are five reservations in the
state, the Klamath, Siletz, Warm
Spring, Umatilla and Grande Ronde.

FRAT MEN SHOW AN IMPROVEMENT

**NON-FRATERNITY MAN SURPASSED
IN SCHOLASTIC WORK—WO-
MEN STUDENTS STILL HEAD
THE AVERAGES**

EUGENE, April 28.—Statistics of
scholastic standing mailed to the frater-
nities by the University of Oregon
register, when compared with the
same statistics for two previous years
show that the average range of schol-
arship at the university is increasing;
that the fraternity man is passing the
non-fraternity man in scholastic hon-
or, and is crowding the women stu-
dents for first places. Until this year
the average of all women's fraterni-
ties and organizations, as well as the
non-organized co-ed, have ranked en-
tirely above any of the records of the
men. This year the record shows
three fraternities and the men's dor-
mitory among the sororities.
For three years the women's dor-
mitory, Mary Spiller Hall, has held
the lead. This year Beth Reek leads
the sororities, and Beta Theta Pi
heads the list of men's fraternities.
The non-fraternity man in two years
has dropped from seventh to twelfth
on the list, but the non-fraternity
woman has maintained fourth place.
