DISTRICT CAN GET FREE BOOKS

NEW SCHOOL LEGISLATION, EN-
ACTED AT LAST SESSION, GOES
INTO EFFECT EARLY IN JUNE

"The matter of furnishing text
books free of charge to the pupils is
one thing that should receive con-
sideration at the next annual school
meeting in every school district," said
County School Superintendent Fred
Peterson today, in discussing school
laws soon to become effective.

The school laws recently enacted
by the legislature becomes effective
June 3, and it is during that month
that the annual school meetings and
elections will be held. Attention is
called by Mr. Peterson to the follow-
ing opinions of the district attorney
as to those eligible to vote at school
elections:

A taxpayer is one whose name ap-
pears on the tax roll now in process
of collection. Being on the roll for
the coming year does not qualify one
as a taxpayer.

A wife's interest in her husband's
property is not such as to qualify her
as a taxpayer, unless her name ap-
pears on the tax roll.

The new laws pertaining to school
matters that will become effective on
June 3d follow:

1.—Districts may, by a majority
vote, at a regularly called meeting,
authorize the school board to pur-
chase books and furnish them free of
charge to all pupils attending school
in the district.

2.—After September 1, 1915, all
persons applying for teachers' certifi-
cates must have completed two years'
work in an accredited high school and
attended a teachers' training class at
least six weeks. This act will not ap-
ply to teachers who have had six
months' experience prior to Septem-
ber, 1915.

3.—Provision is made for substi-
tuting a three weeks' summer school
for the annual institute. The county
superintendent shall, upon the peti-
tion of ten teachers, submit to the
teachers of his county the question of
whether or not such school shall be
held. All teachers in the county must
attend unless they have had at least
twenty-seven months' teaching experi-
ence, eight of which shall have been
in Oregon, or are graduates of an ac-
credited normal school, or the teach-
ers training class in an accredited
high school. When the teachers have
once voted for the summer school
thereafter such school shall be held
in lieu of the annual institute.

4.—Provision was made whereby

graduates of non-standard colleges
can take an examination for high
school certificates.

5.—Provides a penalty for persons
refusing to give the name and age of
all their children to the census taker.

6.—Hereafter all schools must
have regular fire drills and suitable
instruction relative to the danger
from fire.

7.—Hereafter all school districts
may provide for night schools.

There were several other laws of
minor importance passed during the
session of the Legislature, but they
will be printed in the new School
Laws and distributed before they go
into effect. None of the laws will go
into effect before June 3d, and any
action taken by a district, or by the
teachers of the county, will not be
legal, and any action taken before
that time will have to be taken again.
