REGISTRATION BILL EFFECTIVE

NEW MEASURES PROVIDING FOR
PERMANENT REGISTRATION,
ETC., CAUSING GREAT DEAL OF
MISUNDERSTANDING

Between the new registration law
passed by the last legislature and the
granting of the franchise to women,
it seems there will be no end of com-
plications that will arise to puzzle
county and state officials.

The new registration law, which
goes into effect in June, provides that
registration shall begin at once.

Under it the registrations are to be
permanent as long as the registered
one votes every two years. In case he
does not vote at a regular biennial
election he must register again.

Another law provides that a pre-
cinct must not have over 300 voters.
Now, with the addition of the women
voters a great many precincts will
have to be divided.

There wouldn't be any great bother
about that if the precincts could be
divided before the permanent regis-
tration begins; but they can't.

The new law says precinct bound-
aries must be fixed in December pre-
ceding a general election. That will
be next December.

HOTTEST DAY 73; COLDEST WAS 20

AVERAGE TEMPERATURE DURING
THE MONTH OF APRIL WAS
43.7 — PRECIPITATION LESS
THIS YEAR

The warmest registered by the
thermometer during the month of
April was 73 degrees, and the coldest
was 20, according to the meteorological
report prepared by Observer Albrecht
Oehler of the reclamation service.
The coldest night, Mr. Oehler avers,
was April 6th, when the mercury
went the lowest.

The precipitation this year was
1.05 inches. Last year for the same
month the precipitation was 1.50
inches.

A summary of the weather condi-
tions for April follows:

Temperature — Mean maximum,
56.3; mean minimum, 31.3; mean,
43.7; maximum, 73, on April 25; min-
imum, 20, on April 6.

Precipitation—Total, 1.05 inches;
snowfall 1 1/2 inches.
Days, clear, 7; partly cloudy, 13;
cloudy, 10.

OFFICERS CAN'T MAKE DONATIONS

RULING OF THE ATTORNEY GEN-
ERAL'S OFFICE MAKES IT UN-
LAWFUL FOR COUNTY OFFI-
CERS TO CONTRIBUTE

SALEM, May 1.—Assistant Atter-
ney General Van Winkle in an op-
inion holds that it would be unlawful
for any county officials to make do-
nations or contributions during their
terms in office.

The opinion was rendered at the re-
quest of George Bether, principal of
the grammar school of Toledo, who
declared that the county officials of
that county were declining to make
donations to certain organizations be-
cause of the corrupt practices act.

The assistant attorney general
holds that not only is it unlawful for
them to make donations while they
are candidates for office, but also dur-
ing their terms in office.

WILL FIGHT THE U.-O. REFERENDUM

STATE-WIDE CAMPAIGN TO BE
WAGED AGAINST PARKINSON'S
PLAN—SPEAKERS WILL STUMP
THE WHOLE STATE

PORTLAND, May 1.—A campaign
to defeat the referendum of the uni-
versity appropriation was outlined by
the executive committee of the Ore-
gon Higher Education league in the
office of the secretary, T. J. Golder.

As bodies that should be influenced
to support the campaign in support of
higher education there were men-
tioned the labor organizations, granges,
commercial clubs, boards of trade and
business men's associations in all the
cities and towns of Oregon.

Speakers will be provided to tour
the state, addressing the organiza-
tions mentioned.

The question as to whether the
league should condemn the holding of
a referendum election was not passed
on, the executive committee announc-
ing that "it refused to go on record
against holding a special election on
the subject of the university appropri-
ation, or any other question which
may be sought to be referred to the
people, preferring to leave that to the
individual judgment of every voter,
to pass upon its merits when asked to
sign petitions for the referendum or
initiative on any question."

WATER USERS WILL MEET JUNE 6

TWO AMENDMENTS CONCERNING
NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF
DIRECTORS WILL BE CONSID-
ERED THEN

A new manner of nominating can-
didates and electing directors is to
be considered at the annual meeting
of the Klamath Water Users Asso-
ciation, to be held Friday, June 6, at 8
o'clock, in the Houston opera house.

One of the amendments to be voted
on provides that votes shall be by
printed ballots. This also provides
that only electors at the polls in per-
son can vote, thus doing away with
proxies.

Another matter that is to be con-
sidered is the addition of a provision
that nominees for the office of direc-
tor or of the Water Users Association
file their petitions with the secretary
at least ten days before election.

These petitions are each to be signed
by ten members of the association.
An entire board of five directors is
to be elected at the coming meeting.
In addition President Abel Ady, who
is attending the conference in Wash-
ington, will make a detailed report,
and future plans of the organization
will be discussed.

Amundsen's Polar Journey to be Extremely Hazardous

After Leaving San Francisco in 1915, Discoverer of South Pole
Will Let His Polar Vessel, "Fram" be Frozen in the Arctic
Floes, and Drift Across Pole to Settle Controversies

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 1.—In
June, 1914, Captain Roald Amund-
sen, discoverer of the South Pole, will
leave San Francisco in his good ship
Fram on one of the most daring ex-
peditions man has ever attempted the
fates by taking. In an effort to pierce
the thousands of miles of frozen
wastes that lie across the North Pole
from American to European waters,
Amundsen will deliberately let his
vessel be frozen in the floes in the
northern Bering Straits, to drift
across the North Pole into the Euro-
pean Arctic regions, and then south-
ward until he reaches a climate that
will melt him loose from his icy pris-
on. For four years, until 1918, the
intrepid unraveller of the secrets of
the far south and north expects to be
ice-bound, isolated from the rest of
the world by the impassable floes that
have their birth in the land of per-
petual cold. And all that will con-
nect him with the civilized world that
he will have left behind him, the
world that has showered him with
great honors for the daring things he
has done, will be a wireless outfit,
high upon the mast of the Fram, that
day after day will send out its brief

log of progress. Whalers, prowling
through the ice-jetted waters, tramp-
ing a swift venture into the north,
may pick up the messages from the
air. On this slim chance does Amund-
sen hope to keep his whereabouts be-
fore the world.

The exact route of the ice floes
which sweep across the Arctic is be-
lieved to be along the coasts of Cana-
da and Alaska to the Asiatic coast.
There the great "ice continents" dis-
integrate to sweep southward, carry-
ing their heritage of winter as ice
bergs.

That this plan of drifting across
the Arctic sea is a possibility has
been proved by the wrecking of the
ill-fated Jeannette. This vessel sailed
from San Francisco in 1879. It was
crushed and sunk in the midst of the
Arctic ice in 1881, some of the wreck-
age being frozen near the surface.
The portions of the ship were carried
by the Polar drift past of across the
North Pole, through the Greenland
Sea and the Denmark Strait and on
down the east coast of Greenland. An-
other test of polar currents was made
about ten years ago by the late Ad-
miral Melville and Henry G. Bryant
of Philadelphia, who constructed
about fifty very strong canks, which
were designed to withstand the ter-

rific pressure of the ice. These canks
were numbered and dropped over-
board at various points in the Arctic
Ocean north of Bering Sea. Two of
them have since been recovered on
European shores, one having been
picked up on the coast of Iceland and
the other on the northern coast of
Norway.

No vessel in the world is better
constructed or better equipped for
such work than the Fram. She was
built to withstand great ice pressure,
and proved herself a magnificent ice
boat with Nansen in the Arctic as
long ago as 1893, and as recently as
1913 with Amundsen in the Antarctic.
During the course of the expedition
Captain Amundsen will have practi-
cally the same equipment and person-
nel that he had with him on his voy-
age to the South Pole, including the
redoubtable Lindstrom—the cook of
the South Polar party—who is the
only man who has sailed completely
around the American continents.

The expedition, if successful, will
be of immense value from a scientific
standpoint, for there are more than
a million square miles of the Arctic
as yet unexplored, and it is quite certain
that the vexed question of the "Polar
Continent" will be finally settled by
the voyage.
