Although the Rodeo is yet two months away, inquiries are being received, and the Elks' Lodge is in receipt of a number of requests for copies of the program. These are being sent by cowpunchers, bulldozers, rope spinners, riders and others who have started at the Pendleton Round-Up, Frontier Day in Cheyenne, the Salinas and Los Angeles Rodeos and other Wild West shows. They are all anxious to come here and compete, so there will be no end of good talent during the three big days.

In addition to the outside men, the local cowpunchers of Southern Oregon and Northern California are also figuring on getting in on the money, and nearly every ranch in the county is a miniature rodeo every day, with the boys riding broncos, cutting out cattle and practicing the bulldozing stunt, so aptly described as "the gentle art of throwing the bull." Many of the local boys were handicapped last year by being unfamiliar with many of the competitions, but now that they have the "meat" they are going to win, you can bet your chaps on that.

The stellar bucking attractions, of course, will be "Square Deal," "Cherry" and "White Pelican," Klamath county's aristocratic bucking horses, who have been the cause of much comment at the Los Angeles Rodeo and at the big show in Dallas, Texas. In addition, there will be at least a hundred more outlaws fresh from the range, to be used in the bucking competition, and in the wild horse races.

WASHINGTON, May 1.—President Wilson's decision to put sugar on the free list at the end of three years was sustained today by the house of representatives sitting as a committee of the whole.

By a vote of 186 to 88, the house defeated the Mann amendment to the tariff measure, proposing to strike the free sugar clause from the bill.

The senate's final word on the measure will be spoken tomorrow, come what may.

Reaction on the part of the progressive majority to get a steam roller into action today enabled the democrats to stave off for another twenty-four hours of action on the measure. There was a long wrangle when this became apparent.

Senator Thompson, the administration's floor leader, finally forced an agreement that there will be no further reconsideration. The matter was then set over until 11 o'clock tomorrow morning, with the understanding that a final and definite decision regarding the bill will be reached at that time.

There was no suggestion made on the floor that the pleas for delaying the final action were made at the request of Secretary Bryan, but it is well known that Wilson's ambassador has private conferences with the senators who fought for the delay.
