LAKE RANCH

"I am much pleased with the progress
that is being made on the reclama-
tion of the ranch, and I am so im-
bued with the spell of the Klamath
summer that I will return in a few
weeks with my family and remain
several months," said D. P. Doak, a
well known San Francisco architect,
just before his departure for the Bay
City Sunday.

Mr. Doak, who owns nearly 1,000
acres of land on the west side of Up-
per Lake, was here several days in-
specting the work being done there
under the supervision of James Doug-
las. Douglas has a dredge at work
digging a canal through the marshy
part of the ranch to the timber, and
this, in addition to furnishing an out-
let for the timber, will serve to drain
the marsh land.

BETTER TONE IN ENTIRE MARKET

HEAVY BEEVES A SCARCITY IN
THE MARKET, ACCORDING TO
RETURNS FROM PORTLAND
UNION STOCKYARDS

PORTLAND, May 5.—Receipts for
the past week were: Cattle, 1,130;
calves, 184; hogs, 2,570; sheep,
3,612; horses, 3.

Good trade in steers. Several loads
selling at \$5.20 with bulk from \$7.75
to \$8. Heavy beefs scarce with
quality good and better outlet.

Hogs took an upward turn the
early part of the week, and price
went back up to the \$9 mark. Cooler
weather, smaller receipts and deplet-
ed packing house pork products were
the causes of the reaction.

Better tone to sheep house trade,
a few more receipts, a bunch of fan-
cy ewes, were largely bought up at
\$6.25 "off the cars."

Lambs were \$7.25 and \$7 "off the
cars." Demand for mutton exceed-
ing supply.

RIGHT OF WAY IS NOW PICKED

OREGON EASTERN OFFICIAL VIS-
ITING BEND SAYS LOCATIONS
ARE SETTLED TO THE HARNEY
COUNTY LINE

BEND, Ore., May 5.—W. O. Gard-
ner, right of way agent of the Oregon
Eastern railway, which is building its
line westward from Vale to a connec-
tion with the Deschutes branch of the
O.-W. R. & N., spent Friday night
here. He left Saturday morning for
Lakeview.

While here Mr. Gardner stated that
the railway had made the final loca-
tion of its line 49.4 miles westward
from Dog Mountain, to which point
the contract has been let.

There was some trouble securing
right of way from a few land owners
west of Dog Mountain, but Mr. Gard-
ner stated that settlement had been
made with them, and that the road
now has its right of way located to
the Harney county line.
