## ASK WORDEN TO QUIT POSITION

tracting with and employing relatives of the members of the county court and certain firms and corporations at a financial loss to the county; unlawfully issuing and selling warrants of the county at a discount; carelessness and inefficiency in auditing bills against the county; accepting employment from corporations whose interests are opposed to the public interests and at far greater salaries than that paid by the county; inefficient and unsatisfactory service as a county judge; failure to get value received for money spent for roads, though petitioners are not opposed to good roads; lack of ability, as shown in the past, to expend future levies for

roads; inability to construct a new court house with economy and a due regard for cost, though petitioners are not opposed to the new court house and are indifferent as to its location, but only insist that it shall be built economically, and that its cost shall not be excessive, which the past actions of said officer indicate that he will not be able to do.

"And we further demand that if the said Wm. S. Worden does not, within five days after this petition is filed, resign said office, then you should order a special election to be held within twenty days in said county to determine whether the people will recall such officer.

"Said officer has held his office for more than six months preceding the commencement of the circulation of this petition, and no recall petition has been filed against said officer, nor any special recall election held against said officer during his term of office."

Mr. Hincks states that the work is hampered on account of the scarcity of labor. He says he can put eighty more teams to work, and give employment to a large number of men. When the work started it was the intention to employ Indian labor exclusively, but the Indians are unable to work and to give attention to their farms. Whether or not the main canal will be completed this year depends upon the supply of labor.

"In case the change in the location of the overflow dam across Sprague River is approved, work will be started on it in the fall, just as soon as the water goes down," said Hincks. "This dam is to be a concrete structure, 12 feet high and 250 feet in length. All of the structures in connection with the project are to be concrete, and all the fluming used will be of steel."

To the Stockholders of the Klamath Water Users Association: You are hereby notified that the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Klamath Water Users Association, which said annual meeting is for the purpose of electing a board of directors for the ensuing year, and the transaction of such other business as may regularly be brought before said meeting, has been called, and will be held in the Houston opera house in the city of Klamath Falls, Klamath county, state of Oregon, on Friday, the sixth (6) day of June, 1918, at the hour of 2 o'clock p. m.

You are further notified that at said annual meeting the following amendments to the By-Laws of the Klamath Water Users Association will be submitted for your acceptance or rejection, to-wit:

Be it Resolved by the Stockholders of the Klamath Water Users Association in Annual Meeting, That Section three (3) of Article five (5) of the by-laws of the Klamath Water Users Association be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 3.—Votes shall be by printed ballots designated as "Official Ballot," and be voted only by electors at the polls in person. The directors shall be inspectors of all elections.

Be it Resolved by the Stockholders of the Klamath Water Users Association in Annual Meeting, That the following section be and hereby is added to Article five (5) of the By-Laws of the Klamath Water Users Association, to be designated as Section four (4) of said Article.

Section 4.—Nominees for the office of Director shall file their petition signed by at least ten (10) qualified electors with the secretary at the office of the Association at least ten (10) days before the date of the annual election of directors. The Secretary shall thereafter prepare a list by Districts of all nominees so filed and have the same published as the official ballot for the said election. Claiming that the body of a person supposedly frozen to death is merely benumbed, Dr. August de Castellans Seymour has just announced he will lead a search for the explorer and his comrades who failed to come forth from the Antarctic wilderness. The Dorothea and R. F. Scott expedition has been organized for the purpose. For some years the doctor has made experiments with frogs, fish, rodents and cats and dogs to prove that extreme cold does not extinguish the spark of life. Scientific men have become so interested that on his arrival in the United States he was invited to deliver two lectures at Harvard and another to scientific men in Providence. He said he will leave for San Francisco this month, and expects to start for New Zealand in June. From that point his expedition will start.

range horses will be used. There will also be races between Elk heavyweights and Elk lightweights, the winners in each class to compete on the last day. There will be other free-for-all dashes, too.

The wild horse race will be given again this year. At a given signal the rider begins to saddle the wild horse, plottet him, and the man who succeeds in getting his untamed steed around the track first wins.

Steer riding will be another form of competition, and there will also be a bucking mule. For youngsters there will be a bucking pony.

The bulldogging this year will be done against time. The judges will hold a stopwatch from the start after the steer until the contestant has the bovine thrown.

The following conditions will govern the broncho riding:

"One-half of the contestants to ride the first day, one-half the second day. All riders qualifying to ride in the finals on the last day.

"Horses and riders to be drawn by the management. Each contestant to ride as often as the judges demand, and on any horse. All riding to be done with plain halter, one end of rope free.

"No bucking rolls, quirts or whips allowed. All riding to be done on slick saddles; no saddle fork over 15 inches.

"Rope shall not be knotted or wrapped around the rider's hand. Rider not to ride on rope or spurs. Hands shall not be changed on rein or rope. Pulling leather disqualifies. Free hand in air, so judges can see it.

"If rider desires to use right hand on halter shank, it might come up on right side of horse's neck; if the left hand, it must be on the left side of horse's neck.

"Everything the rider does from the time he starts until the judges order his horse picked up will be counted for or against him. The judges will order horses picked up by firing a revolver.

"Riders to wear chaps and spurs. Conditions will be added to the elimination and to the final if the management desires."

by Mr. Hogue as a solution to the reclamation of the swamp lands, but advised that experiments be made on a small scale at first, to demonstrate the value of the land. The representative of the government, who had charge of the work at the demonstration farm did not make a favorable report, but the land owners present, as well as Mr. Hogue, offered evidence to prove that the representative had made his report before he had continued his investigations far enough to demonstrate the productivity of the soil. Photographs were shown of good crops of grain grown on the government farm the following season after the representative had left.

The plan suggested by Mr. Hogue contemplates the lowering of the water on all of the land east of the railroad from five to six feet by means of a pumping system, and also the establishment of a pump at the mouth of the Van Brimmer ditch, to furnish water for the 3,500 acres under contract to the government.

Mr. Hogue stated that if no provision was made for flooding the lands after drained that they would soon be out. He suggested that several gates be placed in the railroad grade, so that water could easily be placed on the lands during the fall season.

One of the difficulties to be overcome is that of the alkali, but it is believed that by reducing the level of the lake five or six feet, and thus flooding the lands each season, that no trouble from this source will be experienced. It is claimed that if the water is only lowered a few feet, sub-irrigation will raise the alkali to the surface.

There will be about 25,000 acres affected, and it was suggested that Klamath and Siskiyou counties might be induced to build two highways through the marsh by throwing up dykes. This would also assist in the drainage, and the expense to the counties would be warranted by the increase in taxable property which would result.

"This land could be planted to grain for pasture, and three years would fully demonstrate the value of the land, and the owners would then be justified in a more comprehensive and expensive drainage and reclamation system, if they so desired."
