## SAYS 3 CENTS IS TOO MUCH

STATE FORESTER URGES TIMBER  
OWNERS TO JOIN LOCAL FIRE  
PATROL ORGANIZATIONS, NOT  
CONTRACT

SALEM, May 10.—The state board  
of forestry has placed its disapproval  
on the efforts of certain persons in  
Eastern Oregon to contract with tim-  
ber owners to patrol their timber  
holdings during the coming season  
for a price of \$5 a quarter section,  
which is equal to 3 cents an acre. The  
board estimates that the cost ought  
not exceed more than 1 cent an acre.  
By the provisions of a law passed  
by the last legislature all timber lands  
in the state must be patrolled during  
the fire danger season. The law pro-  
vides that every owner who does not  
live within one and a half miles of  
his timber land must provide a suf-  
ficient patrol for it, and in case of an  
owner's refusal or neglect to furnish  
a patrol the state forester is author-  
ized to provide one at a cost not to  
exceed 5 cents per acre per annum.

Much of the timber land in Eastern  
Oregon is leased for grazing purposes,  
but the presence of sheepherders or  
stock men is not considered by the  
state forester as adequate fire patrol.

In all counties where fire patrol  
associations are organized the state  
forester is urging all timber owners,  
big and little, to join the association.  
"Experience during the past four  
years has proven that association fire  
patrol systems provide the most effec-  
tive protection to timber lands at the  
smallest acreage cost," says State  
Forester Elliott in letters he is send-  
ing out to timber owners. He points  
out that the acreage cost will proba-  
bly be still further reduced because as  
a result of the fire patrol law, it seems  
certain that practically all timber  
land owners in the counties where or-  
ganizations exist will become mem-  
bers of the association and thus in-  
crease the acreage upon which the as-  
sessment may be levied. He states  
that owners joining these associa-  
tions thereby comply with the new  
law and secure an effectual patrol for  
their timber at a minimum cost.

In counties where patrol organiza-  
tions do not exist, the state forester  
is endeavoring to make arrangements  
with the larger timber owners to pa-  
trol, along with their own timber, the  
timber of the small owners at actual  
cost.
