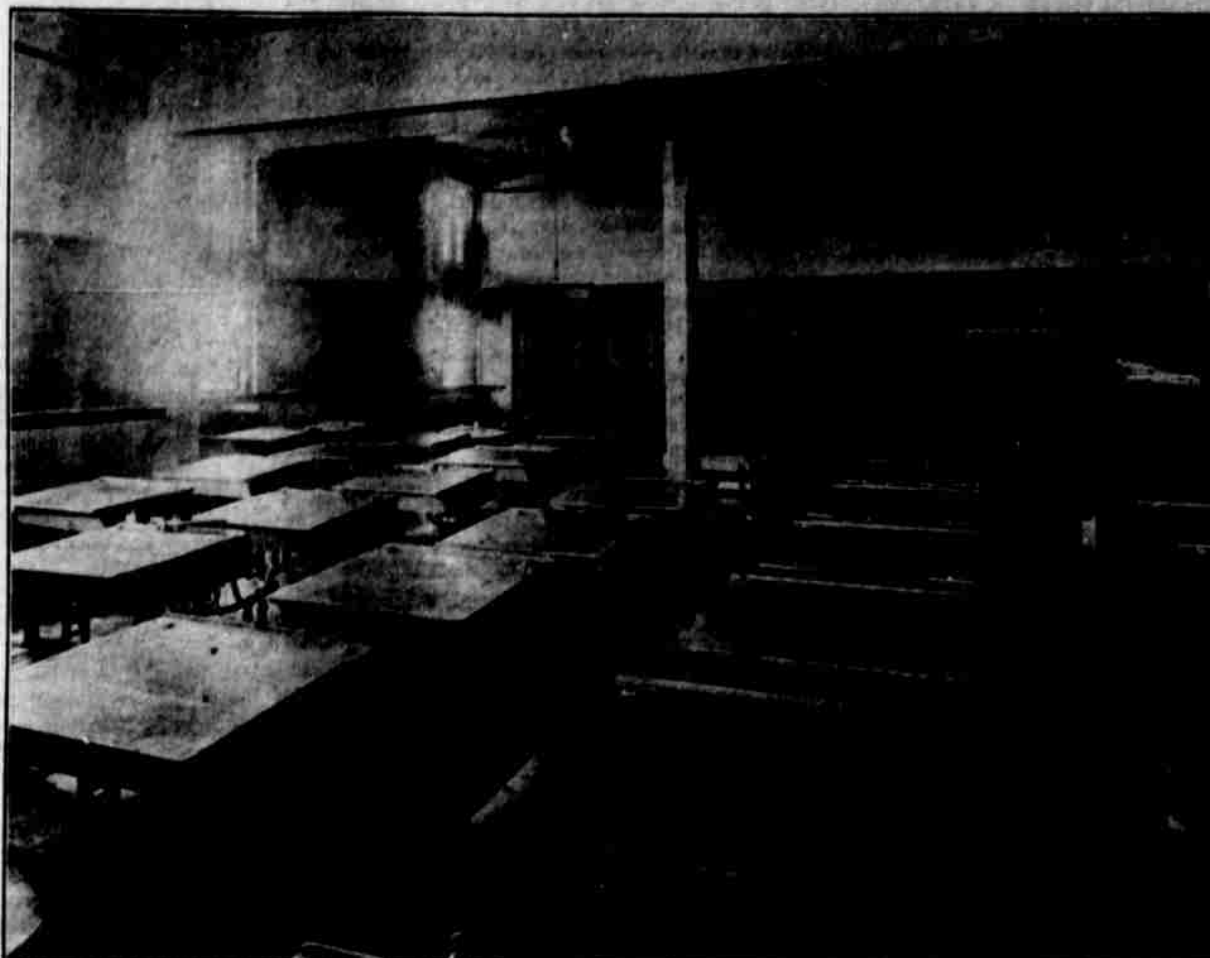

Modern Business Methods Taught in a Practical Manner at the Klamath County High School



A SECTION OF THE COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL

The first term of Klamath Falls' newest educational institution, the high school, is soon to close. E. L. Morrison, head of the commercial department of the Klamath county high school, states that there will be but a few more evenings of study.

But it will open again in the fall. The present term was started in the nature of an experiment, but so popular did the school prove itself with the young men and women of the city, who tolling through the day, wish to improve their chances for business success by applying their evenings to study, that it will be a permanent feature hereafter.

It is possible, too, that when the night school term opens again there will be added other courses. At present, the students going to school by lamplight take up shorthand, typewriting, penmanship and bookkeeping. Next year, in addition to the commercial course, it may be that students will be offered instructions in English literature and other high school branches.

In speaking of the night school, it might be stated that the Commercial department of the high school,

under E. L. Morrison, has made great strides during the year. The students all rejoice that he has been retained

for another term by the high school board.
His department is primarily for the purpose of instructing the student in

the ways and methods of the business world. In order to carry out this plan, the commercial room is conducted as a large office by the students and instructors, and systems used in the most successful offices are a part of the routine at the high school.

In addition to the office equipment, there is also a bank and a commission house, built by the manual training departments, and with these two features of the business world, the students get a far better insight into the work.

Mimeographs, an adding machine, letter presses, special forms and other office equipment are included in the equipment of the commercial department. The student is taught the use of these practical appliances early in the work of his course.

Then there is the shorthand part of the department. This word in the regular course is the last two years, and the phonographic amusements be-
comes a much studied text book.

The course of the study provides that a student, to be declared pro-
ficient in making "pot hooks" must

take down 100 words a minute from new matter, and be able to read the notes easily. So good have the students become at the high school that there are none of the second year stenographers who cannot take down more than 100 words a minute, while one pupil has a record of 175 words in sixty seconds from new matter.

In connection with the shorthand, typewriting is taken up. There are eight Underwood machines, and the touch system is taught. Sixty words a minute are pounded out by the em-
bryo stenographers.

The first year of the work in the commercial department is given over to penmanship and elementary book-keeping. All the usual forms used in bookkeeping are taken up in the first year, and some of the special forms.

The second year is given over to the study of advanced bookkeeping and office methods. This includes commission work, wholesale, cost accounting, banking and manufactur-
ing.

The last two years are devoted en-
tirely to stenography, the Ben Pitt-
man system of shorthand being used.

CHAPLAIN HAS A CHANGE OF HEART

GRANGE OFFICIAL, ONCE BITTER-
LY OPPOSED TO UNIVERSITY
APPROPRIATION, NOW FIGHT-
ING FOR REFERENDUM

EUGENE, Ore., May 10.—An indi-
cation of the reversal of sentiment
manifest in Oregon against any pro-
posal looking to keeping the two in-
stitutions of higher education em-
broiled in partisan politics, is seen
in the following letter written by Cyrus
H. Walker, chaplain of the Oregon
State Grange, who was formerly one
of the most uncompromising op-
ponents of an increase in appropri-
ations. Mr. Walker writes to Presi-
dent Campbell of the University of
Oregon, under date of Albany, Ore.:
"You can quote me as being op-
posed to a referendum against any
University of Oregon appropriations.
"I was conscientious in the part I
took in the referendum of 1905, cov-
ering the \$125,000 increase annual
maintenance fund, not that I op-
posed the university, but because
many of us thought the Oregon leg-
islature was getting too reckless and
extravagant in making appropri-
ations, and by 'log-rolling' methods.
"With a mileage basis to work
upon (as I hope will be endorsed by
the people), there should be no more
charges of 'graft.'
"I am inclined toward putting the
U. of O. and O. A. C. under one board
of regents, but not to consolidate at
Corvallis. With an electric line from
the above city to Eugene it would be
better for the state of Oregon to pay
the fare of students between the two
cities than to abandon the U. of O.'s
magnificent structures at Eugene;
that is, if duplication of studies is
'cut out' between the two.
"Albany and Eugene have shaken

hands over the separating chasm;
and, linked together now and to be
still more linked by bands of steel
over which will fly at a tremendous
pace swiftly moving cars, sped by the
forces of nature, there should be no
envious rivalry, but forever may
there be peace and good will."
