### MINIMUM WAGE BILL IN UTAH

MEASURE GOES INTO EFFECT TODAY—FIFTY-FOUR HOUR LAW HAS BEEN IN EFFECT THERE FOR SOME TIME

Salt Lake City, Utah, May 13.—After today no woman who works in the state will receive less than 90 cents a day; no girl worker will receive less than 75 cents per day, and no woman or girl will work over 54 hours a week. The minimum wage law passed by the last legislature went into effect today. The 54-hour law has been in effect some time. According to the new law a woman worker learning new work must be paid 90 cents daily; after six months'

apprenticeship this must be raised to at least \$1.25 daily. Girl apprentices must be paid 75 cents daily, and after six months must be paid at least 90 cents per day.

### RODEO AND FAIR CONCESSIONS IN

**COUNCIL GRANTS ALL RIGHTS TO USE THE STREETS FOR SHOWS, STANDS, ETC., TO BOTH ENTERPRISES**

All concession rights during the Elks' Rodeo, to be held July 4, 5 and 6, will be handled by the Rodeo Amusement association. The council last night voted to give the organization full control over these features, in order to assist the finances of the big carnival.

The council also granted to the county fair board all the concession rights during the fair. The fair will be held in the fall, and will be more in the nature of a street carnival this year.

**EVERYTHING BUT GARBAGE CANS MUST GO, IF SAVIDGE HAS HIS WAY—NO PROVISION FOR POLES**

revamped by City Attorney Rutenale, the members of the health board, and Councilmen Goeller, Melhase and Owens before the next meeting.

One of the principal reasons for changing the ordinance is to provide some specific method of compelling persons residing in a part of the town that is sewered to connect with the sewer. There are a number of violations of this ruling, and it is the intention of the council to force them to connect with the sewer mains at once.

The council and health department have served notices without limit on persons who have neglected to connect with the sewers, but these have but little effect. A little stronger persuasion is to be used when the nuisance ordinance goes through.

There is no provision in the city charter authorizing the livery stables to connect with the sewers. It is the plan, in the amending of the nuisance order, to provide for the installation of settlement tanks in the livery stables and dairies, so the liquid refuse can be sewered out of the city.

### POLICE SALARY GIVEN PRUNING

**FIFTEEN DOLLARS A MONTH CUT OFF THE MONTHLY WAGE OF KLAMATH FALLS PATROLMEN BY RESOLUTION**

Hereafter, the members of the Klamath Falls police department will receive \$35 a month, and the salary of Chief of Police Smith will be \$100 for the same length of service. A resolution to this effect, introduced at last night's meeting of the council by Councilman Savidge, was adopted.

Heretofore, Chief Smith has received \$115 a month. The former salary of the patrolmen was \$104 a month.

To Citizens of Klamath Falls:

Some few years ago it was the custom to cut and store ice from Lake Ewaia for consumption during the summer. This was at a time when the population of Klamath Falls was about 1,200 inhabitants, and at that time very few of the citizens paid any attention to the laws relating to hygiene. However, with the aid of the health officers at that time the matter was taken up by the city council, and steps were taken to prohibit the cutting for use in any manner ice from the lake. The reason for taking such a step was the fact that the ice was contaminated and unfit for use. To drink water that had ice in it subjected the person to the danger of contracting the most fatal diseases that mankind inherits, and to use it for refrigerator purposes or making ice cream, the moment any substance, such as milk, butter, meat, fish, fruit, vegetables, or any food, came in contact with it, it became contaminated.

We understand that, during the past winter, there was something over 300 tons of ice cut on the Upper Lake, between the Winema Landing and Shippington, which is now stored in Klamath Falls, and will, no doubt, be offered for consumption by the public for a consideration. We feel safe in saying that there is not a citizen in Klamath Falls who would willingly drink the Upper Lake water after they had an opportunity to see the dead fish and decayed vegetable matter in the lake that a casual observer could see any day in the year, not saying anything about the seepage and sewage of Shippington, and sewage from house boats and steamers that were inhabited and located along the lake above and below Shippington, nor saying anything about the toilets built over the lake or close to the lake shore.

This letter is written with two objects in view. First, to protect the newcomer, as the old residents are thoroughly familiar with the deadly effect of lake ice; second, we invested nearly thirty thousand (\$30,000) dollars in a warehouse and ice plant some three years ago, knowing at the time it would be a losing proposition, as the season was short; but we expected a profit on our investment in a few years, or when Klamath Falls would be on the main line of the Southern Pacific Railroad company, but neither one of those conditions have arrived as yet; therefore, we are running a business that barely pays expenses, not counting any interest whatsoever on our investment.

Now, in order to protect the public, and especially the children, we are going to furnish to all dealers in ice cream, milk, butter, meat, drinks of all kinds and all foods, who handle exclusively pure artificial ice a large card, to be hung up in their respective places of business, which will be a guarantee to the public.

We have just received a large variety of Refrigerators, which will be sold at a fraction over cost. On June 15 we will furnish our ice delivery men Coupon Books, running from \$1 up to \$20, which will be sold at a 5 per cent discount for cash.
