TO INVESTIGATE ORINDALE PLAN

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE NAMES COMMITTEE TO LOOK INTO THE METHODS USED IN SELLING LOCAL LOTS

To ascertain what representations are made to prospective property owners in Portland and vicinity, and in the middle western states, by the Oregon Inland Development company, owning Orindale addition, the Chamber of Commerce, last night, named R. E. Smith, George J. Walton and R. H. Dunbar as an investigating committee.

This property is four miles from Klamath Falls, over a couple of hills. The fact that it is said to be selling for from \$200 to \$250 a lot in the middle west, and none of the property is sold locally, has caused local people to become suspicious.

been treachery inside the office. Although Daniels insists that the matter is trivial, he has ordered the secret service to spare no expense in catching the thief.

Officials of the navy and war departments emphatically deny any connection between the disappearance of the plans and the Japanese agitation. They point to the fact that the first theft occurred in March before the California measure came into prominence.

It is held by the naval heads that the plans are of no value. This is discredited on account of the search that is being made.

It is believed that the plans were taken because they explained in detail the electric wiring furnishing the secret of the Pennsylvania's wonderful system of fire control.

dairy, and getting into a field of alfalfa, died of blast. The proprietor of the dairy says Williams agreed to take the carcass away for the skin of the animal.

He stated in his testimony today that later in the day, as he was coming to town, he passed Williams. Williams told him that he had a part of the carcass in his wagon, which he had sold to Shippington people for chicken food.

The defense maintains that the meat from the diseased cow was dumped into the lake by Williams. This was brought out in the cross-examination of the owner of the dairy.

In the absence of Prosecuting Attorney Irwin, C. M. O'Neill appears for the state. The defense is conducted by Horace M. Manning.
