WILSON WARNS CONGRESS ON WAR SPEECHES

PRESIDENT AGAIN DISREGARDS A PRECEDENT

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WASHINGTON, May 21.—President Woodrow Wilson today disregarded precedent again when he expressed what might be called a censorship over the speeches made on the floor of congress.

Learning that Congressman Thos. Eaton of Mississippi intended to again discuss the Japanese question, Wilson summoned him for an interview.

The Mississippian was asked to avoid anything which might complicate the situation growing out of the Japanese protest, and to eliminate any portions of his speech that might inflame feeling against Japan.

This session agreed to do. A few weeks ago he gave a stirring talk on the Japanese settlement of California, and it was quoted all over the world.

Dr. H. W. Nowell Has Cancer Cure



BOSTON, May 21.—Dr. Howard W. Nowell of the Boston University Medical school treated 50 cancer victims at the Massachusetts Homeopathic hospital the other day, and within 96 hours those to whom operations had to be given to alleviate their sufferings were so improved that they no longer suffered. He used a serum obtained from rabbits. While he insists that his work is only experimental, his announcement of the first three weeks of the treatment of patients has created a sensation in the medical world. Dr. Nowell repeats that he does not claim to have a cure for cancer, but he is undoubtedly making progress toward the discovery of one.

ONLY PROPERTY OWNERS TO VOTE ON BOND ISSUE

IMPORTANT ELECTION TO BE HELD MONDAY

Taxpayers of the City by Their Ballots Will Decide the Question of Bonding the Municipality's Outstanding Warrant Indebtedness and Doing Business on a Strictly Cash Basis

The property owners of Klamath Falls will have an opportunity to decide whether the city shall be placed on sound financial basis, or whether it will continue issuing depreciated warrants. A special election is to be held Monday to vote funding bonds to take up the outstanding warrants of the city.

Men and women who are property owners are entitled to vote at this election. The amount of bonds to be voted is \$75,000. The charter provides the following qualifications for voters:

"No person shall be entitled to vote at any special or general election within the city of Klamath Falls who is not a qualified elector of the state of Oregon, and who has not been a resident of the city of Klamath Falls for sixty (60) days next preceding such election, and who is not a resident of the ward in which he applies to vote, and who is not registered as hereinafter provided.

"No person shall vote at any election for the purpose of voting upon the creation of city indebtedness or the issuance of bonds of the city unless, in addition to the above requirements, he shall at the time of voting, be the owner of real property, or the bona fide owner of stock of a corporation owning real property within the city, subject to taxation."

SUFF BOMB HITS BIG OBSERVATORY

HOLE TORN IN SECOND FLOOR OF SCOTTISH STRUCTURE, BUT ASTRONOMICAL INSTRUMENTS UNHURT

EDINBURGH, May 21.—A bomb today damaged the Royal Observatory, near this city. A hole was torn through the second floor, and the east wall was considerably injured. None of the astronomical apparatus, most of it irreplaceable, was injured.

MEXICO AFTER BIG ADVANCE

CONGRESS APPROVES NEGOTIATIONS FOR A LOAN OF A HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS—FRENCH WILL ADVANCE SUM

MEXICO CITY, May 21.—Congress today sanctioned the proposed \$100,000,000 loan, bearing interest at 6 per cent.

The loan is guaranteed by the apportioning of 33 per cent of the customs receipts. The entire amount will be advanced by a syndicate of French bankers.

Steamers Bring Pests to California Ports

As a Result of Bringing in of Fruit Infected With Fly, a Steamer Captain is Under Arrest

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21.—Following the report by Federal District Attorney McNab that Oriental steamers bring in enough Mediterranean fly and other pests in rotten fruits to destroy the entire fruit crop of California, the federal grand jury today subpoenaed the captain, quartermaster and steward of the steamer Kores. They will appear before the inquisitorial body tomorrow.

McNab, in bringing the report, fore the grand jury, advised that the fly which was first brought to California from Korea.
Upon investigation, it was found to contain over 500 specimens of the pest.
"We must stop the steamer from coming here," McNab said. "We will stop it, if we can't find the captain and the other men of the ship."
