MAIL CARRIERS REPORT FIRES

FOREST FIRE DANGER TO BE MINIMIZED BY CO-OPERATION OF POSTOFFICE DEPARTMENT WITH FORESTERS

The official Postal Guide for May calls the attention of postmasters and rural carriers to an order of the postoffice department that the carriers report to the proper authorities all forest fires detected along their routes. This order was issued at the request of the secretary of agriculture.

For several years in some sections of the country a sort of informal understanding has existed between national forest rangers and mail carriers, with the idea of securing increased fire protection. The marked effectiveness of this co-operation was a strong argument in favor of its extension and official sanction, and in part responsible for the request of the secretary of agriculture, which resulted in the order by the postoffice department.

The plan is for the carrier to report a fire to the nearest forest officer on his route, or, if no officer lives on the route, to have him notified by some responsible citizen. State and national foresters are supplied with postroad maps and with postal guides containing the addresses of the different postmasters. The postmasters, in turn, are supplied by the foresters with the names, addresses and telephone call numbers of forest officers residing on or near the carriers' routes.

Those Demanding the Recall

You have had it dinned into your ears that those seeking the recall of Judge Worden are the same ones who contested the removal of the courthouse, the "three M's" or "Chronicle Kickers." Judge Worden is attempting to lead the people to believe that the recall is fostered in the interests of only two or three old residents, men of wealth. Worden does not discuss the merits of his administration, and seek to defend his acts, but is doing all in his power to lead the people away from the issue by maligning a few men whose contentions have long been settled. The new courthouse is assured. It will be built on the new site. The judge cannot defend himself by bringing up matters connected with the distant past. There is not a single individual in Klamath county who desires that the new courthouse be in any other location than it now is. The judge falsely and absurdly asserts that there are those who would tear down the building in its uncompleted condition, and put the building up on the old site. The judge is put to desperate straits for something with which to defend himself, and it being impossible to find the defense in his own acts, he thus invents falsehoods, and imputes malignant motives to men who no longer have any interest in a new courthouse other than to see it erected on the new site at the least possible cost, a good building considered to the taxpayers. Worden confesses his extravagance and mismanagement, and his lack of capacity to conduct properly the county business. At present Worden is the obstacle to progress in Klamath county, for he has plunged the county into an unreasonable and needless debt, increased taxes so that they are considered prohibitive by prospective immigrants, and still insists on preying on a discredited and debt-ridden county. Those behind the recall are thoughtful taxpayers throughout the county, a large proportion being young men and women who are struggling to make a start, and are confronted with an enormous county debt that must be lifted in the years to come.

The newcomer from the east is looking for cheap land; he does not expect to find much less pay for City Boulevard past the remote farming lands. He is here to make a start in an humble way, and does not expect nor seek the best modern improvements, because he is not able to pay for land adjacent thereto. It is true that good roads are attractive, but to the poor man high taxes are an insuperable barrier, considering his limited resources, and the otherwise undeveloped condition of the country. He cannot buy land, buy implements, improve his land, pay excessive taxes, frequently pay high interest rates on money and live all at the same time. The recall is being promoted by thoughtful people, who have the welfare of the county at heart. The issue is not any three men who are cursed and maligned by Worden because they have some money accumulated during many years of hardship in the early days of Klamath county, but the clear-cut issue is the incompetence, extravagance and lack of ability of Wm. S. Worden as county judge. His own acts have brought the storm of the recall upon him.
