SUPPRESSING TRUTH

At the time the recall campaign

any money. The Record now sup-

know the truth" is Worden's cam-
paign slogan. His extravagance and
mismanagement will not bear expo-
sure. Good citizens will resent this
unfair suppression, and will elect to

Where is the Lank, Hungry Frayed Ham of Yesteryear

NEW YORK, May 2.—Where is
the actor of yesterday; his whose
lean, harshly-lined face, shaggy locks
and extraordinary clothes have been
made familiar to us through decades
of presumably comic cartoons, in
which the scenic setting varied be-
tween stretches of lonely railroad
toes, street corners and free lunch
counters? What has become of the
tragedians, trajo-comedians, heavies
and character players, who at this
season of the year were wont to lend
a picturesque touch to that stretch
of Broadway between Thirty-fourth
and Forty-second streets, known as the
Haut?

The actors are here as usual—
thousands of them, fresh from more
or less successful ventures on the
road, but the most searching inspec-
tion of the throng that daily patrols
the Great Thespian Way fails to re-
veal a single specimen of the type of
player once so general. One looks a
vain for the saturnine face, the dig-
nified strut of assumed authority,
the imposing mane of dank hair; or
littens with equal facility to catch
the round, mellow, declamatory
speech in which the old-time player
always regaled his casual sidewalk
audience with self-impressions of his
own great talent or voiced his con-
tempt of the managerial hyenas. The
old-time player of the comic weekly
type may yet be known to some of
the rural communities, but his haunt
is no longer the Rialto. The great
wheel of change has turned a full
revolution in the past few years, and
the "ham actor" has spun from the
rim like a bit of mud from a muggy
wheel.

There are two causes for the dis-
appearance of this interesting and
once so widely known character; the
modernization of the drama with its
death blow to the verbose, super-sen-
timental romance and all the scarcely
human types of characters appertain-
ing thereto, and the advent of the
moving picture drama. These two
factors have been responsible for the
slow but sure demise of the cheap
melodrama. Your old-time player,
whose ill-starred ventures on tour so
often resulted in forced attempts to
emulate the example of Weston, the
champion cross-country walker,
thrived on romance and grew fat on
the lean salaries of melodrama. It
was nothing for him to mouth and
rant his murderous course through
Hamlet or Macbeth on Monday even-
ing, and follow it on Tuesday—don't
forget, ladies and gentlemen, on
Tuesday, and tell the neighbors—
with his inimitable impersonation of
the villainous nobleman in "East
Lynn," or perhaps as the title char-
acter in "Uncle Tom's Cabin." Those
were the days when playwrights gave
their character in "Uncle Tom's
Cabin." Those were the days when

such rare, rich lines as "Once aboard,

Editor Herald: The recall of
Judge Worden has been discussed
from many different points of view,
but perhaps the most important
phase of the matter has received lit-
tle consideration. I refer to the use
or the abuse of the recall privilege.
Some of us who worked for the en-
actment of the recall law felt that it
would be a good thing for the people,
but, whether it proves a blessing or
a curse, will depend upon how we use
it. If we use it rashly, or indiscreet-
ly, it will not only fail to be a bless-
ing, but it will be a curse, both to
us and to those who follow us. The
recall was never intended to be used
simply to multiply elections and im-
pose added burdens upon the people.

If Judge Worden had been elected
on a platform that proposed the
building of a new courthouse and the
construction of good roads, and then
had put forth no effort to carry out
his pledges, the recall would have
certainly been in order. But such is
certainly not the case. He has built
550 miles of good roads in this coun-
ty, and has worked at the construction
of the new courthouse as fast as
those who are opposing him would al-
low.

Or, if he had been elected to con-
struct good roads and build a court-
house, and had proven himself in-
competent to do the work, and, as a
result of his incompetency, had ac-
complished nothing, then the recall
would certainly have been in order.
But what he has accomplished speaks
for itself.

If, having been elected by a moral
and law-abiding people, he had pro-
ven himself immoral and favored law-
lessness, the recall by the better class
of people might have been in order.
But such is not the case. He has

never been accused of even immorality,
and has closed the Altamont Ter-

ed a revolution, and murdered him
as soon as they could.

JORDAN PREPARED FOR MAN TO MAN

MINIATURE OF UTILITY AND PRACTI-
CAL ADVICE GIVEN IN
LETTERS BY NOTED CALIFORNIA
EDUCATOR

"Your highest duty is to live in
such a way that your life will blend
perfectly into the career of the man
you ought to be, who is waiting for
you in 10 or 12 years to come. Make
him wise in your experience, happy
in your joys. Will you do this? Will
he never be given a chance to exist,
or will you make every rightful effort
to give him a chance when his time
comes, by living the proper life, and
taking advantage of the proper
training?"

This was the gist of the address
given by David Starr Jordan, cham-
berlain of Stanford university to the
graduating class of the Klamath
county high school last night. "The
Call for Young Men" was the subject,
and the discourse, teeming with val-
uable truths, held the rapt attention
of all.

Jordan held that the world's expec-
tation for the present population of
the earth is but 100 years, and he
pointed out the immense number of
things that must be accomplished in
the century, already 19 years gone.
Of these, he pointed to the necessity
of stopping war, which annually con-
sumes five billion of the eleven bil-
lion dollars in the world when there
is no war at all.

"In the ancient times," said the
speaker, "the civilized world covered
a small stretch of country, and the
world was considered large. Now,
however, with five continents, the
world, through the discoveries and
inventions of man, has become al-
most too small to allow one to get out
of sight. The world is more complex;
we come into contact with more peo-
ple."
