defection of the western men would mean a loss of four Democratic votes. This makes the Democratic majority in the upper house so close that it may be necessary for Vice President Marshall to cast the deciding vote when the bill comes up. Yet the situation has not cleared, and no definite statements may be made as to the final line up. Since the tariff discussion may go on during the summer there will likely be many changes before the bill goes to a third reading.

Senator Walsh notified Democratic members of the finance committee that, if an amendment is offered in the senate to put a duty on wool he will be compelled to vote for it, regardless of the attitude that the caucus may take.

RESTORATION TO ENTRY OF LANDS IN NATIONAL FOREST

Notice is hereby given that the lands described below, embracing 200 acres, within the Paulina national forest, Oregon, will be subject to settlement and entry under the provisions of the homestead laws of the United States and the act of June 11, 1906 (34 Stat., 223), at the United States land office at Lakeview, Oregon, on July 15, 1913. THE POOR FARM DEAL

Up to the time Judge Worden went in as county judge of Klamath county, the county owned and used a certain tract of land of 59 acres located about one and one-half miles west of Klamath Falls, as a poor farm. Without advertising for bids, and without revealing his purpose to the public, Judge Worden quietly sold this old poor farm and improvements thereon to his father, Chas. E. Worden, for the sum of approximately \$1,500. As soon as this deal became known, protests and complaints were heard, and several citizens expressed themselves as being able and willing to pay the county double the sum which was realized from the sale of the farm.

Shortly after he purchased the old poor farm, C. E. Worden sold 31 acres of the tract for the sum of \$4,000, that amount being represented by two lots, with houses thereon, and one vacant lot in the city of Klamath Falls of the estimated value of \$2,500, and notes to the amount of \$1,500, all of which have been paid except one for less than \$200. Judge Worden explained in his "Catalogue of Mistakes" at Merrill, that his father had bought the old poor farm, but that he had received merely a second-hand photograph and a note that was of no value. The party who purchased the 31 acres on which the improvements stand, was given an additional \$500 in value, consisting of chickens, hogs, wagons and two horses, and some farm implements. The present owner of the 31 acres of the old poor farm is holding the same at \$150 per acre.

After selling the old poor farm to his father, Judge Worden turns around and buys the present site of the new poor farm from his father, and pays therefor the sum of \$5,930.10, this part of the deal being consummated on April 24, 1911, warrant No. 22227.

It is unnecessary to comment on the advantage to Chas. E. Worden, gained by these deals which his son engineered as judge of Klamath county. The profit that Chas. E. Worden and the loss to Klamath county is approximately \$5,000. On account of this deal, the people who pay the taxes have simply entered into the employment of Chas. E. Worden to work out a debt of several thousand dollars, which he gained

JORDAN PLEADS FOR MAN TO BE

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ple daily than did our forefathers; we are called upon daily to make quick decisions that would have allowed careful consideration in other times, and we are continually in the midst of conflicting influences.

"The motto of our century, 'A straight line is the shortest distance between two points.' This is entirely too busy a time for procrastination or experiments—the man who is wanted is the man who will carry the 'Message to Garcia,' and we don't care who his parents were. America wants the man who can do, and this man will be found by the world."

"There is a beaten path from the American home to the university," said Jordan, "and any man with energy, courage and determination can win an education. The most valuable product of our democracy is the force and character of the American brain, and every young man and woman can make good in that respect here, especially in the west, as every effort is made to bring about the best mental development in the coming citizenship."

According to Jordan, American equality means the ability to go out in various lines of endeavor, with an equal amount of training. The difference, he held, is not in the profession, but in the spirit in which the work is carried on that means success.

"All are given an equal chance in America to make good, but there is bound to come a difference. It could never be expected that everybody will enjoy the same music, or will eat exactly the same viands for supper—why, even after death, some men require a bigger hole for burial than others, and get into it easier, too."

A plea for sufficient educational training for the young men was made by the speaker, who spoke of the inability to rise of the man not so equipped for life's struggles. In addition to dwelling on the mistake of taking the boy from the school too soon, he dwelt also on the fallacy of leaving the man too long in the classroom, after he has reached the point when he cannot work more industriously as a result of increased study.

The important role that the sober mind is to play in the work of the century was also dwelt upon forcibly

by the speaker. He also held that the good things in character, "the Sunday school virtues," have a distinct cash value to the career of a man, while the vices, or a lack of living up to the virtues, could be reckoned as a loss, even in dollars and cents.
