AUSTRALIANS TO PLAY IN CANADA

GAME AT VICTORIA, B. C., TODAY
IS THE FIRST OF A SERIES
THROUGHOUT CANADA AND
UNITED STATES

VICTORIA, B. C., May 29.—The Australian cricket team, which came to America to meet the crack teams of Canada and the United States, plays its first contest this afternoon against the local cricketers. After matches tomorrow and Saturday, the Australians leave here for matches at Edmonton, Prince Albert and Ottawa. The invaders expect to play in Philadelphia on June 20, 21, 22 and 23. According to the schedule announced here today, the Australians will play an all-American team in Philadelphia on July 4, 5 and 6, and another on Staten Island, New York, on August 1 and 2.

MERRILL COLTS TO PLAY HERE

COUNTY COMMISSIONER'S BASE-BALL AGGREGATION, VOWING VENGEANCE, WILL ENGAGE WITH ORPHANS

A return game between Merrill and Klamath Falls will be played here Sunday afternoon, when Guy Merrill's Colts come up from Merrill with the intention of administering a white-wash to the managerless local team. The game will be played at Modoc park, and will start promptly at 2:30. Two weeks ago Sunday, certain Klamath Falls ballplayers hied themselves toward Merrill town, and, when they returned, they were wearing the broad smile that only comes with victory. Reports from the field of battle, however, were to the effect that there was some tussle for nine complete innings.

Rumors have been coming to town occasionally that four Vorhater brothers, assisted by five or six other ballplayers, have been practicing daily in order to be in shape to slay Klamath Falls the drubbing Merrill thinks the team has coming to it. This has started the locals to nightly workouts.

Albert Robinson, Sensational Man



The sensational sprinting of young Albert Smalley Robinson, the student at Mercersburg academy, has been the wonder of the athletic world. He has just made 100 yards in 9 3-5 seconds, equaling the world's record.

Robinson came into the limelight this spring for the quarter mile he ran in the prep school championship at the University of Pennsylvania relay games on April 26. On this occasion, starting in the ruck, he stepped the full quarter in 48 3-5 seconds. The athletic experts were tipped off to watch his running, and a hundred watches agreed on his time at finish. Coach Jim Curran said: "This was the fifth quarter mile Robinson ever ran in his life. I have no hesitation in saying that the first time that Robinson trains for the quarter-mile it will be 'goodbye' to Maxey Long's record. I know this prediction will make the old-timers laugh, but so did my prediction after the Olympic tryouts last June that Ted Meredith would beat Mel Sheppard in the big race at Stockholm.

Speaking of the wonderful times credited to Robinson at the Pennsylvania state interscholastic games on May 3, Curran says: "He did both of the performances credited to him—namely, 9 3-5 seconds for 100 yards and 20 4-5 seconds for the 200. I timed him myself. The track was measured after the race, and found to be correct, but there was a slight wind in Robinson's favor—no more, though, than that which favored the runners in the 100-yard race at the University of Pennsylvania relay meet."

COLLEGE TEAMS ON FINAL GAMES

DECORATION DAY CONTENTS ON THREE DIAMONDS WILL DECIDE PRACTICALLY THREE CHAMPIONSHIPS

NEW YORK, May 29.—Three college baseball games of more than usual importance are scheduled for tomorrow—Decoration Day. Yale having about sewed up the inter-collegiate championship title, the game between Harvard and Brown at Soldiers' Field will decide the championship of New England universities, excepting, of course, the conquering Elms.

Harvard and Brown have clasped far above all other New England college except Yale, both having strong teams.

At Worcester Dartmouth will meet Holy Cross, in a game that will practically decide which team will follow Brown and Harvard in the final standing of the season.

The leader of the smaller New England colleges will be decided at Middletown, Conn., where Trinity plays Wesleyan.

ROSTER OF THE CHEESE CHAMPS

SPORT WRITER SAYS RITCHIE IS THE ONLY ONE OF THE PRESENT TITLE CLAIMANTS WHO IS A WORKER

NEW YORK, May 29.—When Battling Nelson coined the term "cheese champion" and hung it on Ad Wolgast, he said a mouthful and one that is enduring. In fact, quite a lot of our present champions are falling all over themselves in their efforts to grab a similar title, and to those not necessarily hypocritical, quite a few hunks of Herkimer are parading around the country calling themselves "Champeen."

We have before us the middle-weight class—Klaus, Papke, McGority, Gibbons. It is almost criminal libel to mention them in the same columns with Jack Dempsey, Tommy Ryan, Kid McCoy and the great Stanley Ketchel. Papke has a chicken heart, and the rest of the gang never did, and never will, belong.

Of the welterweights the least said the better. As a matter of fact, the caliber of the present-day 142-pounders is so poor that one seldom hears of a bout between boys of that weight. Joe Walcott, at his best, could have whipped a whole roomful at one sitting.

In the lightweight division, Willie Ritchie seems to be the present titleholder. He is a clean, clever boxer, has a punch and is game to the core, but he is not a Gans or Lavigne or a McAuliffe. He is young, and may some day become as great as his predecessors, but thousands of fight fans are from Missouri.

The leader in the featherweight class is the nearest approach to a piece of cheese. He won a doubtful title from Abe Atlas when the latter was all in, and has not done anything since. Some fool critics have been nutty enough to refer to him as the "greatest featherweight of all time," but they probably never heard of George Dixon and Terry McGovern. Kilbane is merely a tricky tapper, and that lets him out.

Johnny Coulon, the bantam champion, ranks right up with Ritchie in point of merit as a champion, but he has never been within sight of the popularity or greatness of the peerless and undefeated Jimmy Barry, the "Pocket Hercules." Barry never dodged a fight in his entire career, and even sought matches with his most dangerous rivals, instead of picking the soft ones, as Coulon is doing.

Take these two lads home with you and compare them: Dempsey-Klaus; Joe Walcott-take-your-pick; Joe Gans-Willie Ritchie; Terry McGovern-Johnny Kilbane; Jimmy Barry-Johnny Coulon.

There isn't any explanation for the baseball upheaval during May. It just happened. For instance, can anyone explain how the Giants skidded clear down into the second division? Why Pittsburgh, a dead sore winner in March, and pretty sure to be a contender for the gonfalon (meaning pennant) before October, should sink deep among the runners-up? Then there are the Dodgers, former cellar or near-cellar occupants, now right up in the running.

In the American league Connie Mack has done about as expected, but no one is explaining why the Boston Red Sox spent May in the second division. Cleveland fans explain the showing of the Naps, who gripped second place during the month, in one word, "Birmy." Joe Birmingham has taken the team with which Harry Davis failed, and made it look like a world-beater. Clark Griffith has kept his Nationals going at the speed they showed last year, but Detroit is deep in the rut. The St. Louis Browns have shown flashes of class, and with Stoval reinstated as manager, should make real trouble for some of the others. And pin this in your hat. Tears and flowers are not yet in order for Frank Chance and the Yanks. Just give 'em time.

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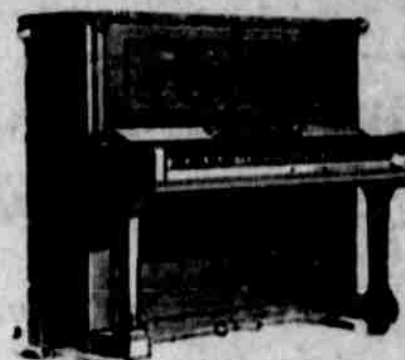
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
