the United States government. Ken-  
yon Cox, the artist to whom was  
given the work of designing the bill,  
had many candidates for the Goddess  
of Plenty, but he chose the little  
Texas girl. Miss James is an artist  
herself, being a student of sculpture  
in the Students' Art league of New  
York city.

## WORDEN'S EXTRAVAGANCE

The chair in which W. S. Worden,  
the \$83 per month servant (?) of the  
people of Klamath county sits while  
exercising his love of display, was  
bought shortly after Worden went  
into office at a cost of \$60. And the  
table over which some \$800,000 of  
the people's money has been dis-  
persed by Worden cost around \$150.  
The county may need an auto truck,  
but not a second-hand truck at a  
cost of \$4250 and freight. A light  
wagon for the poor farm cost the  
sum of \$362.38. The county has paid  
hundreds of dollars for auto and liv-  
ery hire, yet the county has four  
wagons, and horses as well. To il-  
lustrate: Four auto trips, June 26,  
27 and 28, cost the county \$107.50;  
trip to Adams ranch, \$37; trip to  
Merrill, \$14.50; trip to Bonanza,  
nine hours, \$26; trip to Ft. Klamath,  
14 hours, \$40. The county has  
paid \$866 for an oil sprinkler it has  
never used. The county has entered  
into partnership with the California-  
Oregon Power company in the own-  
ership of a well-drilling outfit. The  
California-Oregon Power company  
uses the machine in putting down its  
wells for water supply in Klamath  
Falls. The county has a \$2,000 well  
at the poor farm, and no water in  
it, and \$850 invested in a useless  
well drill. Three hundred dollars  
was paid for a motorcycle for the  
county agriculturist. County com-  
missioners draw \$4 per day while  
court is in session; almost continuous  
session has been the rule during the  
Worden regime up to the time of the  
recall agitation. On many days the  
only business transacted by the court  
was the allowance of one small bill.  
On one occasion the bill was for the  
sum of \$11.25, and at another meet-  
ing the only business transacted was  
to allow a bill for \$12. By this sys-  
tem of continuous and excruciating  
session S. T. Summers drew the sum  
of \$2,064 as salary for his two-year  
period, and Guy Merrill \$1,530. "Ex-  
penses and mileage" for the county  
court in the same two years is an  
added item of \$1,476.78. Three law  
firms were paid a total of \$6377,  
when \$1,000 to \$1,500 would have  
placed at the disposal of the court  
the time and best talent of the legal  
profession in Klamath Falls. The  
sum of \$6,129 was simply given to  
the Northwest Steel company merely  
to get the steel a few weeks earlier.  
Winter and the steel arrived at the  
same time, and the crew on the con-  
struction work paid by the day stood  
around and shivered, and slapped  
their hands to keep from freezing  
until John Hagelstein, who succeeded  
Summers as commissioner, went into  
office and stopped this foolish waste.  
Worden, in his official capacity,  
traded poor farms with his father to  
the loss to the county of several  
thousand dollars. (See full account  
elsewhere.) Culvert steel of the same  
quality as that purchased by Lake  
county cost this county nearly 30 per  
cent more. (See report of grand jury  
in Taxpayers' Record.) Worden sold  
county warrants to the amount of  
over \$25,000; some of them at 5 per

cent and some at 10 per cent dis-  
count, thus losing thousands of dol-  
lar to the county besides violating  
the law. The cost of maintaining  
the poor farm for a period of 14  
months prior to the last report of the  
grand jury was \$12,930. The aver-  
age number of inmates was between  
seven and eight, making the cost of  
maintaining each inmate about \$180  
per month. The present cost of  
maintaining the poor farm averages  
\$660 per month. It cost the sum of  
\$27 to paint the machine of the poor  
farm, and put the lettering on it. The  
county has bought hundreds of dol-  
lars for somebody for some purpose,  
the bills not containing details; tents  
for road camps cost nearly \$1,200;  
tent stakes were bought at 15 cents  
each; a special attorney at \$50 per  
month was employed; by Worden  
when the services of the district at-  
torney were at his disposal; a sten-  
ographer at a salary of \$80 at first,  
and later at \$90 per month was em-  
ployed by Worden, this clerk's spe-  
cial duty being to stay around the  
office and tell callers that the judge  
was "not in" or "is at his ranch." The  
interest alone on the present county  
warrant debt amounts to about  
\$2,400 a month, or \$28,000 a year.  
The county cannot get anywhere near  
par value in service or material for  
its warrants, because the ones re-  
ceiving them cannot get anywhere  
near face value for them in the mar-  
ket. Thus the county is doubling  
losing simply because its credit has  
gone bad.

## Dr. van Dyke Chal- lenges his Church



Dr. Henry van Dyke, professor of  
literature at Princeton university,  
and long a prominent Presbyterian,  
challenged his church organization to  
"try a grown man" for what some  
members call heresy, rather than his  
son, who has just been ordained.

Young Tertius van Dyke and three  
other graduates of the Union Theo-  
logical seminary of New York, which  
has long had differences with the  
church, were ordained with Dr. Paul  
van Dyke, the uncle, and Dr. Henry  
van Dyke, the father, officiating.  
During the remarks of Dr. Paul van  
Dyke, tears streamed down the face  
of the father. In his address the lat-  
ter had this to say about charges of  
heresy:

"You know that a new attempt has  
been made lately in the Presbyterian  
church to exalt the letter above the  
spirit in judging of the fitness of men  
for the Christian pulpit. Four tree-  
hearted and devoted young men,  
among whom is my dear son, who is  
to be ordained tonight, have offered  
their lives to the service of Christ  
in the ministry. They have confessed  
their faith in God the Father as the  
almighty ruler of the universe; in the  
Holy Spirit speaking in the Bible as  
the supreme authority in matters of  
religion, and in Jesus Christ as the  
Divine Redeemer. But a protest has  
been made against their acceptance  
because they cannot give a literal af-  
firmation to certain test questions  
proposed by a theological inquirer.  
"The presbytery of New York has  
warmly welcomed the young men,  
and disregarded the protest. But it  
is being pushed in public and private,  
and the effort is made to produce a  
judgment that these young men are  
heretics, and that the church ought  
not to receive them as preachers of  
Christ.  
"Well, whatever comes of the pro-  
test, I wish to take my stand with  
these young men. They are my broth-  
ers in the faith. If they are unfit  
for the ministry I am unfit."

## TO START WORK ON DREWS CANAL

WATER FOR GOOSE LAKE VAL-  
LEY AGRICULTURE IS APPROVED  
FOR NEXT SUMMER, SAYS EN-  
GINEER

LAKEVIEW, May 25.—DUT is  
soon to fly on the South Drews can-  
nel. Such is the official information  
that comes from G. W. Rice, chief  
engineer of the Goose Lake Valley  
Irrigation company.

J. F. Hanson of the Hall Construc-  
tion company was awarded the con-  
tract some time ago for construction  
of that part of the work, but was not  
until last week instructed to begin.  
He is now making all preparations  
in the way of securing crews and  
buying feed and supplies to establish  
his construction camp.

He expects to start work on the  
upper end of the canal, and will  
probably be all in readiness to begin  
by June 1.

Inasmuch as water cannot be made  
available for this year, Mr. Hanson  
will devote the entire season to dig-  
ging the canal, but given positive as-  
surance that it will be in readiness  
for carrying water for next summer's  
crops.

There are about 14 miles of the  
South ditch, which leads from the  
mouth of Drews canyon to the state  
line. While the right of way over  
this division has nearly all been ad-  
justed, there remains some little dis-  
putations which probably have to be  
settled by condemnation proceedings,  
and hence work in no way will be  
retarded from this standpoint.

The Goose Lake Valley Irrigation  
company will have one of the finest  
projects in the county when com-  
pleted, and the 50,000 acres of land  
that it taps will open one of the rich-  
est and most promising farming sec-  
tions in the entire west.
