AS RESULT OF SMALL AD IN WEEKLY, H. P. GALARNEUX AND IOWA MAN ARRANGE DEAL FOR KLAMATH FARM

H. P. Galarneux has become a firm believer in The Klamath Republican as an advertising medium, as the result of a recent experience. Mr. Galarneux is the owner of a 320-acre ranch in the Klamath Basin, and, as he is leaving with his family for Sacramento soon, he desired to secure a tenant whom he could trust to improve the property. He was not particular whether he received any rental or not so that the taxes were paid and the place properly looked after.

He inserted a small ad in the Klamath Republican, and out of several inquiries he received a letter from George H. Johnson, a resident of Waterloo, Iowa, who had seen the advertisement in The Republican. As a result of the correspondence, Mr. Johnson came to Klamath Falls, and yesterday a deal was closed satisfactory to both parties.

Mr. Johnson has leased the 320-acre ranch for five years, with an option to buy at \$100 an acre, or \$25,000. In the meantime Mr. Johnson is to erect buildings and other permanent improvements on the place, and put the land under cultivation.

Strange Case of Poisoned Banker



MACON, Ga., May 25.—The strange case of B. Sanders Walker, the young banker and real estate man, who died a week after swallowing by accident a bichloride of mercury tablet, has excited physicians the world over. Many of them hold that his death could have been prevented, but the doctors who attended him told him from the beginning that it was only a matter of days when the poison would slog the kidneys, ultimately destroying them.

When Walker took the poison and began to feel the effects, he summoned the physicians and the poison was removed rapidly from the stomach.
Every known antidote has been used, the physicians applying their own skill, and that of the ablest men in the profession almost the country over.

The kidneys lost every function from the outset, and uraemic poison filled the system almost as completely as if no organ was left. Walker felt little pain, except at first, and was inclined to think lightly of the statement from his physicians when they told him he could not live. He disputed their assertions vigorously; in fact, for three days.

The immigration authorities at Ellis Island, New York, through which come into the United States nine-tenths of the foreigners seeking homes here, have jumped into another case like that of Mylius, the man accused of libeling King George, and Castro, the former dictator of Venezuela. They have stopped Axel Foss, a rich young Danish engineer and inventor, who came to the United States to study automobile construction with the purpose of returning and making use in Copenhagen of American ideas.

All this has been done on the eve of the appointment of a new commissioner general of immigration by President Wilson. The nomination of Anthony A. Caminetti of California to be immigration commissioner has just been sent to the senate.
