LAKE CO. WOOL SELLS AT 13C

FIRST BUY IS MADE BY McKENDREE, ACTING FOR SAN FRANCISCO FIRM—MANY OWNERS WILL HOLD CLIPS

LAKEVIEW, June 5.—Lake county stockmen are now busy with their sheep shearing. The work is being done at the several shearing corrals situated at different parts of the county, and some are having their flocks sheared along the foot hills, where they have the timber for shelter. The sheep in this county have all come through the winter, and shearing in good shape. The clip in Lake County will be something like 1,200,000 pounds, and of good quality.

There has been but little wool sold so far, but during the past ten days O. T. McKendree, representing E. H. Tryon of San Francisco, purchased the clips of S. B. Chandler, J. L. Lyons and J. F. Hanson, and last Wednesday he made a trip to Bly and contracted for the clips of E. E. Casebeer, Jas. Watts, Jas. Owens and Dan Chandler of Drews Valley, and the price paid was between 12½ and 13 cents.

The amounts purchased will reach the 160,000 pound mark. This wool is considered to be about the best, as the sheep were well fed during the winter and the fleece is much heavier than where the flocks were wintered on the desert.

The prices are not as satisfactory to the sheep men as they might be, but taking all things into consideration it is as high as the market will stand at present. Many sheep men say it is their intention to hold their wool in hopes of a better market.
