

REAM WILL WORK FOR BRANCH ROAD

**HIGHT OF WAY AGENT FOR HIGH-
WAY COMMISSION TO TAKE MAT-
TER UP IN SISKIYOU COUNTY
AS SOON AS POSSIBLE**

"If the people of Klamath county will guarantee to build a good road from the state line to Klamath Falls and beyond, I will recommend at once to the supervisors of Siskiyou county that they construct a good road from the California State highway to the Oregon state line from Weed or Ager, so it can continue to Klamath Falls," was the promise made today by Harry Ream, right of way agent of the California Highway commission, who is visiting this city.

Ream believes the California tourists will miss a great treat if they are not given an opportunity to visit Klamath county and see Crater Lake and other natural wonders. He says he is sure that at least half the travelers coming north on the California highway will come through this section, providing there is a good road.

"Klamath county can be depended upon to do her part in order to divert tourist traffic here from the California state highway," said County Judge Will S. Worden this afternoon. "It is assured that if Siskiyou builds a good road from the highway to the state line, Klamath county will continue northward with an equally good highway."

STOCKHOLM, June 6.—High officials of the Swedish police bureau are still suffering from near-nervous prostration on account of a ludicrous blunder in connection with the guarding of the two eldest sons of the crown prince, Prince Gustaf, aged 6, and Prince Sigvard, aged 5, during their recent visit in the country.

there has been labor on one side and capital on the other, the trial of Wood presents the reversed aspect of capital the defendant and labor the accuser. Facing justice with Wood are Frederick E. Atteaux, a Boston manufacturer of textile mill accessories, and Dennis Collins, a Cambridge dog fancier. The three men were indicted last August by a special grand jury called to investigate the matter shortly after John J. Breen, an undertaker of Lawrence, Mass., and school commissioner at the time, was found guilty of planting the dynamite, and was fined \$500 after he refused to take the stand in his own behalf.

Breen, who was found guilty of planting the dynamite on May 15, was the chief witness for the prosecution. It was during the critical time in the historic Lawrence strike that dynamite was "found" by the Lawrence police shortly after Joseph Ettor's arrest late in January. The cry was immediately raised that the textile strikers had brought it in to dynamite the mills and the court house. The dynamite was "found" on a tip from School Commissioner Breen, in the cobbler shop of Urbano di Prato, in the home of Joseph Asat and in some bushes near the Immaculate Conception cemetery.

ATTEMPTS TO KILL HIMSELF

**FOLLOWING PERIOD OF INEBRI-
ATION, MAN PLACES PISTOL TO
HEAD AND PULLS THE TRIG-
GER—HE WILL LIVE**

Despondent as a result of a recent intoxication, John Cabbler, long a resident of this section, placed the muzzle of a revolver behind his ear late Thursday afternoon, and pulled the trigger. By one of the freaks so often noticed in trajectory, the bullet, which entered Cabbler's head just behind the right ear, came out just in front of the ear, after traveling about three inches under the skin, without injuring the skull.

At the time he attempted his life, Cabbler was on a cot in the Midway stables. Apparently not affected he started out the front door of the stable. Hearing the shot, and seeing Cabbler with his head covered with blood, attaches of the stable attempted to restrain him from going on the street. The wounded man then struggled to get a chance to "finish the work."

Deputy Sheriff Brewbaker took Cabbler in charge, and his wound was dressed by Dr. Taylor. Later he was taken in charge by his brother, who has a ranch in the valley.
