GENTLEMEN—We, the undersigned legal voters and residents of Wood River Precinct, County of Klamath and State of Oregon, would respectfully petition that a liquor license be granted O. W. Engle, to sell, exchange or otherwise dispose of spirituous, mal or vinous liquors or fermented cider, in quantities of less than one gallon, on the premises commonly known and designated as the Hoyt Hotel, a bona fide hotel, having accommodations for fifty guests, and located and situate in the Town of Fort Klamath, in Wood River Precinct, County of Klamath, and State of Oregon; that said license be granted for a period of twelve months from and after the date of allowing the same; that said license authorize and permit the said O. W. Engle to operate the business in the hotel aforesaid for the time herein petitioned for. And each of us for himself says: That I have personally signed the foregoing petition and that my residence and voting precinct is correctly written after my name, and that I am and have been an actual resident of Wood River Precinct in Klamath County, State of Oregon, for a period of more than thirty days last past, before signing this petition.

An Ordinance Proposing and Declaring the Purpose of the Common Council to Improve Tenth Street, From Its Intersection With Main Street North to Prospect Street, By Grading and Macadamizing the Same to Conform to the Established Grade in Said City.

The City of Klamath Falls Ordains as follows:

Section 1.—That pursuant to a petition signed by more than ten freeholders of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and filed with the Police Judge thereof, and presented to the Common Council, having for its object the improvement of Tenth street in said city, from its intersection with Main street, north to Prospect street, including intersections by grading and macadamizing such portion of Tenth street to conform to the established grade in said city; and the Common Council deeming it expedient and necessary to so improve such portion of Tenth street, hereby declare the purpose to improve such portion of Tenth street by grading and macadamizing the same to conform to the established grade in said city, and in the work of such improvement a space or strip ten feet wide on each side of said Tenth street shall be prepared for parking and sidewalk construction. That the materials to be used in such improvements and the manner of construction shall be as follows:

- First: Second: Third: Fourth:

Such improvements to be made in accordance with the charter of said city and the plans and specifications prepared by the City Engineer for the said improvement and filed with the Police Judge of said city, such plans and specifications contain estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof, which is made part of this ordinance; such probable cost being in the sum of \$10,300.00; and such plans and specifications including said estimates and probable cost are hereby adopted.

Section 2.—That the time within which objections or remonstrances may be heard against said improvements shall be on or before the 30th day of June, 1913.

Section 3.—The boundaries within which the property lies that is benefited and to be assessed for the cost of said improvement, is all that property adjacent to said street, as far as improved, and within a line on each side of said street, as far as to be improved, distant to center of block from the property line on said street, and parallel thereto.

Devereux Milburn Who is Known as Daredevil Player



NEW YORK, June 10.—Devereux Milburn, rated as the best polo player in the world, says he is in shape to play against the English polo team in the international matches, in spite of the fact that he has twice missed death by a few inches in practice matches.

Milburn, who learned the game of polo while a student at Oxford University, is the most fearless rider ever seen in competition. He takes all kinds of chances, and twice this year has been thrown headlong from a galloping pony. His last escape was miraculous. He was thrown under his mount, which rolled over on him. In rising the frightened pony kicked him in the head and chest, but the blows were glancing ones, and he escaped serious injury.

Milburn's injuries are described as not being serious, but with the first match with the English team but a few days ahead, his chances of being

in the lineup are not promising. Milburn is badly needed by the American team, and if he doesn't play America's chances of winning will be materially lessened. His usual position has been at back, guarding the goal line, and it was at this post that his work helped win the international polo trophy in 1909.

Previous to Milburn's appearance on the polo horizon all players at back contented themselves with guarding the goal from attack. Milburn not only is capable of caring for the defensive end of the game, but is famous for a habit of leaving the goal unguarded at the crucial moment and dashing down the field to spur on the American attack. This policy is a dangerous one, and means the running of big risks, but through using it Milburn has turned many a defeat into victory.

If Milburn isn't able to play in the first match he will probably get in the second.

HANLEY RAPS RECLAMATION

BURNS MAN SAYS GOVERNMENT PLAN IS ALL WRONG—FOUNDERIOUS MACHINERY ON THE WRONG END

PORTLAND, June 10.—"Bill" Hanley of Burns believes that the government is spending a great deal more money in the prosecution of irrigation projects than would have to be spent were these projects carried out by private individuals who wanted to get the very best results for the least amount of capital.

"In the government reclamation service, we see a great big machine doing a lot of work directing a small force performing the actual work," said Mr. Hanley in his peculiar epigrammatic style.

"The big, expensive machine moves no dirt, but directs the efforts of a very insignificant machine. To obtain the best results the condition should be the reverse.

"The government is charging too much for watering the land. What's the use to break the poor devil of a landbuyer and settler before he gets started? He should be given a chance.

"The government asks \$50 for water that can be furnished for \$20 per acre, and \$100 for water that can be furnished for \$50. In my opinion the government irrigation projects should go into the hands of receivers and be trimmed down where they belong.

"We discussed the matter at the various banquets in central and eastern Oregon, on the trip just completed by Louis W. Hill, and Mr. Hill understands the situation very well. He was not afraid to criticize, either, and told the people just what he thinks about it."

Asked if he had any remedy to suggest, Mr. Hanley continued:

"The whole problem is working itself out fast. It is only a matter of getting back to earth. Employ the latest methods and let the people who are going to pay the bills have something to say about the expenditure of the money. Under existing conditions, it is impossible for the fellow who pays the bill to ask any questions. He is supposed to pay and take it for granted that everything is all right.

"Down our way we are building an irrigation ditch about the size of the Erie canal to water our lands, and everybody employed is actually engaged on the project. A young, active engineer is at the head of that department. Under him are the men that move the dirt, and I can say that the 12 cents per yard that it costs us to move this dirt is the big item of cost. Twelve cents per yard would only be a goat of the cost were the work carried on under the government system, with its immense directing department. Why, the actual cost of the digging of the canal would hardly be an item worth considering."

"If by chance you know of someone among your subscribers who may be willing to catch and ship frogs, kindly send me the names and addresses, or communicate mine to them. I have use for several hundred dozen frogs' legs the year round, and will pay a fair price.

"I have reasons to believe that there are many frogs around the lakes or the Klamath marshes. This is an easy way for persons living nearby to make a piece of money."

Since the receipt of the letter, the Frog Editor has been diligently employed in a search for croakers to fill the demand of the Seattle man,

but without success. There is more a croaker in Klamath county, either amphibious or given wholly to land.

It is possible that the letter writer gained his information from reports going out of here earlier in the spring but subsequent events have proven that the Croaker cannot survive the Klamath atmosphere.
