PETITION ASKS CHANGE IN LINES

been left at the K. K. K. Store for the signatures of sportsmen:

"We, the undersigned citizens, residents and sportsmen of Klamath county, Oregon, respectfully petition, as follows:

That, Whereas, There was, on the 8th day of August, 1908, by executive order of the Honorable Theodore Roosevelt, then president of the United States, created the Klamath reserve for the protection of native birds, which said reserve extends to within a few miles of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon; and

Whereas, It has never been the policy of the United States government to prohibit shooting and hunting upon the northern portion of this bird reserve, and the sportsmen of Klamath county and vicinity have since the creation of the said reserve enjoyed the privilege of shooting and hunting upon the northern portion of the said reserve; and,

"Whereas, At its last session the legislature of the State of Oregon passed an act prohibiting hunting and shooting upon all government and bird reservations within the state of Oregon, which law will prevent the enjoyment of the privilege heretofore enjoyed of hunting and shooting on the northern portion of the government bird reserve; and,

"Whereas, We believe that the northern portion of the said bird reservation is not necessary for the success of the plan of the United States government to protect the water fowl and provide a place for their unmolested propagation, there being a large and sufficient area for this purpose in the southern portion thereof, and by the enforcement of the new state law the residents and citizens of Klamath county will be denied the privileges heretofore and for all time past enjoyed by them of hunting and shooting within the vicinity of Klamath Falls, Oregon;

"Now, therefore, we do respectfully petition that the lines of said bird reservation be amended so as to eliminate that portion north of a line beginning at the intersection of the present eastern line of said reserve and the south line of section 27, in township 40 south, range 3 east of the Willamette meridian, and extend-

ing thence south on section line to the southwest corner of section 1, in township 41 south, range 3 east of the Willamette meridian, thence west to the shore of Miller Lake and thence along the northern shore of Miller Lake to the western boundary of said reserve."

CHARLTON FAILS TO REVERSE COURTS

ple had disappeared. Three days later Mrs. Charlton's body, beaten and disfigured, was found in Lake Como. The head was crushed into a pulp. A heavy mallet was the instrument of death.

Charlton, who is the son of Paul Charlton, former judge of Porto Rico, fled from Italy. He was arrested at Hoboken, N. J., June 23, 1910, when he stepped from the North German Lloyd liner, Princess Irene. He made no effort to conceal his identity, and later he confessed to the crime. Eminent specialists declare him insane.

Mrs. Charlton was a divorcee, the former wife of a prominent San Francisco attorney. She was twice the age of her husband, but was described as beautiful and young looking, despite disfigurement. The two were married in New York on March 12, 1910. When they told the young man's father of the wedding a violent quarrel followed. On April 16, 1910, Charlton and his bride sailed from New York for Genoa. Charlton's father later received foul and abusive letters from his son, which were rambling and incoherent. Charlton refused to speak to his father when the two met after the boy's arrest at Hoboken.

In an effort to keep the boy from being sent to Italy the history of the boy's family has been opened, and it has been shown that Charlton's grandmother died of alcoholism; his great uncle was a paranoiac; his younger accidentally shot and killed a playmate. Mrs. Charlton, it is contended, was a victim of erratic insanity. She had been treated for insanity, and people with whom she lived in boarding houses on Vermont avenue and Fourteenth street in Washington declare she was guilty of alcoholic excesses and eccentricities of temperament and action that twice forced her to move. Her family was prominent in San Francisco society.

ANKENY CANAL TALKED AGAIN

NEW ORDINANCE PROHIBITS THE
DIVERTING OF WATER FROM
THE STREAM BY THE WATER
USERS

With the object of preventing the owners of water rights under the Ankeny canal from making any use of their rights, and with the hope of eventually closing the ditch, an ordinance was introduced Monday night by Councilman Goeller. The ordinance provides in part:

"It shall be unlawful and constitute a nuisance to divert water from the ditch or canal commonly known as the Ankeny ditch, anywhere in the city of Klamath Falls below block 151 in Beuna Vista addition to said city, either for irrigation, household use or any other purposes."

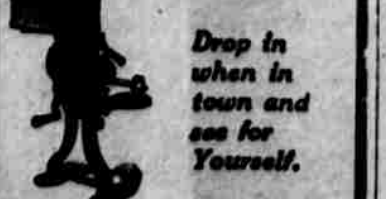
