LEGAL NOTICES

An Ordinance Proposing and Declaring the Purpose of the Common Council to Improve Tenth Street, From Its Intersection With Main Street North to Prospect Street, By Grading and Macadamizing the Same to Conform to the Established Grade in Said City.

The City of Klamath Falls Ordains as follows:

Section 1.—That pursuant to a petition signed by more than ten freeholders of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and filed with the Police Judge thereof, and presented to the Common Council, having for its object the improvement of Tenth street in said city, from its intersection with Main street, north to Prospect street, including intersections by grading and macadamizing such portion of Tenth street to conform to the established grade in said city; and the Common Council deeming it expedient and necessary to so improve such portion of Tenth street, hereby declare the purpose to improve such portion of Tenth street by grading and macadamizing the same to conform to the established grade in said city, and in the work of such improvement a space or strip ten feet wide on each side of said Tenth street shall be prepared for parking and sidewalk construction. That the materials to be used in such improvements and the manner of construction shall be as follows:

Such improvements to be made in accordance with the charter of said city and the plans and specifications prepared by the City Engineer for the said improvement and filed with the Police Judge of said city, such plans and specifications contain estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof, which is made part of this ordinance; such probable cost being in the sum of \$10,300.00; and such plans and specifications including said estimates and probable cost are hereby adopted.

Section 2.—That the time within which objections or remonstrances may be heard against said improvements shall be on or before the 30th day of June, 1913.

Section 3.—The boundaries within which the property lies that is benefited and to be assessed for the cost of said improvement, is all that property adjacent to said street, as far as improved, and within a line on each side of said street, as far as to be improved, distant to center of block from the property line on said street, and parallel thereto.

Wanted - By Authorities - The Fly

We have learned that the housefly is a dangerous pest because it carries the germs of typhoid fever and other human diseases. So there has been a great awakening of interest in fighting this fly. "Swat the fly" and "clean up the breeding places" have been the war cries heard all over the land.

More recently we have learned that a cousin of the housefly is even more dangerous. It is sometimes called the biting housefly, but more commonly the stable fly.

It looks so much like the housefly that Dr. L. O. Howard suggests "a good way to distinguish between the two flies is to allow them to walk over your hand." If it bites it is the stable fly. If it does not bite it is probably a housefly.

But you will not want to try this when you learn that if it bites it may leave the germs of some of the most deadly diseases in your blood. You will rather be content to swat it, being sure that whichever it is it ought to be killed.

The house and stable flies resemble each other very closely, but can be distinguished by a careful examination. The housefly is not able to bite, and it does not suck blood. Both sexes of the stable fly can bite, and do suck blood.

The stable fly breeds by preference in rotting vegetation. It is attracted to manure piles, preferring those in which much straw is mixed. Small piles of rotting straw or other vegetation or of manure should not be left in neglected fields or corners. If spread out it will dry so that the maggots cannot live in it.

Most insects are destructive in their earlier stages, but these flies do most damage when full grown. They bite through the skin and suck the blood of warm blooded animals, including man. After piercing the skin the fly gorges itself with blood, commonly staying in position until full fed for the time, unless brushed off. In such a case it flies to another animal. In this way the fly may carry disease germs quickly from the blood of one creature to the blood of another.

After a full meal the fly usually rests a few hours on a leaf or board, digesting it, before it is ready for another attack. They seem to take two meals a day when they can get them, and they are generally successful.

It has been believed for years that this fly is an active agent in spreading the germs of anthrax and glanders. Lately it has been convicted of being the carrier of the dreaded infantile paralysis which has long baffled the doctors by the mystery of its appearance and the sudden deadliness with which it comes.

When infantile paralysis is not fatal it is very likely to leave its victim paralyzed for life. It is one of the most dreaded human diseases.

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\$10 LAND STRIP SETS MAN CRAZY

WORRY OVER LONG DRAWN OUT LITIGATION OVER A SMALL TRACT CAUSES MEDFORD MAN TO BE UNBALANCED

MEDFORD, June 11.—W. T. Orlove and E. E. Kelly have filed a complaint before County Judge Tou Velle, charging W. J. Boosey with litigious insanity. The defendant will be given a hearing on his mentality.

District Attorney Kelly stated that Boosey's mentality had been so seriously impaired by his years of continuous litigation that he was no longer a safe person to be at large.

A number of years ago Boosey got into a law suit over a roadway strip on the south boundary of his land near Jacksonville, although the actual value of the land in controversy was not over \$10, the case was taken to the supreme court and the judgment rendered against Boosey was there sustained. Boosey, however, would never conform to the mandate of the supreme court, and has been arrested several times for contempt of court.

Boosey recently served a jail sentence for pointing a loaded shotgun at C. C. Sanderson, who was at that time owner of the property adjoining the contested road strip.

The county court recently condemned a road through the land adjoining Boosey's tract, granting Boosey's claim, in the hope that the long drawn out bickering and contention would be dropped, but after establishing this line, Boosey fenced off the new road, and again obstructed the highway.

According to the district attorney the various civil and criminal actions brought in the last ten years over this \$10 strip has cost the county considerably over \$1,000.

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Senator Overman, Head of Inquiry

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 11.—Senator Lee S. Overman of North Carolina and the others named with him on the investigation of the president's charge that an "insidious lobby" was in Washington to influence senators on the tariff bill has been pushing the inquiry so hard that it is believed here some real facts will be discovered. While it was the intention to limit the inquiry to ten days, it is now well settled that more time must be given by the senate.

FIRE APPARATUS, CITY HALL AND GARBAGE SITE ISSUES GO TO A BONDING HOUSE IN THE CITY OF TOLEDO, OHIO

The city council last evening accepted the bid of the Security Savings Bank and Trust company of Toledo, Ohio, for the sale of the \$30,000 city hall bonds; \$5,000 fire apparatus bonds, and \$2,500 garbage site bonds. The trust company offered par for the two larger bond issues, and in addition a premium of \$775, and agreed to furnish free of cost the necessary blanks. No bid was made on the small issue of \$2,500, but the company agreed to take them at par.
