

RELAY RACE WILL BE HOT CONTEST

THREE COUNTIES WILL COMPETE
FOR HONORS, AND THERE IS A
POSSIBILITY OF AN ENTRY
FROM JACKSON COUNTY

If present prospects count for anything, the six mile relay race at the Elks' Rodeo will be one of the features of the July 4-5-6 cowboy carnival here, for even at this date various sections are preparing to enter the contest and demonstrate to the rest of Southern Oregon and Northern California that the horses of their particular district cannot be beaten.

The relay race, according to the rules, is a six mile race, two miles each day, for three days. Best time for three days wins. Each rider to have four horses and two assistants, one to catch finishing horses and one to hold starting horses. Each horse to run a half mile daily. Riders to ride with chaps and spurs and cowboy saddle, which must weigh not less than 25 pounds. Riders to saddle, unsaddle, mount and dismount unassisted. All changes to be made on outside of track. Leading contestant in stretch to have right of track. Any kind of cinch allowed. The duties of helpers are simply to hold horses.

The string winning the event will be awarded \$100 in cash and a special prize. The second prize is \$50 cash and a special prize.

The race is a good event for stockmen to show the mettle of their horses, as track and race horses are barred. That it will be hotly contested is shown by the fact that since Will Dalton made announcement a short time ago that Merrill would enter a winning string, Gus A. Schroeder, the Silver Lake cattle man, has risen to remark that when it comes to running, the Lake county nags have it over the best Klamath stock in every way, and to prove it, he is going to send down a string.

All this talk has caused ranchers in the vicinity of Mt. Hebron to sit up and take notice, and a string of range horses are being trained for the race by a competent rider. Comes now Lindsey Sizemore of Fort Klamath with the announcement that with the string of horses he has in training, the honors belong to the Wood River country.

There is some talk of a Jackson county entry, but so far this has not been officially made.

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tion, which includes many of the larger and a number of the smaller owners, will patrol the lands of its members. For this purpose a levy has been made of one-half a cent per acre on all the timber lying east of the Upper Lake in Klamath county, and one cent per acre on the timber west of the lake.

Many of the smaller timber owners are joining the association, as they realize that in this manner they can have their lands patrolled much cheaper than if they did it themselves or if it was done by the state.

The association has also been doing considerable work in ridding the timber of the members of the pine beetle, which has done much damage. Seven men have been in the field all the spring, cutting infected timber, but this work has now closed until fall. A special assessment is made to cover this expense.

Horace Rice, Dean Australian Team



Horace Rice, member of the Australian tennis team which lost in the tourney with the four best tennis players in America, makes a strange contrast in playing attire. Rice is the dean of the visiting tennis delegation, his total of years coming close to the two-score mark, but he wears short pants—knickerbockers, they call them in England.

Rice believes that the short trousers give freer limb action than do the long flannel ones used by players in most civilized countries. Also he is free to admit that he considers his apparel an offering to the gods of luck who decide so many tennis encounters. Once when Rice was playing in a tournament where all the other players were wearing flannels he forsook his knickerbockers, and showed the worst tennis of his career.

An active, hustling little man is Rice on the tennis court. He covers a lot of ground and burns up nervous energy so fast that spectators often predict that he will be used up before the match is over. Rice fools them in this regard. He has the endurance of a good marathon runner, and the last set finds him just as active as the first set over the net.

Rice, on his showing in this country is not rated as strong as either of his team mates. Captain B. N. Doust and A. B. Jones are both considered superior to him. Jones has been ill during a part of the preliminary matches, however, and in consequence a great deal more than his share of the work has fallen upon the shoulders of the hustling little man in the knickerbockers.

RESTORATION TO ENTRY OF LANDS IN NATIONAL FOREST
