BECKER FIGHTS FOR HIS LIFE

LAST STAND IS BEING TAKEN TO SAVE CONDEMNED NEW YORK POLICE OFFICIAL FROM THE CHAIR

ALBANY, N. Y., June 16.—A last desperate stand was made here today before the New York state court of appeals by attorneys representing ex-Lieutenant Charles Becker to save the former New York police official from death in the electric chair for the murder of the gambler, Herman Rosenthal, early on the morning of July 16, 1912. The four gunmen who were employed at the instigation of the convicted police lieutenant are awaiting sentence of death in the "death cells" at Sing Sing, with Becker. It is generally understood that if the court of appeals decides against Becker, his attorneys will take his case to the United States supreme court at Washington.

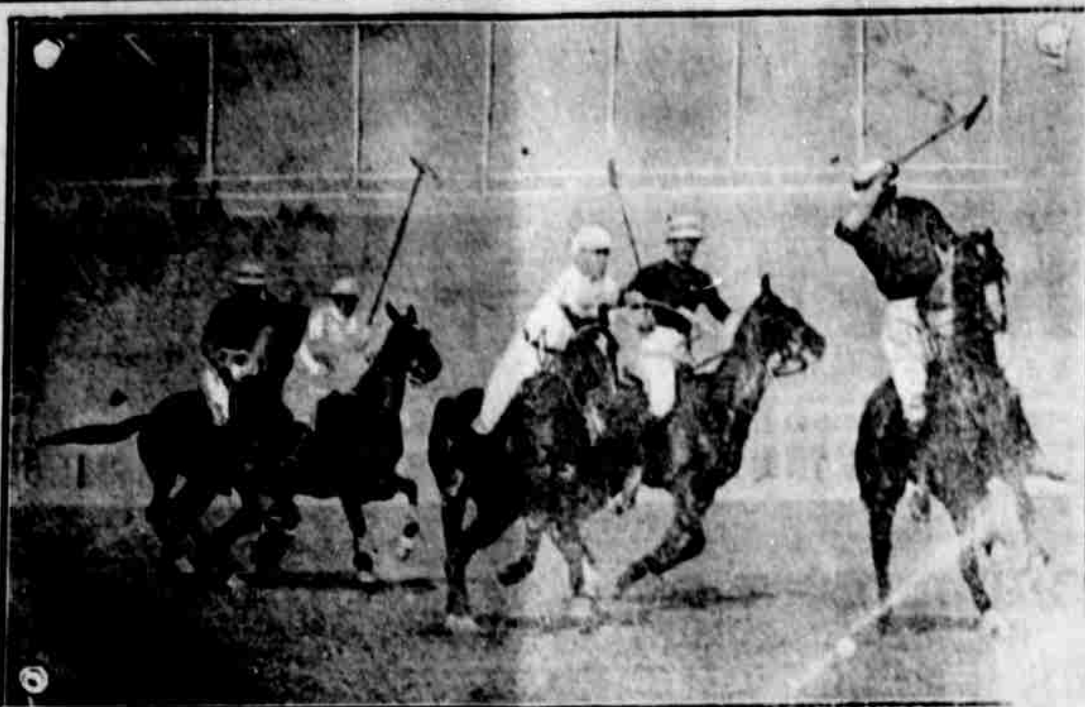

PELICANS LOSE ONE-SIDED GAME

INITIAL CONTEST ON NEW DIAMOND GOES TO VISITORS—THE LUMBERMEN HAVE SOME GOOD MATERIAL

The Klamath Falls baseball team accepted an invitation from the Pelican Bay team to a christening on the new diamond at the Lakeside City Sunday afternoon. The score was a lop-sided affair, but the game afforded much amusement and not a little excitement. Manager Pike of the Pelican City team has several promising players on his team, and Sunday's game was more of a tryout for the boys than anything else. The new diamond was not in the best condition in the world, and was responsible for a few of the marks creeping into the error column.

However, with very little work and a shower or two of rain, the Pelican ball grounds will be the best in the county. Very little can be said about the 17-to-1 game, and a detailed account of two innings will about tell the tale.

Pelican City turned their lone tally in the second frame, turning an error, a stolen base and a hit into a count. A. Pike, first up in the second, tapped an easy one to Ambrose who, instead of getting the ball in his glove, suffered a torn nail and an error; on the second pitched ball Pike streaked it for second, and Umpire Chilton motioned him safe on a throw from Thresher to George; Bassett lammed one into the left garden and Pike scored; West and Thomas each made three vain swipes, and Hutchins expired, Shive to Noel.
The Klamath Falls behaved themselves moderately well till the seventh frame, making only nine runs in the first six innings. Then they fell onto Hardenbrook for seven hits and seven runs in the seventh period. Baum opened the deadly seventh with a beautiful bingle to left; Arnold lived on Bassett's error; Shive added his fourth hit of the day, scoring Baum; Arnold scored and Shive took second on an overthrow to third in an attempt to kill Arnold; Noel celebrated his fourth time at bat by slaming out his third hit, a long fly to left, on

which Shive cantered home; Houston struck out; George was safe on a fielders' choice, Chilton making a try for Noel at third; Ambrose went out, Hardenbrook to Bassett; French singled safely and Noel tallied; Thresher singled, and, with French, worked a double steal; Baum, up for the second time in this inning, got his second hit in the inning, scoring French and Thresher; Arnold fanned, ending the agony. The batting honors belong to Shive and Noel, the former getting four hits out of four times up.

Now is the time for all good people to go forth with assiduity and swat the fly. We do not hear as much about that here as they do in some parts of the country—possibly because we do not have so many flies, possibly because we have inherent faith in the healthfulness of this locality, irrespective of the flies and despite their utmost activity. But with all that, the fly is a fellow to be looked after, and the business of looking after him must be a sort of personally conducted affair in every well regulated family.
In nearly every big city of the East the usual summer's fly campaign is about at its height; and all sorts of contests and expedients in fly killing are in evidence. With respect to market regulations we have some similitude of that activity here; but it is in the private, rather than the public capacity that we need particu-

CATTLE MARKET GETTING BETTER

HOGS AND SHEEP DECLINE A LITTLE, BUT BEEF IS RECOVERING FROM THE SLUMP OF LAST WEEK

PORTLAND, June 16.—The cattle market is steady to a shade firmer for choice beef. Good steers sold during the week at \$7.50 to \$7.75, and two loads went at \$8. Receipts have been very light, which has benefited the market. The trade is unable to handle a larger number of cattle at the present time, but good steers and cows are in fair demand.

The hog market dropped 10 to 20c since Monday. Liquidation has been very liberal and packers are temporarily over supplied; \$8.20 is an extreme top price for prime light swine and good ones are selling around 8c. Until the outlet channels are opened the demand for swine will show slight improvement.

An unevenly lower market in the sheep house. A light demand exists for fat mutton and lambs, but the bulk of arrivals have been medium and poor grade stock. Prime yearlings are selling at \$5.25, two-year-olds at \$5, and ewes at \$4.50 and \$4.75. The lamb trade has been a shade easier; best Mt. Adams stock failed to elicit better than \$6.75 bid, the bulk of the best stuff selling at \$6.50 and \$6.75. Liquidation was enormous.

From considerations of health and economy it will pay the private family to look after Mr. Fly and look after him closely. It will never do to think that he is not dangerous just because there is no municipal crusade for his extermination. He works numerously and unostentatiously, and in all his activity he distributes filth and breeds disease which too often results in affliction of a serious nature. The only way to avoid the chance of such disease is by swatting the fly as soon as he enters upon his business career.
So it is not necessary for the average family to wait for any public movement against the fly. In fact, his extinction is as much a matter of family as of public interest. Once this family campaign idea finds lodgment the fly will begin to get the worst of it. It is the most effective manner of warfare that can be made upon him.



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
