LEGAL NOTICES

**An Ordinance Proposing and Declar-
ing the Purpose of the Common
Council to Improve Tenth Street,
From Its Intersection With Main
Street North to Prospect Street,
By Grading and Macadamizing
the Same to Conform to the Es-
tablished Grade in Said City.**

The City of Klamath Falls Ordains
as follows:

Section 1.—That pursuant to a pe-
tition signed by more than ten free-
holders of the City of Klamath Falls,
Oregon, and filed with the Police
Judge thereof, and presented to the
Common Council, having for its ob-
ject the improvement of Tenth street
in said city, from its intersection with
Main street, north to Prospect street,
including intersections by grading
and macadamizing such portion of
Tenth street to conform to the es-
tablished grade in said city; and the
Common Council deeming it expedi-
ent and necessary to so improve such
portion of Tenth street, hereby de-
clare the purpose to improve such
portion of Tenth street by grading
and macadamizing the same to con-
form to the established grade in said
city, and in the work of such im-
provement a space or strip ten feet
wide on each side of said Tenth street
shall be prepared for parking and
sidewalk construction. That the ma-
terials to be used in such improve-
ments and the manner of construction
shall be as follows:

Such improvements to be made in
accordance with the charter of said
city and the plans and specifications
prepared by the City Engineer for the
said improvement and filed with the
Police Judge of said city, such plans
and specifications contain estimates of
the work to be done and the probable
cost thereof, which is made part of
this ordinance; such probable cost be-
ing in the sum of \$10,300.00; and
such plans and specifications includ-
ing said estimates and probable cost
are hereby adopted.

Section 2.—That the time within
which objections or remonstrances
may be heard against said improve-
ments shall be on or before the 30th
day of June, 1913.

Section 3.—The boundaries within
which the property lies that is benefi-
ted and to be assessed for the cost of
said improvement, is all that prop-
erty adjacent to said street, as far as
improved, and within a line on each
side of said street, as far as to be
improved, distant to center of block
from the property line on said street,
and parallel thereto.

Briton Against Briton in Harvard-Yale Race



Briton against the British, that is
the layout of the scenery for the Yale-
Harvard crew race this season, with
Jim Wray superintending the job of
preparing the Crimson rowers for the
race. Wray is an Englishman, and
learned rowing on the other side of
the water, but came to this country
years ago and adopted most of the
American style in boat propulsion.

Yale, in an attempt to recover from
a crew slump which has lasted for
half a dozen years, has imported Ox-
ford University coaches, and this
month will try to win from Harvard
rowing the simon-pure English stroke.
The contrast offered is that of a
professional English coach, who has
adopted American methods, pitted
against a system which represents a
faithful copy of the methods of the
old country. Wray has not had a
great measure of success in the pre-
liminary rowing season, his eight
having been defeated by Cornell and
Princeton, but Harvard enthusiasts
believe he will be equal to the task of
humbling the New Haven oarsmen.

The essential difference between
the American and English style of
oarsmanship dates back to the time
of the invention of the sliding seat.
Previous to the use of this device in
shells, rowers used a hard stationary
resting place similar to that of an
ordinary rowboat. When it was dis-
covered that a sliding seat made a
boat move faster, Yale's inventiveness
promptly unloaded much of the
physical labor of pulling an oar upon
it. The consequence was that Ameri-
can rowers soon learned to use the
big muscles of the thigh and waist
to a maximum extent. The English
kept the hard body swing of the fixed
seat, merely using the slide as an aid
to a stroke which was much the same
as the old-fashioned one. The race
between Yale and Harvard is expect-

ed to go far to settle the question of
superiority between the two methods.
Wray is one of the few rowing
coaches who habitually strokes his
"varsity" oarsmen from a single scull.
Most rowing mentors prefer to sit in
a launch, but Wray, who is an excep-
tionally good sculler, likes to get out
by himself and criticize his charges.
Wray's name has often been men-
tioned as a possibility for competition in
single sculling matches for the cham-
pionship of the world, but his work
at Harvard has kept him too busy to
enter this field. He speaks with a
slight cockney accent, but he talks so
seldom that few have a chance to
hear his remarks. Physically, the Har-
vard oarsmen are a fine lot, and grad-
uates of the university believe that
Wray will be equal to the task of out-
rowing the Yale team again. Even
now, they are pulling the sweeps in
the good h'old H'english way.

The Harvard crew candidates are
now training at Red Top, their fine
quarters near New London on the
Thames River. Since the men arrived
there from Cambridge Wray has been
shifting them about in an attempt to
remedy glaring weaknesses which
have been apparent in the form of
the eight. The changes which have
been made are more radical than have
been made by the Harvard crew man-
agement for six years. As a general
proposition crews are pretty accurate-
ly selected before June 1, and few
changes are made after that date, but
Wray is still experimenting.

Three men were dropped from the
"varsity" one of the first days the shell
appeared on the Thames, and no one
is sure of a seat. In spite of the un-
certainty, the men at least have a
thorough knowledge of the American
style of stroke, and Harvard men be-
lieve that they will be able to beat
Yale, which college is attempting to
adopt the difficult English method.

Getting Rid of the Cut Worm; Advice from a State Expert

Cut worms, reported to be epidemic
in the wheat fields of Eastern Oregon,
may be combated by many methods,
one of the most efficient of which is
simply good farm practices; fall and
winter plowing; cleaning up and
burning trash about the field and in
fence corners; rotation of crops and
thorough cultivation.

The adults are moths, most of them
nocturnal in habit, medium sized, a
smoky gray and brownish," says A.
L. Lovett, assistant entomologist at
the Oregon Agricultural college. "As
caterpillars they are sleek, well fed,
ranging when grown from one to al-
most two inches in length. They are
variously colored, dull yellowish,
smoky gray, whitish, greenish striped
and clouded, and sparsely haired."
"They have three pairs of true legs
on the three segments just back of
the head, and five pairs of prolegs
on segments further back. They re-
main tightly curled in some darkened
place, under a clod or down in the
soil a short distance, throughout the
day, emerging to feed at night."
"Occasionally, under peculiar con-
ditions of climate, numbers or food
supply, they assume the army habits,
crawling in hordes during the day and
devouring everything in their path.
They are then termed army worm.
Nearly every year there is one or
more of these outbreaks, and certain
species have so frequently assumed
this army habit that they have gained
the distinction of a definite name, as
the true army worm, the fall army
worm, the wheathead army worm and
the erratic army worm."
"Cut worms have a wide range of
food plants, and few field or garden
crops are immune. Ornamental
plants frequently suffer severely, and
several species of the worm have as-
sumed a climbing habit, and attack

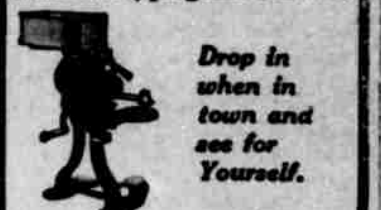
