ALBANY, N. Y., June 16.—To give
to New York state a real direct pri-
mary law, the state legislature con-
vened here today in special session
called by Governor Sulzer. Governor
Sulzer, who, with others who have
been advocating a direct primary law,
has stumped almost every nook and
cranny of the state, said today that
he is certain of victory, in spite of the
fact that Tammany Hall, led by
Charles Murphy, will fight the propo-
sition to the last. Sulzer's measure,
if enacted, it is claimed, would drive
"such bosses as Murphy and Barnes
completely from power," and mini-
mize the influence of the old machine
rule. The progressives in the legisla-
ture are certain to stand firmly be-
hind Sulzer in his fight. Besides the
primary law, an effort also will be
made by Sulzer to have several pro-
gressive laws enacted before the spe-
cial session adjourns.

Here From Lodge.—George Ingraham

WANT DAMAGES PAID BY SUFFS

LEADERS ARE BEING SUED FOR
INJURIES AND DESTRUCTION
WROUGHT BY THE RANK AND
FILE

LONDON, June 16.—Whether suf-
frage leaders can be held respon-
sible financially for damages to prop-
erty committed by the rank and file,
and to what extent is to be decided in
a case that opened in the king's bench
division today before Justice Buck-
nill and a jury.

The plaintiffs are the West End
Clothing company and ninety-two
other firms in Piccadilly, Haymarket,
Regent street, Bond street, Oxford
street and other fashionable shopping
thoroughfares of the West End whose
windows were smashed in the milit-
ant raids of March, 1912, and No-
vember, 1911, and the defendants are
Mrs. Emeline Pankhurst, her daugh-
ter Christobel and Mr. and Mrs. Pet-
rick Lawrence. Damages aggregat-
ing \$20,000 are claimed, it being
charged that the raids were directly
due to the exhortations of the Pan-
khursts and the Lawrences in their
capacity as executive officers of the
Women's Social and Political Union.
Some time after the last raid took
place, the Lawrences severed their
connection with the organization on
the ground that militancy was being
carried too far, but they are in the
present action alleged to have been
equally guilty with the Pankhursts.

More than 100 witnesses have been
summoned by the prosecuting mer-
chants, including forty policemen who
made arrests on the two occasions.
It is understood, also, that the plain-
tiffs will be able to use much of the
documentary evidence unearthed by
Scotland Yard when the headquar-
ters of the Women's Social and Po-
litical Union were raided last April.

the lower court by refusing to de-
clare the laws an attempted regula-
tion of interstate commerce.

"State rights" of railway commis-
sions to regulate rates was involved.
The railroads declared the state com-
missions interfered with interstate
commerce.

Governor Harmon of Ohio for the
National Governors' congress, filed a
brief in the case, contending for the
right of states to regulate commerce
within their borders.
