SPORTSMEN TO FORM GUN CLUB

ORGANIZATION TO BE FORMED
FOR PROMOTING FISH AND
GAME INTERESTS WILL BE
COUNTY WIDE

A real live, wide awake Rod and
Gun Club organization is assured for
Klamath county as the result of a
preliminary meeting of the sportsmen
held Monday evening at the Elks
Club. Although the meeting was not
very well advertised, there were over
forty enthusiasts present. E. B. Hall
was invited to preside over the meet-
ing, and after a discussion of the pur-
poses and necessity of the organiza-
tion, committees were appointed on
permanent organization, which will
be effected at another meeting to be
held next Monday evening.

State Game Commissioner C. F.
Stone addressed the meeting, and
spoke strongly in favor of such an or-
ganization for the purpose of assist-
ing in the protection and propagation
of game, rather than with an idea of
slaughter. He stated that with the
backing of such a club, the money
now being spent by the state for game
wardens and for enforcing the law
could be devoted to increasing the
game and fish by operating fish hatch-
eries and stocking the streams and
distributing game birds.

It was decided that a central or-
ganization be effected in Klamath
Falls, with members throughout the
entire county and branch clubs in
Merrill, Bonanza, Fort Klamath and
other towns. No initiation fee is to
be charged, but membership cards
will be issued on the payment of 50
cents dues for each six months.

"PURITY SUNDAY" IS DESIGNATED

made a tremendous power for the ad-
vancement of purity in social and in-
dividual life.

Besides this appeal for the observ-
ance of "Purity Sunday," the local
committee also sent out today invita-
tions to all religious, reform, civic,
and philanthropic societies and to all
organizations laboring for the social
uplift and to promote purity and er-
adicate vice, to send delegates to the
congress. Invitations were also sent
to the President of the United States,
the governors of all states and pro-
vinces, mayors of cities, police de-
partments and all departments of the
government to send representatives.
In the invitations it is stated that in-
dividuals not connected with any or-
ganizations will be welcome.

Announcement was made today
that President Wilson, former Presi-
dent Taft, governors of a score of
states, mayors of two score cities and
officials of a hundred or more civic
and sociological organizations already
have sent letters praising the work of
the Federation and intimating that
they will appoint delegates or attend
themselves.

A tentative program was today
made public by the local committee.
It will include addresses by eminent
reformers from all over the world;
religious workers, and various officials
of a score of nations. There will
also be several debates touching upon
points "where there now appears to
be honest differences of opinion."

Ample opportunity will be given
at morning sessions, and following
addresses, for open discussions in
which delegates will be permitted to
participate.

Six great international gatherings
have preceded the congress which will
convene in Minneapolis on November
7. The World's Purity Federation
was perhaps the first large organiza-
tion to begin the fight against the
social evil and commercialized vice
through wide publicity and "plain
talk" education. It has been mainly
through the work of this federation
that the present general agitation
and open fight against social evils
was set in motion. The Federation
has been working along the same
lines for thirteen years. Much of
this time, according to officials of the
organization, was spent "in arousing
public conscience" and in combating
the secrecy with which the fight
against the social evil formerly was
carried on and the hesitancy on the
part of the great majority even to
acknowledge openly that the social
evil existed. In the thirteen years
the organization has been fighting it
has striven to avoid the sensational
and hysterical in method and to weed
out from its membership the "notori-
ety seeker and those who are attract-
ed to this field by a desire for honor
or a career."

GENERAL AMNESTY IN GERMANY
IS ONE OF THE FEATURES OF
THE SILVER JUBILEE OF THE
EMPEROR

BERLIN, June 17.—In honor of the
twenty-fifth anniversary of the coro-
nation of Kaiser Wilhelm II as em-
peror of Germany, a general amnesty
has been proclaimed.

Value of American Exports Growing

The success of the great manu-
facturing industries in extending their
sales abroad is illustrated by the ex-
port record of iron, copper, wood,
cotton, leather and mineral oils dur-
ing recent years. These six great
industries have been able to send
their products to every part of the
world, accompanied, where necessary
by representatives of their producers
and distributors and, as a result,
show phenomenal gains in their for-
eign sales.

Exports of iron and steel manu-
factures (including automobiles and
agricultural implements with the
group usually designated "iron and
steel manufactures") have grown
from 35 million dollars in the fiscal
year 1893 to approximately 375 mil-
lion in 1913, or more than ten times
as much as two decades ago.

Copper manufactures show an even
greater gain, from 5 million dollars
in 1893 to approximately 140 million
in 1913.

Manufactures of wood (including
in this term lumber as well as the
completely finished types of manu-
facture) show a growth from 21 mil-
lion dollars in the fiscal year 1893 to
about 110 million in 1913.

Cotton manufactures increased in
exportations from 12 million dollars
in 1893 to approximately 53 million
in 1913, making it probable that this
year's record will pass the figure of
the former high record year, 1906.

Leather and manufactures thereof
show a gain from 12 million dollars
in 1893 to approximately 65 million
in the current year; and refined min-
eral oils, from 27 million dollars in
1893 to approximately 130 million
in 1913.

Taking these six great groups of
leather, cottons and refined mineral
oils—their aggregate exportation
shows a growth in the 20-year period
from 125 million dollars in 1893 to
336 million in 1903 and about 875
million in 1913. This indicates a gain of
600 per cent in the exports of these

six great groups of manufactures in
the 20-year period, against a gain of
126 per cent in the exports of all
other domestic products during the
same period.

The vast sums of money which
are bringing into the country through
their sales abroad is illustrated by
official figures of the Bureau of For-
eign and Domestic Commerce, De-
partment of Commerce, covering the
past decade. The total value of iron
and steel manufactures exported
from the United States in the 10 fiscal
years which end with the current
month is, in round terms, 2 billion
dollars; of copper and refined min-
eral oils, each about 1 billion; man-
ufactures of wood, three-quarters of
a billion; leather and manufactures
thereof, a half billion; and manufac-
tures of cotton, nearly half a billion
dollars, making a total for the six
groups named of approximately 5 1/2
billion dollars out of a total of about
18 billion dollars' worth of domestic
products exported during that period.

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
