BALKAN TROUBLE IS ENDED NOW

BULGARIA GIVES NOTICE OF HER
FORMAL ACCEPTANCE OF
JOINT DEMOBILIZATION TERMS
SUGGESTED BY THE POWERS

SOPHIA, June 17.—Bulgaria has formally accepted the joint demobilization proposal for the settlement of the trouble in the Balkan country, which followed the war with Turkey. Greece and Serbia have already accepted.

The proposal has been accepted by all, with the provision that the allies be allowed to maintain equal joint garrisons in the disputed territory, pending the arbitration of the Serbian-Bulgarian and Greek-Bulgarian disputes.

Stone Tells What Club Can Easily Accomplish

Good Sportsmen's Club Cut Down the Cost of Protection, and allow More for New Game

The influence of the new sportsmen's club to be organized will be used toward different ends than that of most rod and gun clubs, if the advice of Game and Fish Commissioner C. F. Stone is followed. Mr. Stone made a most remarkable address before the meeting of sportsmen Monday night, and that his suggestion met the approval of those interested in the new organization, was evident by the great interest and attention given his remarks.

Mr. Stone stated that \$50,000 was being spent each year in the state of Oregon for the protection of fish and game and the enforcement of the law, and that with the support of a good, strong organization of true sportsmen, this money could be used for the propagation of game, the operation of fish hatcheries and the distribution and protection of game throughout the state.

Attention was called to the value that would accrue to the people of this section by making Klamath county, the greatest of all game resorts on the Pacific coast, which could easily be done.

"Most gun clubs," said Mr. Stone, "are organized from a selfish stand-

point and for the purpose of increasing the facilities for the slaughter of game. I find that most protests made to the commission are for the infringement or curtailing of the rights of the sportsmen, such as reducing the limit of game or the shortening of the season. This is not only true in Klamath county, but all over the state.

"What you need is an organization that will support the game wardens, so that it will not be necessary to spend thousands of dollars in enforcing the laws. This money should be used in establishing and operating fish hatcheries and stocking streams and country with fish and game.

"Klamath county could easily be made one of the greatest fish and game resorts on the coast, and with the assistance of a good, strong organization of true sportsmen, we could stock the streams of Klamath county with fish that in a few years there would be no necessity to have any closed season, if the limit of catch was observed.

"Another thing: However rigid the game laws or zealous the warden, there can be no efficient protection without the co-operation of the sportsmen."
