ASK CITY TO HELP BOOSTER FUND

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEM-
BERS AND FRIENDS DRAW UP
A PETITION ASKING FOR \$50 A
MONTH

Among the monetary matters re-
ceiving consideration at last night's
meeting of the members and friends
of the Klamath Chamber of Com-
merce was the question of whether or
not the city of Klamath Falls should
contribute toward the work of ex-
ploiting this section and bringing in
new settlers, the cost of which is now
borne by private subscriptions. As a
result, the following petition was
drawn up, and is being freely signed:

"Your attention is directed to the
petition of your petitioners, for the
reasons and for the purposes stated,
to-wit: That the Chamber of Com-
merce of the city of Klamath Falls is
engaged in a general effort for the
betterment and the advancement of
both the city and the county, in the
prosecution of publicity work, in lay-
ing before the investing public and
immigrants the great undeveloped re-
sources and advantages of the Klamath
country. In the endeavors to bring
about the desired results, the use of
money is desired.

"The Chamber of Commerce is be-
ing sustained by voluntary subscrip-
tions, and this is found insufficient to
carry on the work; such being the
case, it is deemed fit and proper to
ask the city council to aid in this
work and to contribute to the main-
tenance of the Chamber of Commerce
in its pursuit of advertising the city
and county generally; and for this
reason the city council is asked to
contribute to the maintenance of the
Chamber of Commerce the sum of
\$50 per month, or such sum as your
honorable body may be advised."

OLDEST SENATOR HAS A BIRTHDAY

"UNCLE IKE" STEPHENSON OF
WISCONSIN IS EIGHTY-FOUR
YEARS OLD TODAY. MANY
CONGRATULATIONS

WASHINGTON, June 18.—"Uncle
Ike" Stephenson, the oldest member
of the United States Senate, and by
far the richest, today celebrated his
eighty-fourth birthday. The aged
multi-millionaire soon received con-
gratulations from many friends, in-
cluding those of his colleagues in the
Senate and admirers in Wisconsin,
his adopted state.

Senator Stephenson was born in
New Brunswick, June 18, 1829.
From assistant cook in a lumber
camp at the age of eleven years, to a
senator's record, in the early
days he was known as one of the best
lumber jacks in camp, and he never
lost an opportunity to make small in-
vestments with the meagre salary.
Farms and mines are Senator Steph-
enson's specialties. Senator Shelby
Cullum is almost as old as Senator
Stephenson. He will be eighty-th
in November.

CROOK CO. JUDGE HAS HIS TROUBLE

STATE GAME OFFICIALS AFTER
HIM ON CHARGE OF POISONING
SONG BIRDS IN COURT HOUSE

PRINEVILLE, June 18.—There
seems small doubt that Crook County
is to be treated to another picture-
esque mix-up in connection with its
judge, which may pale to insignif-
icance such now-historical incidents
as cement stones, auto affidavits, cul-
vert controversies, county sewing con-
tracts, letters and the host of other
official tidbits which have gone so far
to make the administration of Judge
Springer memorable.

This time it appears that a clear
case is proved against Judge Springer
for the willful destruction of song
birds, and the setting out of poisoned
wheat contrary to a specific provision
of law. The state game authorities
are proceeding against Mr. Springer
and if the case be proved, Crook
County will have a county judge con-
victed of law breaking.

Larry Waterbury in Impetuous Charge

Larry Waterbury

By all odds the most neck-ris-
ing polo ever seen in international compe-
tition, it will be fortunate if the
games being played between England
and America end without serious ac-
cident to some of the players. Sur-
prised and disappointed by their de-
feat at the hands of the American
team in the first game, the British
army officers were ready to play a
desperate game on Saturday in an at-
tempt to tie the game score.

Experts agree that the American
team earned the 5 1/2 to 3 goal victory
over the British largely because of
their superb "riding off" tactics. The
photograph gives the layman a per-
fect picture of the danger of this
mode of play, and is one of the most
remarkable action views ever secured
of a polo scrimmage.

Larry Waterbury, whose impetuous
riding did much to sweep the English
off their feet, is seen at the head of
the charge. Captain Harry Payne

Whitney is on the inside of Captain
Ritson of the English team, who
wears the dark uniform. The two
Americans are completely pocketing
the Britisher, and the three ponies,
traveling at a whirlwind pace, are
within an ace of a collision, which
would mean serious injury to the
players.

It was in the fourth period that the
incident occurred. Larry Waterbury's
charge was so fierce that before he
could stop his pony he had completely
crossed the path of Ritson, thereby
incurring a penalty of half a goal for
the American side. Spurred on by
this subtraction from the United
States' total, Waterbury played with
an impetuosity which could not be
denied, and receiving the ball on a
pass from his brother, Monty, he
charged down through the British
line and smashed the ball through the
goal posts for another American
goal.

That the present competition with
the visitors has developed the finest

polo ever seen in the history of the
game is the verdict of both English
and American players who are fami-
liar with the ins and outs of the sport.
Although the Meadowbrook four,
comprising Captain Whitney, the two
Waterburys and Devereux Milburn,
did not show up to form in prelimi-
nary practice their work in the first
victory over the English was the
finest they have ever shown.

Milburn, admittedly the greatest
back in the game and the tower of
strength in the American formation,
with Larry Waterbury divided the
honors for aggressiveness. Twice in
the preliminary practice work Mil-
burn was thrown and came within an
ace of death. He took all kinds of
chances against the English, but
came through the first match unin-
jured.

British polo enthusiasts were so op-
timistic on their team's chances that
they wagered large amounts, giving
Americans 2 1/2 to 1 that the cup
would be taken across the Atlantic.
