LEGAL NOTICES

An Ordinance Proposing and Declar-
ing the Purpose of the Common
Council to Improve Tenth Street,
From Its Intersection With Main
Street North to Prospect Street,
By Grading and Macadamizing
the Same to Conform to the Es-
tablished Grade in Said City.

The City of Klamath Falls Ordains
as follows:

Section 1.—That pursuant to a pe-
tition signed by more than ten free-
holders of the City of Klamath Falls,
Oregon, and filed with the Police
Judge thereof, and presented to the
Common Council, having for its ob-
ject the improvement of Tenth street
in said city, from its intersection with
Main street, north to Prospect street,
including intersections by grading and
macadamizing such portion of
Tenth street to conform to the estab-
lished grade in said city; and the
Common Council deeming it expedi-
ent and necessary to so improve such
portion of Tenth street, hereby de-
clare the purpose to improve such
portion of Tenth street by grading
and macadamizing the same to con-
form to the established grade in said
city, and in the work of such im-
provement a space or strip ten feet
wide on each side of said Tenth street
shall be prepared for parking and
sidewalk construction. That the mat-
erials to be used in such improve-
ments and the manner of construction
shall be as follows:

Such improvements to be made in
accordance with the charter of said
city and the plans and specifications
prepared by the City Engineer for the
said improvement and filed with the
Police Judge of said city, such plans
and specifications contain estimates of
the work to be done and the probable
cost thereof, which is made part of
this ordinance; such probable cost be-
ing in the sum of \$10,000.00; and
such plans and specifications includ-
ing said estimates and probable cost
are hereby adopted.

Section 2.—That the time within
which objections or remonstrances
may be heard against said improve-
ments shall be on or before the 30th
day of June, 1913.

Section 3.—The boundaries within
which the property lies that is benefi-
ted and to be assessed for the cost of
said improvement, is all that prop-
erty adjacent to said street, as far as
improved, and within a line on each
side of said street, as far as to be
improved, distant to center of block
from the property line on said street,
and parallel thereto.

Wilhelmina made with her little girl
from Holland to a watering place in
Germany, where she went to join her
husband, Prince Henry.

The trip was unexpected. The
princess had remained away so long
that the queen thought she would go
and look him up. Like most Dutch
mothers, she would not think of leav-
ing her little girl behind. Night com-
ing on, the little one could not sleep
while the train was in motion. Then
the cars occupied by the heir to the
throne, the queen and her suite, were
shunted off to sleep in peace till the
morning. The heirless is a healthy
young one, to whom the loss of a
night's sleep would not be very in-
jurious. But she is so far the only
heir in the Dutch royal family, and
great care is taken of her.
