NEWLY APPOINTED PARK SUPERINTENDENT WILL ALSO CONSTRUCT TRAIL TO GARFIELD PEAK

MEDFORD, June 18.—Will G. Steel, recently appointed superintendent of Crater Lake Park, writes as follows concerning his plans:

"I will take charge of the park July 1, and shall at once take steps to get a four-foot trail from the rim to the water and one from the lodge to the summit of Garfield Peak. I have many plans for the permanent development of the park, but feel that these two are by far the most important for the present season, for both of them can be completed and used this year."

SCOUT PERFESH MISREPRESENTED

FRENCHMAN SAYS THAT TURKS PROMISED HIM \$10,000, BUT HAVE JUST SETTLED FOR FOUR HUNDRED DOLLARS

PARIS, June 18.—Emile Vedrine, brother of the famous airman, Jules Vedrine, today received his salary for his services as air scout for Turkey in the Balkan war, during which he was a dozen times the object of the allies' long range guns. He was several times near death. Once he was slightly wounded when he flew over a Bulgarian battery. His work was a great aid in many instances to the Turks. The pay he got for his three or four months work today was just \$400.

"The Turks are poor pay," said Vedrine today, "and I'll never work for them again. They agreed to pay me \$10,000 but when the time came gave me a promise of \$400. Really, I'm lucky to get the \$400. They say the commander of the scout cruiser Hamidieh, the only Turk ship that did anything during the war, is an American and that they have promised him a fortune for his great work. I hope he makes the Turks—what you call it—cough up better than I did. He'd better take a tip, as you say, from me, and sail into port with his guns loaded and turn over his command AFTER he has been paid everything due him. It's the only way he'll get it."

ESOLA STARTS TO SERVE TIME

COOK EXPEDITION LOST MANY WEEKS

PARTY ASCENDING MT. MCKINLEY TO FIND EXPLORER'S RECORDS HAS NOT BEEN HEARD FROM SINCE APRIL

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, June 18.—A relief expedition to seek Archdeacon Stuck and his Mount McKinley expedition left Tanana today, after the Indian left in charge of the base of supplies by the explorers reported that he has received no word from the expedition since April.

The purpose of the expedition was to look for the records Dr. Frederick Cook claims he left at the summit of the mountain. In addition they intended to explore the remote sections in that vicinity.

TRI-ALLIANCE IS LATEST REPORT

LONDON DISPATCH SAYS CARNEGIE'S MISSION TO EUROPE IS OF VAST INTERNATIONAL IMPORTANCE

TORONTO, June 18.—The Star today published the following under a London date line:

"It is stated upon the best authority that the peace conference Monday between Andrew Carnegie and Kaiser Wilhelm was of greater significance than generally supposed."

"It is reported that Carnegie had official credentials from America and England to commence negotiations with Germany for a triple peace alliance. It is believed that King George of England opened the way for Carnegie."

"It is reported that the peace proposal is for an informal ten-year agreement between the three nations. It is provided that the three nations lessen their proposed increase of armaments as a guarantee of peace."

BACK STAMPING WANTED BADLY

GREAT CRY IS RAISED AGAINST LATEST RULING OF NEW POSTMASTER GENERAL TO SAVE TIME

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 18.—The longest and loudest wall of distress heard by the new democratic administration has reached Washington from thousands of small cities, villages, hamlets and other centers of rural America. It is a cry of protest against the action of Postmaster General Burleson in abolishing the back-stamping of letters.

Formerly a postmaster was required as soon as he opened a mail bag to stamp letters on the back with the date and hour of arrival, and then sort them for delivery. Mr. Burleson thought this practice consumed too much time, and he ordered it omitted. The complaints invariably have been to the effect that village postmasters are holding back the mail of their business competitors or their political or personal enemies. When back stamping was required, a postmaster could not withhold mail without being convicted by the silent testimony of the arrival date.
