LAKEVIEW WILL HAVE CREAMERY

NEW ENTERPRISE WILL BE IN OPERATION IN LESS THAN TWO WEEKS—SPECIAL RATE ON THE RAILROAD

LAKEVIEW, June 19.—That a large amount of money will be distributed among the farmers of this section is apparent by the interest shown by those who will furnish butter fat to the creamery which is nearing completion and will be ready for business about July 1st.

H. A. Troost, the builder, will operate the plant to its fullest capacity, which will be about 1,000 pounds of butter daily. On an average of 30 cents a pound, butter fat, it will bring the amount up to near \$100,000. After a year's run there is no doubt but what the amount will be doubled.

Mr. Troost has secured a favorable rate from the N.-C.-O. railroad for shipping in cream from all stations north of and including Alturas, and one that is much lower than the rates south from the same points to Reno, and it is expected that most of the cream produced in the Goose Lake Valley will be shipped to this place. Rates will also be secured from the stage lines leading into Lakeview, so that any farmer who desires can find a market for all the cream he produces.

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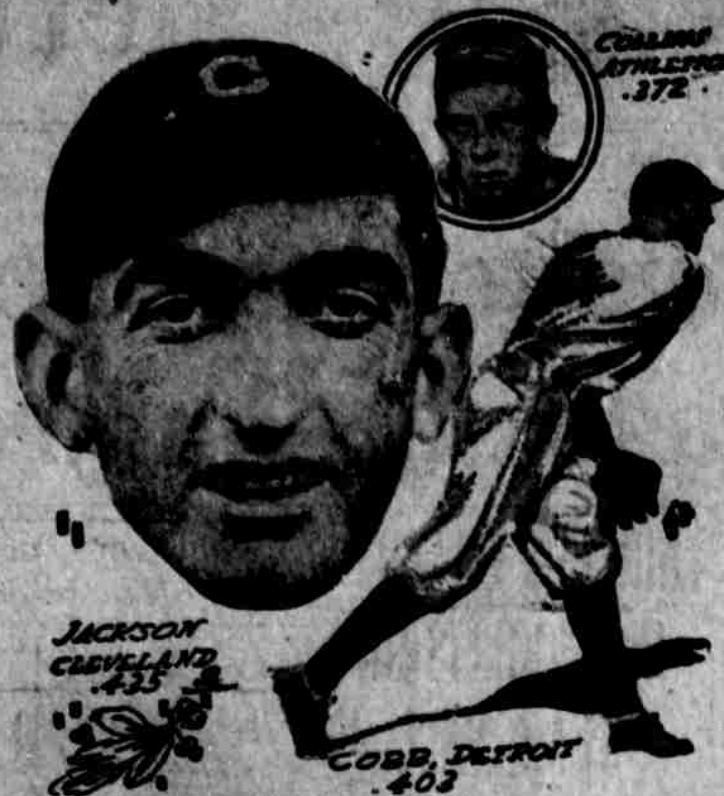

Jackson, Cobb and Collins Are Leading Batters of Big Leagues



For the second week of June, two months after the baseball season began, Joe Jackson of Cleveland, Ty Cobb of Detroit and Eddie Collins of the Philadelphia Athletics led the batters of the two big leagues. The National League didn't furnish any one good enough to get in with the highest three. This is pretty much the way the batters finished last year.

The leading batters when the season closed in 1912 were Cobb, 410; Jackson, 395, and Speaker, 383. Collins finished the season with 348 to his credit. At the present stage of the race he steps ahead of Speaker, who was in the three best a week ago.

But the National League men are pretty close behind the leaders. Cravath, the new star of the Phillies, had a percentage of .368; Viox, the new man in Pittsburgh, .352, and Huggins, the new St. Louis manager, .343.

Great Sport this Polo, in the Eyes of a Gotham Writer

NEW YORK, June 19.—They have played the international polo matches in New York, and as it has been some time since polo has broken away from association with the "lost and found" columns, a little brushing up is probably needed to fully appreciate all we have heard about it. It will be observed on taking a look that Uncle Noah Webster describes polo as "a game of ball of Eastern origin, resembling hockey, with the players on horseback." But to go further in our research as to the causes and effect of polo, we might say for the benefit of the masses that polo is "shiny" on horseback.

The superiority over the alley shiny game of our childhood is readily seen. It is the horses shiny that get cracked, not yours—or we should say, not the player's, as polo players are in the minority, else all accident insurance companies would have been gasping for breath and looking for kindly, considerate receivers long ago.

It requires several things to play polo. In playing the game, one of the accomplishments is to have your pony so trained that when his feet become tangled or wound around an opponent's mallet he will fall as gracefully as possible, and cover a small amount of territory in the descent, thus permitting you to have a chance of escape. If you get from under your pony you are pretty safe, outside of the chances of having an opponent's mallet step on your eye. A polo pony that understands just when and who to kick is the most valuable mount.

The average pony, as Mr. R. Kipling has told, is intelligent, and a rare asset to the game.
