\$75,753.00, or any part thereof, city
of Klamath Falls Refunding Bonds,

SUFFERS A LOSS

**SAWMILL AND ELECTRIC LIGHT
AND WATER PLANT ARE DE-
STROYED BY FIRE. COVERED
BY INSURANCE**

Fire, supposed to have started from
a pile of shavings, Sunday destroyed
the sawmill, and the electric light
and water plant at the agency on the
Klamath Indian Reservation. The
loss was about \$5,000 and is covered
by insurance.

The sawmill is one of the land-
marks of the reservation. It was
built in 1870, Hon. W. D. Moore,
father of Charles and Rufus Moore,
being the millwright at that time. The
plant has cut practically all of the
lumber used in construction work on
the reservation.

WATER SITE WORK
TO BE COMMENCED

**COUNCIL TOLD OF THE NECESSITY
OF DOING SOME IMPROVE-
MENT WORK IN ORDER TO
HOLD THE FILING**

In order to protect the filing of the
city of Klamath Falls to the proposed
water supply source on Aspen Lake,
it is necessary for the city to do a cer-
tain amount of improvement work
there this year. The amount and
kind of work to be done will be out-
lined at the next meeting of the coun-
cil, when the field notes and other
data regarding this source will be in-
spected.

There was some discussion as to
the advisability of the city spending
money toward improvement work, if
the water is not to be brought here
soon. In the main, the councilmen
agreed that it was to the advantage
of the city to protect and conserve
this site for future use.

Later in the year the council may
make a trip to the reservoir site.

**COUNCIL TAKES A CHANGE IN ITS
ATTITUDE TOWARD REDUCING
THE FORCE—OBENCHAIN AND
WILSON NAMED**

There will be three patrolmen here,

when the council sustained the ap-
pointment of M. M. Obenchain and
H. S. Wilson by Mayor Nicholas as
members of the force.

At first the council voted down the
appointment of Wilson on the ground
that three police officers were enough.
Nicholas and Hamilton argued that
this would not give adequate protec-
tion in a city with such a transient
population, and so scattered out. On
a second vote Wilson's appointment
was sustained.
