MANUFACTURERS ASSOCIATION HEADS ASK THAT A NUMBER OF FORMER MEMBERS OF CONGRESS BE CALLED

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 9.—Attorneys for the Manufacturers Association have asked Chairman Overman of the senate judiciary committee to subpoena forty former leaders of congress, including "Uncle Joe" Cannon and Senator Aldrich, to testify at the Mulhall investigation. The manufacturers state that they expect to refute Mulhall's testimony by these witnesses.
