THREE COMPANIES WILL BE PROBED

ST. JOHN, GRANTS PASS AND SALEM WATER SERVICE COMPANIES ARE TO BE INVESTIGATED BY COMMISSION

SALEM, July 10.—The water companies of three cities are to undergo a general investigation by the state railroad commission, which will there after prescribe schedules of rates based on the physical valuation of the various plants. The cities are Salem, St. John and Grants Pass.

Orders to this effect were issued this week by the commission, directing the companies to furnish the commission within sixty days from June 20, a detailed statement of the property and income and indebtedness and every other item that has a bearing on what an adequate income should be. These investigations will be similar to the one started a few weeks ago by the commission in connection with the Portland Railway, Light and Power company.

In all three cities the water rates and service have been the cause of much complaint and controversy, and have played a part in municipal campaigns and elections. After these general investigations the rates and adequacy of service probably will be settled for a long time.

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URNS SNAKES ON HER SPOUSE

ATTACK BY REPTILES WAS INTENDED FOR ANOTHER. THOUGH, NO JURY FREES THE EGYPTIAN CHARMER

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, July 10.—

The trial has just ended at Port Said of a native snake charmer who was accused of murdering her husband. Recently the woman was accused by a Frenchman with whom she had lived before her marriage. He besought her to return to him. At first she refused, but pretended to give way when he threatened to inform her husband of their relations. Inviting him to her home on a night when she knew her husband would be away, the woman prepared a welcome for the former lover by turning loose all of her most venomous snakes, but the man became suspicious, and at the last moment, instead of going himself he sent an anonymous letter to the husband, who hurried home, expecting to surprise an unfaithful wife. He was killed by the snakes, but the jury accepted the plea of "mistaken identity," and acquitted the woman of the murder charge.

Learns to Swim at 45 and Takes Up Dancing When 55

Sixty-three Year Old Woman is One of the Most Active Turners in the World. Says She Cannot Ever Get Old and is a Kid in Spirit. Gives Pointers For Remaining Young

DENVER, July 10.—A 63-year-old grandmother of the old-fashioned type, who settled into a cap and woolen shawl as soon as her hair began to turn gray and who spent her time, after the age of 50, knitting and peering over her spectacles out of the windows.

Nothing like that for Mrs. Bertha Rose, 63, champion swimmer, turner, dancer and horseback rider, and one of the most prominent participants in the international German turnfest held here recently. Despite her years, Mrs. Rose's nimbleness was the envy of girls of from 18 to 30, who also took a part in the turnfest. Not only has Mrs. Rose proved that advancing

years are no bar to athletic prowess, but she did not begin to acquire her skill in that direction until she was close to 50. She was over 45 when she learned to swim, and over 55 when she first took up dancing. She was 59 before she first became interested in turner work.

"I never expect to grow old," said Mrs. Rose today. "I suppose I ought by rights to be old now, but I can't consider myself so. I'm younger now in spirit than I was when a child. How do I keep young? That's an easy question to answer. It isn't so much what you eat, what exercise you take or the rules of living you adopt that keeps you young. It's just the spirit of youth inside of you. All my life I have had the spirit of youth welling up inside of me, and I think it will never let me grow old."

Sometimes I get ashamed of myself and say: 'Now I'm going to quit this foolishness and settle down and stay home and be a good sensible, old-fashioned grandmother. But some-how I can't. That spirit of youth and happiness and love of life rises up in me and I can't help going out having a good time.'

"When I was a child I was what you might call a 'tomboy.' I was always out of doors tearing around, running races, playing games, climbing trees. I was the terror of the neighborhood. I never had a chance to learn gymnastics or horseback riding or swimming. It was on the wild plains around Denver that I learned to ride, and I still love that sport."

"I was 45 before I learned to swim. I used to go to an old swimming pool

here in Denver and watch my daughters enjoy themselves in the water. Finally I couldn't stand it any longer, and I said: 'I'm going down there and swim if it kills me.' And I did. Then I learned diving—all sorts of fancy diving. In spite of my 45 years I loved to double myself up and go tumbling down the chutes in all kinds of positions. Everyone thought I'd break my neck. Then five or six years later, when the turner societies were established in Denver I joined and began to turn. I can do everything the younger people do and do some things they can't do." Mrs. Rose has no sympathy for the old-fashioned type of woman who did nothing but stay at home and knit.

"I think it is a shame for girls to marry and settle down to keeping house and raising children to the exclusion of everything else when they are so young. I am opposed to girls marrying young. I think every girl ought to have a good time first, and incidentally fit herself to become a mother. I myself married at the age of 24, and I wasn't very anxious to get married then. I wanted to have a good time for several more years, but my husband wanted to get married right away. I think about 30 is the right age for a girl to marry."
