PARSONS TO BE
REPORTERS, TOO

ADVENTISTS WILL GIVE CLERGY
A COURSE IN GETTING UP COPY
FOR PAPERS TO HELP FUTURE
FIGHTS

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 10.—
Dissemination of the gospel by min-
isterial press agents, who, before they
give vent to oratorical teachings of
the Holy Writ from the pulpit, write
their sermons in advance for the
newspapers, bringing forth the "high
spot" in such a readable manner that
the editors in their respective com-
munities will be more than glad to
print the "clipped publicity," is the
object of a new system inaugurated
by the Seventh Day Adventists, who
today are holding their convention
here.

Especially important with his ability
to assail the devil from within the
church, his knowledge of the Bible
and general theology, is the Seventh
Day Adventist minister's knack and
knowledge of putting his "punch para-
graphs" before the general public
through the avenues of newspapers
and magazine publicity. Every min-
ister is henceforth to be a trained
press agent for his church. To gain
knowledge of "press agenting" he is
required to undergo a thorough
course in the study of newspapers,
editors, how to collect, write and pre-
pare interesting news items, and in
general learn the intricate workings
of newspaper offices.

This information is furnished in a
course of eight lessons sent out from
the general press bureau of the
church at Takoma Park, Md., where
experts on newspaper work operate
the ministerial correspondence school,
and where the world conference of
Adventists is now being held.

Before the young minister has fairly
taken hold of his pastorate the cor-
respondents' school places him on the
list, and lesson No. 1 goes forth. This
lesson contains a general resume of
newspaper work, and explains to the
embryo minister-pupil that newspa-
pers which go into every home consti-
tute an important function in carry-
ing to the whole population of the
world the Seventh Day Adventist be-
lief. The "student" is posted as to
the various sources of news, just how
a news story may "break" and how he
can frame the account of the "doings"
in and about his church in a breezy,
newspaper way that will make it appeal
to an editor as news worth printing.

If Minister Jones proposes to raise

expects to denounce the evils of the
Turkey Trot from his pulpit, he is
taught the importance of writing in
advance a piece for the paper so that
it will be printed a short time after he
delivers his diatribe.

NOBLEMAN QUILTS
HIS CITIZENSHIP

ON ACCOUNT OF HIS BELIEF IN
SOCIALISM, COUNT IS RELIN-
QUISHING HIS OBLIGATIONS TO HIS
NATIONALITY

LONDON, July 10.—Count Erwin
Batthyany, who for some time has
resided in London, today received offi-
cial notification that the Hungarian
government had granted his petition
releasing him from the obligations of
nationality. It is said to be the first
instance in Hungarian history that a
member of the ancient aristocracy of
that country has thus renounced his
citizenship.

The count, who is 35 years of age,
took this step on account of his be-
lief in the principles of Socialism, to
the study of which he has devoted
several years.

Not long ago the Budapest authori-
ties closed three public schools which
the count had established on his es-
tates because the teachers appointed
by him were assailing existing meth-
ods of government.

Three Leading Base Runners
of the Two Big Leagues



(These figures include games of Wed-
nesday, July 3.)

The American league players still
hold the base stealing leadership of
the present season. Milan, the great
outfielder of the Washington Club,
has performed the remarkable feat of
stealing 41 bases in 70 games, a re-
cord which has never before been
equalled in the big leagues. He is far
ahead of the next best, and Ty Cobb,
once the champion base stealer, does
not show in this class.

Milan is followed by Eddie Collins,
the lightning second baseman of Phil-
adelphia, with 37 stolen bases in 61
games, and Mueller, the Washington
outfielder, with 27 in 70 games. Thus
Clark Griffith, manager of the Sen-
ator, has other evidence than merely
Walter Johnson that he has a great
baseball club.

The National League players who
came nearest these figures were Myers
of Boston, with 20 stolen bases in 64
games, Robert of Philadelphia, with
21 in 61 games, and Doyle of New
York, with 21 in 61 games.

FLYING CORPS
IS INSPECTED

FIRST MILITARY CEREMONY OF
THE KIND IS HELD WHILE THE
ITALIAN AVIATORS ARE GIVEN
MEDALS

ROME, July 10.—The first system
in the world's history of a conquering
aviation corps upon its return from
war has just taken place at Turin:
in the unavoidable absence of King
Victor Emmanuel, the Duke of Genoa
officially led in his stead, assisted by the
four royal princes.

Forty aviators, all of whom partici-
pated in Italy's war with Turkey, took
part in the review with their respec-
tive aeroplanes.

One by one they alighted in front
of the reviewing stand, where the
duke placed on them the various
medals for valor which had been con-
ferred by the king.

The entire corps at intervals of one
minute then took flight, returning in
an aerial procession past the review-
ing stand. Some 60,000 people wit-
nessed the spectacle.
