vice are at work building the flumes, crossings and other wooden structures. This work has progressed far enough on the Griffith lateral to allow the turning in of a small head of water, to permit the tamping of the earth around the structures and to tamp the ditches.

Large wooden flumes near the Masten, Brotherton, Bord and Griffith ranches have already been completed. The Dairy road crossing needs only the inverted siphon to be finished.

When the survey was made, it was the intention to cross the county road at that point with an overhead flume, but since then the county has raised the grade of the road. As this leaves insufficient head room for an over-

head flume, the water will be carried under the road by means of an inverted siphon, made of five-foot iron pipe.

Water will be turned into the other laterals in a short time also. The Poe Valley farmers will at last have water in plenty for their ranches when the irrigation season commences in the spring.

Water for the Poe Valley and Nuss Lake laterals will be taken from the main irrigation canal. The Griffith lateral will be supplied from Lost River above the diversion dam.
