Resolution

Declaring intention of the Common
Council to improve Sixth Street
from Kinlock Avenue to the City
Limits.

The city of Klamath Falls, by its
common council, resolves as follows:
Section 1.—Whereas a petition has
been filed with the Police Judge,
signed by more than ten freeholders
of the city of Klamath Falls, whose
property will be affected by the im-
provement proposed, which petition
was presented to the common council,
having for its object the improvement
of Sixth street in said city, from Kin-
lock avenue to the city limits, includ-
ing all intersections of streets, and
the common council having directed
the city engineer to survey and pre-
pare plans and specifications and es-
timates of various kinds of improve-
ments of such part of said street, and
he having filed with the Police Judge
for the consideration of the common
council plans and specifications and
estimated the cost of several varieties
of the kind of improvement proposed
for said street, and said city engineer
having filed such plans, specifications
and estimates and the same now be-
ing found satisfactory, they are here-
by approved, and it is decided and
determined, and the common council
hereby expresses its determination to
that end, to improve said street with-
in said limits by grading and improv-
ing with macadam, oil surface, as de-
signated in said specifications, with
curbs southerly from Kinlock avenue
to the railroad track, width of im-
provement by macadam so surfaced,
forty feet for entire street as im-
proved from Kinlock avenue to city
limits.

That the plans, specifications and
estimates of the city engineer cover-
ing such work are to be used as a
basis for such work, and any contract
for such improvement shall be based
thereon, and the estimated cost of
such work and improvement, as sub-
mitted by said engineer, at \$24,748.00
is adopted as the probable cost of said
work.

Section 2.—The time within which
objections or remonstrances may be
heard against said improvement shall
be on or before the 4th day of August,
1913.

Section 3.—The boundaries within
which the property lies that is bene-
fited and to be assessed for the cost
of said improvement is all that prop-
erty lying adjacent to said street, as
far as improved, within a line on each
side of said street so improved dis-
tant two hundred feet from the side
lines of said street.

Section 4.—The notice to property
owners affected by said improvement
shall be given as required by the
charter.

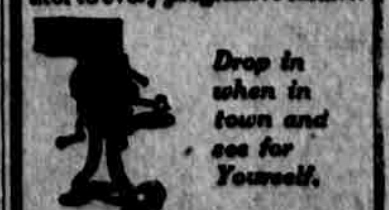

SANDY FARMERS DON'T PAY NOTES

COOPERATIVE SUPPLY COMPANY
PAPER IS HELD WORTHLESS
WHEN BANK COMMENCEMENT
TO COLLECT

That Klamath county farmers are
not alone in refusing to pay the notes
they gave for worthless stock in the
now defunct Cooperative Supply
House scheme, is shown by the trying
of two actions to collect these notes,
in the justice court at Sandy, in
Clackamas county. The farmers won
out.

The bank of Gresham brought suit
against A. Malar and E. D. Hart, respec-
tively, on promissory notes for
\$100 each. These notes were given
in payment of shares of stock in the
Cooperative Supply Company of Port-
land.

The bank of Gresham set up that
it was a bona fide purchaser for value
of these notes and that Malar and Hart
defended on the grounds that the Gresham
bank must have had notice of the
alleged fraudulent way in
which these notes were secured, or
that it was not a purchaser for value.

The verdicts were given in both
cases for the defendants.

The cases are of interest to the
farmers as being the first ones to
come up involving the notes given by
various farmers all over the state to
agents of this Cooperative Supply Co.
These agents operated extensively in
this locality, securing notes from var-
ious farmers, for in all approximately
nearly \$20,000.

GERMAN SCIENTIST SAYS THAT
SO FAR FROM BEING HARMFUL
OSCULATION MAY BE BENEFICIAL

BERLIN, July 16—In a long ar-
ticle, carefully prepared months ago,
and printed in a local publication to-
day, Professor Adolph Fickner, of
Breslau, strongly champions oscula-
tion. "Far from being harmful,"
says the noted scientist, "kissing soothes
the nerves, and has a truly
beneficial effect, physiologically."

ments. He doesn't say if the experi-

"Humanity has survived for ten
thousand years, the article con-

more ten thousand, if the world knew
that long."
