IN ARRESTED WHEN HE STOLE THE HORSE

Youthful Half Breed Was Indicted as John Doe Tuesday—is Charged With Assault With Intent to Commit Statutory Crime—Believed to Have Been After Another Horse When Taken Last Evening

William Beck who Stole \$100,000



NEW YORK, July 18—Here is a typical boy of New York—or a large class in New York. He is William Beck, who was caught after he robbed his employers, a firm of Fifth avenue jewelers, of gems worth \$100,000. He earned \$14 a week, but he wanted to be a sport. He dressed in what he called the fashion, and aped the wealthy he noticed all day on Fifth avenue. He soon found that \$14 a week would not keep him going, so he began to steal in small amounts from his employers.

Finally he determined to make a large haul. Filling a suit case with jewelry he left. But he didn't know enough to get away with his loot. He hurried out to the home of a relative in the country and was quickly caught. Then, as was expected, he confessed. He will likely get about seven years in Sing Sing.

Individual Elks Will Own the Rodeo Stock Lodge Retires from the Show Business. No Person Can Corner the Controlling Interest

By almost a unanimous vote the members of Klamath Falls Lodge, No. 1247 B. P. O. E., last night voted to accept the proposition offered by the directors of the Rodeo Amusement Association and surrender all of its stock in the Association for which the Lodge is to receive \$1142.86.

The lodge had subscribed for 51 per cent or 251 shares, but only had paid for 40 shares. After a thorough discussion of the matter it was decided that while the Rodeo was a big money maker, it was best for the lodge to dispose of its interest and let the stock be taken up by individual members of the Elks organization. A resolution was passed requesting the directors of the Rodeo Association to pass a By-law limiting the sale of stock to five shares to any one Elk until all the members had been given an opportunity to purchase, and limiting the total ownership of stock in the association by any one person to ten shares. This was for the purpose of preventing a few persons from gaining control of the stock. It is believed that there will be no difficulty in disposing of all of the stock in small lots to members of the Elks. The report of the Directors of the Association showed a wonderful bit of financing in the recent Rodeo. With only \$90 in the treasury the management succeeded in putting on a show, whose total receipts amounted to over \$6000.00, and after paying off some old debts, building bleachers, improving grounds, purchasing two chariots and the bucking horse, Pin Eay, a profit remained of over \$1400.00.
